Communications for this Gazette should be addressed to the Commissioner of Police, Armed Constabulary Depôt, Wellington. They must be of police interest, or no notice will be taken of them. Officers in charge of districts are requested to report to the Commissioner the non-delivery of the Gazette, and to suggest from time to time such alterations in the addresses and in the mode of transmission as may be considered necessar,

CRIME REPORTS.—A copy of each crime report should be immediately forwarded to the Commissioner's Office for Gazette

purposes
WARRANTS.—All reports of crime must state whether or not a warrant has been i-sued for the arrest of the offender. Should a warrant not have been issued in the first instance, but one be subsequently obtained, a supplementary report announcing the issue must be immediately forwarded to all places where the original report has been sent. The supplementary report should repeat the offender's description, or refer to it in the Police Gazette or original crime report. Persons reporting crimes should be requested to obtain warrants whenever prac-

Offenders should be accurately described, their native country, usual occupation, and every particular likely to lead to their

arrest and identification minutely given.

NAMES.—It is particularly requested that in all crime reports the names of persons and places may be spelt correctly and written legibly, the Christian name being given with the surname whenever possible, and written in full to prevent

STRAY CATTLE.—No advertisement of lost horses or cattle will be published in this Gazette unless they be Government property; but notices of horses or cattle believed to be stolen

will be inserted.

PROPERTY DESCRIBED.—The age, height, breed, colour, particular marks, &c., of horses should be minutely described, and the brands initated as nearly as possible, and their exact position given. Cattle should also be carefully described. In forwarding the brands of horses and cattle per telegram, it should be stated of what kind of letters the brands consist, whether of Roman capitals or in writing. In describing watches, it should be stated whether they are open-faced, hunting, double-cased, or half-hunting, the term "double-cased," being reserved for those watches whose outer case is removed in order to wind, "half-hunting" implying a very small glass in the metal cover of the dial. All property should be described as minutely as possible.

PREVIOUS REFERENCES .- It is requested that, in all reports

respecting cases gazetted, members of the Force will be good enough to quote the date and page of the Police Gazette in which the previous notice has appeared, and in reporting arrests to state by whom effected. Supplementary reports of cases already reported, but not gazetted, where arrests are made, should at once be forwarded to the Commissioner's office, and should contain such information as will clearly identify the

CIRCULATION OF CRIME REPORTS .- The officers in charge of districts will be held responsible for the proper circulation of reports relating to crime committed in their respective districts. Where there is reason to believe that the offender is proceeding towards any particular part of the colony, the police of the district in which the crime was committed should report the fact to the police of that place with the least possible delay. They should also communicate without delay with the police of any part of the colony from which it is thought probable that important information regarding any offender can be obtained.

When the member of the Force in charge of a station considers it necessary, so as to insure the speedy arrest of offenders or the recovery of stolen property, &c., to forward crime reports or supplementary crime reports direct to the Commissione's office, it should be distinctly stated on the one forwarded to the officer in charge of the district that a copy has been supplied to the Commissioner's office, otherwise duplicates may be received, and being mistaken for originals may cause confusion.

REWARDS .- No notice of reward offered by any private person or persons will be inserted in the Police Gazette unless there be forwarded to the Commissioner's office the guarantee of some responsible person that the reward shall be payable to the person who performs the service for which it is offered. If such notice be communicated by telegraph, the addition of the words "Guarantee received" will be sufficient; in such cases, however, the guarantee must be forwarded to the Commissioner's office without delay.

In reporting the arrest of offenders, the recovery of property, or otherwise referring to anything notified in the Otago or Canterbury Police Gazette, the date and page in which the previous notice appeared should be given.

#### Incendiarism.

£200 REWARD, AND A FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.

Burning of William J. McIlroy and Thomas Rouston's store at Kumara.—£200 reward is offered by the agents of the National and Standard Insurance Companies for such information as shall lead to the apprehension of the offender or offenders; and, in addition thereto, it is notified that His Excellency the Governor will grant a free pardon to any person implicated in the said act, not being the principal offender, who shall give such information as will lead to the apprehension of any one or more of the other offenders.

#### Offences Not Otherwise Described.

E. G. HEYLMANN is charged, on warrant issued by the Dun-edin Bench, with having, on the 10th April last, at Dunedin, forged a bill of exchange for £40 10s., drawn on Francis Crowder. Description: A Prussian, a law clerk and seaman, twenty-eight years of age, 5 feet \$\frac{1}{2}\$ inches high, medium build, very fresh complexion, large blue eyes, light brown hair, small sandy whickers and moustache, high bald forefread, small feminine hands, smart creet gat, speaks English fluently, but with a slight foreign accent; usually wears dark clothes and underleathers. He was employed as clerk in the office of Messrs. Adams and Joyce, solicitors, Dunedin. He left Port Chalmers by the steamer "Arawata" on the 24th October last for Melbourne, and was soon after seen there, when he was clean shared, and had assumed the name "Hill." He is supposed to be at present residing in Geelong. He is known to a Mr. Holme and to Sarah Sorrel, who reside at 17, Grant Street, Emerald Hill, and also to the chief steward of the steamer "Arawata."

