Bids of 3150 gns, 3200gns, 3250gns, 3300gns, 3350 gns, 3400gns, 3450gns, 3500gns, 3550 gns, and 3600gns were then made. In spite of Mr. Geering's declaration, We have not yet reached the price of sentiment," no advance on 3600gns was forthcoming, and at that figure the car was knocked down to Messrs.
