CUP DAY AT RICCARTON.

BRIDGE WINS THE CUP.

EQUITAS THE STEWARDS.

The New Zea'and Cup day turned out beautifully fine, and the crowd was the largest seen at Riccarton since Exhibition year. The racing was full

of interest and some excellent performances were put up.

Chief interest, of course, centred on the Cup, which proved one of the best contests in the history of the race. The pace was made a cracker from the start, but when it came to the final pinch the two pest conditioned horses in the race, from the public standpoint, fought out the finish, and established a new record for the race.

The winner, Bridge, looked a ball of muscle, as did Diabolo, while Kopu created a great surprise in getting into third place, especially after his poor form on the tracks.

The totalisator investments amounted to £27,472, as against £24,943 on Cup day last year. Fifty-three bookmakers were on the course, and their fees amounted to £736 10s.

Racing commenced with the Spring Hurdle Handicap, for which there were ten starters. Reumac, after being in front practically all the way, gained a somewhat easy victory. He was well handled by W. Young, who has made quite a reputation lately as a successful rider of jumpers. Reumac is bred on good lines, being by Explosion-Stepfast, who is a half sister to Elevation, Provocation and other good horses. The Otago horse, Coy, finished well. but Aorangi, the favourite was hopelessly beaten half a mile from home. Southern Cross shaped well on the flat, but spoilt any chance he might have had by faulty jumping.

Ten of the twelve starters for the Spring Plate were three-year-olds. Dearest, who is a full sister to Master Sou't, started smartly and was never headed, though she had very little to spare by the time the winning post was reached. As a two-year-old she had no form to recommend her, but prior to going to Riccarton she had run several good races in the North Island this season. Judged on her display on Saturday she is a smart galloper. Birkdale and Vice-Admiral were not well placed in the early part of the race, but they finished strongly. Pilgrim's Way and Domino also showed up prominently in the straight, but Colleen Mary and True Knight drouned out quick'y after helping to force the pace for half a mile.

Humming Bird, another three-yearold, carried off the honours in the Riccarton Welter Handican but only after putting in a fine run over the last two furlongs. It is evident that she is much better than her form in the North Island suggested was the case. She is a half sister to Renown. a Canterbury Derby winner, and one of the few horses that could claim a victory over the speedy Menschikoff. Chief Lochiel, who finished second to Humming Bird, registered a good performance, especially when it is borne in mind that this was his first race for twelve months. At one stage it looked as if Swimming Belt would have a runaway victory, but he put up a very noor fight at the finish.

The New Zealand Cup next claimed attention. Sir Antrim and Cullinan declining their engagements at the elevnour.

Bridge and Diabolo. who were well backed right from the time the nominations appeared, held their own to the finish, and went out first and second favourites respectively. Ingoda and Los Angelos coming next in demand.

A fire start was effected, and when the field settled down the colours of Cronstadt, Martist, Ingoda, Merriwa and Los Angelos were prominent. Passing the stand Cronstadt led the field and at Cutt's he was just clear of Martist and Merriwa.

At the mile post Los Angelos ran through and joined Cronstadt in the lead, four lengths clear of Martist, Merriwa, Outlander, Kopu, Bridge and Diabolo. A little further on Los Angelos drew out a length from Cronstadt. with Konn, Bridge and Diabolo at the head of the others.

Before reaching the half mile post Cronstadt dropped back suddenly, and Los Angelos showed the way round the home turn from Kopu, after whom came Diabolo and Bridge.

Los Angelos was the first into the straight, followed by Kopu, but at the distance Bridge and Diabolo joined in. A hundred yards from home. Bridge and Diabolo had the other pair in difficulties, Bridge eventually beat-

ing Diabolo by a length and a half. Two lengths away Kopu beat Los Angelos by a neck, with Taskmaster four lengths away, followed by Merriwa, Outlander, Cronstadt and Lawn. with Ingoda, Sandstream and Martist some distance away last. Time, 3min. 25sec.—an Australasian record.

Bridge's time in the New Zealand Cup constitutes a new Australasian record. It has opparently only once been beaten. The fastest time credited to a horse in a public performance over two miles in any British Country is 3min. 19 3-5sec., that being the time in which Pradella won the Ascot Stakes on June 19, 1906. The next best time recorded in the usual publications is Princess Florizel's 3 min. 25 1-5sec, run at Newcastle, England, on June 28. 1905. The best American record is reported to be Judge Denny's 3min. 261/2 sec., run in California, on February 12, 1908. The best Australasian record prior to Bridge's great performance on Saturday was Tartan's at Randwick, on April 24, 1905.

The Stewards' Handicap was contested by a field of 20, Boanerges and Equitas being most heavily backed. From a fairly good start Sea King was quickest to begin, but at the end of a furlong Equitas and Kohinoor had run to the front and they piloted the field round the turn with Gipsy Belle at the head of the others. Kohinoor lost his place on reaching the straight, and Equitas went on well clear of Gipsy Belle. At the distance the field closed up. Obsono, Wauchope and Bliss putting in a strong run. Equitas held her own to the finish, however, and won by nearly two lengths from Obsono, who was a neck in front of Bliss, with Maori King a head away followed by Gipsy Belle, Kohinoor and Wauchope. Time, 1min. 14 2-5 sec. Equitas had been doing some smart gallops on the tracks since her return to New Zealand from Austra'ia, and I think I am quite safe in saying she is one of the smartest mares racing in New Zealand to-day.

The big c'assic two-year-old event of the year, the Welcome Stakes, next claimed attention. There were seven starters, including Peirene, Culprit, Masterpiece and Miscount, who had won at earlier spring meetings. Orton was badly left at the start, Miscount and Culprit getting well away, this pair were always in front and in a good finish the Charlemagne filly won by a neck.

DERBY DAY.

DANUBE SCORES.

Derby day turned out fine and the crowd on the lawn and outside was quite as large as on any previous Derby Day. The racing was of an interesting character throughout, some of the finishes being close and exciting.
The "Times" had a very interesting

account of the racing, from which I cull the following.

A start was made with the Middleten Hurdles Handicap, in which eight of the first day's competitors were again in evidence, with Master Paul as a fresh aspirant for honours. Following his usual custom, Master Paul rushed to the front at the start and set a very merry solid pace, but his condition gave out before the straight was reached. At this stage five of the others were almost on terms, but Xavier easily held his opponents in the run home, thus compensating his owner for the bad luck experienced on the first day, when he fell. Coy again ran well, and Gold Bird, who also fell finished un strongly Reumac shaped in good style, but the weight stopped him at the finish.

The Criterion Handicap attracted a field of 13, but the issue lay between Gipsy Belle and Theodore all the way, Theodore gradually overhauling his rival and winning in the last stride. The winner, who was bred by Mr. H. M. Campbell, is by Merriwee—Heavenly Twin, who is full sister to the New Zealand Cup winner Canteen. Theodore showed smart form as a two-year-old on the strength of which he was purchased by Mr. E. J. Watt. but he did not race up to expectations last season, his sole success being gained in a sorint race at Woodville. His running yesterday, however, was attractive, as he had a good field behind him.

The Epsom High Weight Handicap. for which there were seventeen startserved to emphasise the merit of Dearest's victory on the first day. as she had a comfortable win, and It is now clear that she is a filly of more than ordinary merit. Morecambe, who was making his first appearance at the meeting, ran a good race. and Obsono showed that his Stewards' Handicap form was correct by occupying a good position all the way and finishing in third place.
