

out, will prevent disease spread. If a post-mortem examination is held then all blood offal and carcass requires to be cleaned up, buried or burnt. Most farmers have healthy pigs because they pay attention to these aspects of disease prevention. Some have out-

breaks of disease in spite of their care; this will happen but there may be some weakness in their management of which they are unaware. Others take little care and get into difficulties; the remarks already made are intended especially for them.

Necrotic Sores

In regard to specific diseases such as necrotic ulcers in pigs this disease has been dealt with so often in the "Journal of Agriculture" that every pig raiser in New Zealand must be thor-

For the **AIR FORCE**: Rubber dinghies—Landing wheels—Self-sealing tanks—Life-saving jackets—Flying-helmets - Oxygen masks - Rubber caps for cannon. For the **ARMY**: Tyres for lorries, mobile repair shops, guns—Fittings for tanks—Groundsheets - Gas-masks - Gum-boots - Pads for steel helmets - Commando and Paratroop equipment. For the **NAVY**: Insulated cable and hose pipes - Range-finder fittings - Eye-pieces for gun-sights. For the **MERCHANT FLEETS**: De-gaussing equipment (to protect them from magnetic mines).

What you should do

YOU THE HOUSEHOLDER: Search your home for worn-out and unwanted rubber. Put it out in a separate bundle, along with your other salvage.

YOU THE MOTORIST: Every worn-out tyre and inner tube is wanted. Take them to a local garage for consignment to a Government Depot: or put them out with other salvage.

YOU IN INDUSTRY: Make an intensive drive throughout your plants, shops, business premises of all kinds, for waste rubber. Collect it together. Continue to save pending a later announcement as to collection.

KEEP ON COLLECTING. One effort is not enough. Keep on collecting . . . little by little it mounts up to a huge total. All proceeds to go to the National Patriotic Fund.