JOHN MAYNE is charged, on warrant issued by the Invercargill Bench, with having, on the 22nd ultimo, at Dec Street, Invercargill, obtained a black cloth trousers and vest, a corded tweed coat, and a white shirt, value £4 19s., from Peter Mathias Peters, by false pretences. Description: A Tasmanian, a saw-mill hand, twenty-seven years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, medium build, brown hair, light brown beard, whis-kers, and moustache, small thin face, sallow complexion, in delicate health; wore dark clothes and white straw hat with puggery, and sometimes wears a black hat with puggery. He was seen in Dunedin on the 30th ultimo. He has a sister employed as cock at the Star and Garter Hotel, Oamaru.

JOHN HILL, charged on warrant with having obtained a cheque and money from Henry Matson and Co., by false pretences, has been arrested by Detective L. D. Benjamin, Christchurch Police, and committed for trial.

E. Cole is charged, on warrant issued by the Nelson Bench, with having, on the 5th instant, at Nelson, obtained goods and money, value £4 10s., from Isaac Mason Hill, by means of a valueless cheque. Description: English, twenty-four or twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, light hair, no beard or moustache; wore dark clothes and dark felt hat. The cheque is dated the 4th instant, signed "J. Marsden," and indorsed "E. Cole." This offender is also charged, on warrant issued at Nelson, with having, on the same date at Nelson, obtained goods and money, value £3 10s., from James Phillips Cocke, by means of a valueless cheque. The cheque is dated the 5th instant, signed "James Marsden," and indorsed "E. Cole." He has left Nelson, where he was not previously known. It is supposed that this offender is identical with Walter Weston, alias Hedge, alias Edward Hedge, alias Joyce, charged on warrant with having issued a number of valueless cheques at Christchurch. Weston, alias Hedge, alias Joyce, is now described as being only 5 feet 5 inches high, has a crucifixion tattoed on one of his arms, and union jack and coat of arms on the other arm.

A MAN known as Ayegim, or Ayegreen, is charged, on warrant issued by the Kumara Bench, with having unlawfully cut and wounded Elizabeth Campbell, in her house, at Seldon Street, Kumara, on the 23rd ultimo. Description: A Norwegian, a miner, twenty years of age, 5 feet 10½ inches high, medium build, fair complexion, fair hair, no beard or moustache; wore dark coat, tweed trousers, and wideawake hat.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged, on warrant issued by the Wellington Bench, with having, on the 31st ultimo, in Manners Street, Wellington, obtained £3 1s. 6d. and goods, value £1 8s. 6d., from Henry D. Edwards, by means of a valueless cheque. Description: About twenty years of age, 5 feet 4 or 5 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, light-brown hair, no beard or whiskers; were dark tweed suit and black cap with leather peak. He represented that he was employed by Mr. J. C. Crawford, at Evans Bay, near Wellington.

RICHARD EISTON is charged, on warrant issued by the Nelson Bench, with having, on the 22nd ultimo, at Wakefield, near Nelson, obtained £13 from Robert Martin Smith by means of a valueless cheque. Description: English, a clerk, twenty-seven years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, red beard, whiskers, and moustache, brown hair, dark brown eyes, blinks with both eyes; were grey tweed clothes and black high crowned hat. He had a black hag containing a brown suit of clothes in his possession when he left Nelson. It is supposed he has come to Wellington or gone to Auckland. Mr. Smith offers £5 reward for the offender's arrest.

Hugh O'Nell is charged, on warrant, issued by the Christchurch Bench, with having, on the 7th instant, disobeyed a summons to appear at the Resident Magistrate's Court, Christchurch, to answer a charge of being the master or keeper of a house of ill fame. Description: Irish, a labourer, thirty-seven years of age, 5 feet  $4\frac{3}{4}$  inches high, fresh complexion, brown hair, grey eyes, straight nose, small mouth, scar on left side of nose near eye and on forchead; wore dark tweed coat and vest, moleskin trousers, lace-up boots, and old white felt hat; a drunkard. He left his house at Christchurch on the 7th instant, and took with him a blue blanket swag.

# House-Breaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

Not identifiable. George Stevens, a lawker, has been arre-ted for this offence. Other jewellery, value about £40, stolen from the shop during the same time, was found in his possession.

Between 3 and 4.30 p.m. on the 2nd instant the dwelling of William Clarke, White's Bridge, near Kaiapoi, Canterbury District, was broken into and the following stolen: A leather purse with brass clasps, containing a new £5 Bank of New Zealand note and a half-sovereign. Purse identifiable. Suspicion attached to a man, name unknown, who was seen near the house. Description: A German, about 5 feet 6 or 7 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, short reddish beard, whiskers, and moustache; were blue cloth sac coat, dark moleskin trousers, black billycock hat, and watch and chain.

Description: English, a lubourer, forty years of age, 5 feet 4 inches high, stout build, fair complexion, brown hair, whiskers, beard, and moustache, one of checks swollen, mark of cut about three inches long on check; wore brown cardigan jacket, moleskin trousers, and watertight boots. He is supposed to have gone to Hurumi.

Brucke is Irish, about twenty-four years of age, 5 ft. 11 in. high, fair complexion, erect gait, a front tooth wanting.

# Stealing otherwise than from the Person or from Dwellings.

Identifiable. Description: English, a clerk, twenty-one years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, thin features, fair complexion, light hair, hazel eyes, slight monstache, no whiskers, a little in-kneed; wore grey tweed suit, low crowned soft felt hat or small straw hat, and lace-up boots; shabby appearance. He arrived from England by the ship "Famenoth" about two months ago. He pawned the coat at Neumegen's pawn office. It is supposed he has gone to Waikato.
