
MR. HUBERT CARTER.

Auckland's music lovers have had many occasions of hearing Mr. Hubert Carter at various local concerts, this young lyrical and dramatical tenor being a sufficient draw in himself to ensure a large audience. Urged by those able to judge vocal qualifications, Mr. Carter intends leaving at the end of the year to study abroad and perfect, himself in his art. With this aim in view, he is giving a recital at the Town Hall Concert Chamber on Saturday, March 27, when a genuine treat is assured. Mr. Carter has been studying the last two years with Mr. Leo Whittaker, to whom he gives the credit of bring-ing out the possibilities of his voice.

MISS NATALINA McCALLUM.

A former young resident of Devonport, Miss Natalina McCallum, who for the past eight years has been living in Dunedin, is arranging to give a song recital at the Town Hall Concert Chamber on March 25, prior to leaving for Sydney, where she will continue her studies under the per-sonal direction of Mr. Henri Verbrugghen, conductor of the New South Wales State Orchestra. Miss Mc-Callum's voice is a lyric soprano, Mr. Paul Dufault, the distinguished French-Canadian tenor, paying it a high compliment on his last visit which should carry much weight. It will be remembered that Miss Mc-Callum supported Signor Cappelli at a series of concerts on the recent tour of the Italian operatic singer, when she received much praise for her artistic interpretations. During the war period she was always to the front in patriotic and Red Cross work. Naturally, she is looking forward to extending the scope of her studies with a view to following up an operatic career.

An interesting visitor to Auckland ' in the world of music is Mr. Frank Wilson, the well-known baritone Australia. Mr. Wilson sang the prin-cipal baritone roles in Gilbert-Sullivan opera in Australia with the J. C. Williamson companies of 1905 and 1906, and again in 1914-15 with Ruth Lincoln, Ethel Morrison, Edward Mc-Keown, and Charles Walenn. Between the dates mentioned this accomplished artist sang several of the same roles at the Savoy Theatre, with C. H. Workman as principal comedian. He brings with him news that since her marriage at Buluwayo Miss Lincoln has returned to the stage in South Africa, and that Mr. Mc-Keown (son of the Rev. Robert Mckeown, of St. Mary's Church of Eng-land, Waverley) is busily preparing in London for grand opera. The tenor with Mr. Wilson was with Rupert D'Oyley Carte's Company on a long tour which embraced Glasgow and Dublin. the latter season being interrupted by the Sinn Fein attempt to burn down the city. After leaving Australia four years ago, Mr. Wilson played a good part at Daly's Theatre for twelve months in the musical play "Happy Day," and then he was for two years with the D'Oyley Carte Company as principal baritone. Until he sailed he was with Seymour Hicks and Isabel Elsom in the musical piece "Adam and Eve." Mr. Wilson may probably settle out here as a teacher of singing. He was educated at Tonnerre, France, and at Crefeld, Germany, and eventually won by pub-

"A DAUGHTER OF THE GODS."

A super-film featuring Miss Annette Kellerman in "A Daughter of the Gods" will be the special attraction at the Princess Theatre for a short season, commencing on Saturday next. It unfolds a story of remark-able adventure, in which that peerless model Miss Kellerman figures startlingly, her experiences including a leap from a 100ft. tower, an abduction, a narrow escape while manacled from crocodiles, and a thousand and one other perilous situations from which she comes out unscathed. The picture cost a fabulous sum to pre-pare, and a regular community of people were employed in its presenta-tion tion.

A very enjoyable recital was given at the Town Hall Concert Chamber at the Town Hall Concert Chamber on Tuesday evening, March 9, by Edwin Dennis, tenor. This was his initial recital, and from the well-chosen programme he had ample opportunity to display his abilities as an interpreter of different styles of song, also to demonstrate easy vocal production combined with arts vocal production, combined with art-Freeness of throat, by the istry. way, is one of his aims. The opening numbers, the recit. "Comfort Ye" and aria "Ev'ry Valley," from "The Messiah," were well sung, the recitalist showing marked ability as an oratorio performer. The florid passages in the latter aria were correctly sung, the quality of the voice remaining through to the highest note. "O Mistress Mine" (Quilter), from Shakesperian Cycle, received a very neat interpretation, as did the "Mallinson" pair, "Gloriana" and "Baby." Know-ledge of opera was displayed in the rendition of "Vesti la Guibba," from "I Pagliacci." In the two "Tone pic-"I Pagliacci." In the two "Tone pic-tures" of Cadman's "From the Land of the Sky-blue Water" and "The Moon Drops Low," Mr. Dennis showed intelligence in local colour. "Under the Lanterns" (Sanderson) was an-other interesting item. Tastefully interpreted were "Boat Song" (Ware) and "Phyllis has Such Charming Graces" (Lane-Wilson), the minor effect throughout making a nice change. "Inter-nos" (McFadyen) was the concluding number, a dramatic the concluding number, a dramatic song handled with a good sense of discrimination. As encores "Crow's Egg" (Wells) and "May I Print a Kiss" (Bond) were given, both delightful little songs, with a humorous vein running through. Miss Winifred Mitchell, as usual, played with skill, and her rendering of "Romance" (Wieniouski) was well applauded. Mr. Thomas Harris, elocutionist, also assisted in the evening's entertainment.
