The chance of a possible wetting did not deter people from making the journey to Trentham on Wednesday, the trains being crowded. The ground had dried up a good deal, and showed considerable improvement on the state of affairs on Saturday. Unfortunately, an hour or so before the close of the racing steady rain began to fall, and, with darkness setting in early, the afternoon ended in gloom

Mr. A. E. Whyte's arrangements left nothing to be desired, and everything passed off smoothly. Mr. O'Connor was in good form at the starting barrier, and Mr. W. H. Hartgill's decisions were given with promptitude. The racing, on the whole, was interesting, large fields facing the sarter, and in some cases the finishes were close.

Speculation was fairly animated, the sum of £14,136 10s being handled at the totalisator, as against £13,555 for the second day of last year's meeting. There were not so many bookmakers present as on Saturday, ten operating inside and fifteen out. Results were as follow:—
