At the sod wall at the back Capitol toppled over, and Corazon made a rapid forward move. Corazon was outjumped every time by Sir Lethe, but had more foot on the flat, and he led into the straight from Watone, Sir Lethe falling back. With heads turned for home, Cochrane was hard at work on Watone, and a victory for Corazon seemed assured. **AUCKLAND RACING CLUB.**

The report to be presented at the annual meeting of the Auckland Racing Club on August 1, reads as follows:—Your committee herewith present the annual statement of accounts to June 30, 1910, by which it will be seen that the club have had another successful year. The amount given in stakes last season amounted to £29,210, being an increase over the preceding year of £3930, but the liberal response of horseowners fully justified this step, and the surplus on the various meetings was well up to that of the season 1908-9. During the period under review nearly £3000 has been spent on improvements, amongst which may be mentioned the formation of a slope for patios on the A.H., a new wall on Morrin Street, fitting beyond the Derby stand, and numerous other conveniences for the outside public; while several new buildings have been erected, including an extension of the tree stand and Derby diningroom; also new workshop, stables, and motor shed. After writing off the whole of the improvements account (£2978 19s) and a large sum for depreciation of buildings, fencing, furniture, and plant (£2576 18s 6d), there remains an amount of £1607 2s 2d to be carried to capital account. In the 1909 session of Parliament increased taxation was imposed on racing clubs, which first took effect at the autumn meeting, and which will mean extra expense to this club, equal to from £2000 to £3000 per annum. It is with regret your committee refer to a heavy death-roll of members, which contains, amongst others, the name of Mr. A. Kohn, who for many years had been hon. timekeeper. The hon. E. Mitchelson and Mr. H. T. Gorrie being the only nominees for the offices of president and vice-president respectively, will be declared duly elected. The following nominations have been received for the five vacant seats upon the committee:—Messrs. S. Bradley, F. Earl, O. Nicholson, H. O. Nolan, G. W. S. Patterson (retiring members), and W. Davies.
