### REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE CLOTHING, EQUIPMENT, AND PAY OF THE ARMED CONSTABULARY.

JAMES PRENDERGAST,  
Administrator of the Government.

WHEREAS by the fifth section of "The Armed Constabulary Act Amendment Act, 1869," it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may from time to time make and alter regulations respecting the clothing, equipment, and pay of the Armed Constabulary; and all such regulations shall have the same force as though they formed a part of the now reciting Act: And whereas it is expedient to revoke certain of the existing regulations, bearing date the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, and to make others in lieu of those so revoked:

Now, therefore, I, James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in me by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, do hereby revoke such of the regulations dated the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight, as relate to the pay of non-commissioned officers and constables; and in lieu thereof do hereby make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto, and do direct that they shall be read with and as part of the existing regulations, from and after the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

### Incendiarism.

DURING the night of the 18th ultimo, at Manaia, near Masterton, a two-roomed house, valued £30, the property of Donald Donald, was destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was maliciously caused. The house was not insured.

DURING the night of the 22nd ultimo, at Mansfield, near Ngapara, 500 bags of oats, valued £200, the property of Charles Jessoph and James R. Elder, were destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was wilfully caused.

### Offences Not Otherwise Described.

SAMUEL GARRETT is charged, on warrant issued by the Timaru Bench, with embezzling £3 3s., at Waimate, on the 3rd ultimo, the money of Messrs. Brown and Everett. Description: English, about forty-six years of age, 5 feet 7 or 8 inches high, slight build, pale complexion, light sandy hair, beard, whiskers, and moustache, delicate-looking, very much stooped; wore brown-tweed coat, white-moleskin trousers, white soft felt hat, and blucher boots; fond of smoking and gambling. He was seen in Oamaru on the 10th ultimo. It is believed there will be other similar charges preferred against him.

A WARRANT has been issued for the arrest of John Beattie for having stabbed and assaulted John Wilson, at Ettrick. He has a brother at Green Vale Station, near Tapanui. He was seen with his brother, near Waikaka, on the 22nd ultimo, and then had some fresh scratches on his face; he went into the ranges. On the 24th ultimo a man, answering his description, purchased at Edger's store, Waikaka Township, some flour, tea, and sugar; he was dressed in a black monkey-jacket, moleskin trousers, and soft black hat; had a piece of light-oilcloth round his swag, and fresh scratches on his face.

BETWEEN 9 a.m. and 12.30 p.m. on the 16th July last the points at the Ringway railway siding, near Otautau, Southland, were maliciously altered, which caused the train to run off the main line into the siding. Between 12.30 and 4 p.m. on the same day the padlock of the same points was maliciously broken.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with having indecently exposed his person to Ellen Fairbairn, in Bedford Row, Christchurch, about 9 p.m. on the 10th ultimo. Description: Supposed English, about thirty years of age, about 5 feet 9 inches high, medium build; wore long dark overcoat, supposed an ulster, and hard black felt hat. About 8.45 p.m. on the 17th ultimo a man of the same description indecently exposed his person to Helen Infield and Mary Atkinson, also in Bedford Row.

ELIZABETH MARY BAKER, indecently assaulted by a man name unknown, at Kaikorai Valley.—The parents of the girl wish that no further action be taken in the matter.

GEORGE ISIDORE D'ARCEY, *alias* Danzicker, is charged, on warrant issued by the Christchurch Bench, with uttering a forged cheque for £10 to Henry Groth, in the Golden Fleece Hotel, Christchurch, on the 2nd ultimo. Description: Supposed an English Jew, a clerk, about twenty-six years of age, about 5 feet 7 inches high, medium build, sallow complexion, round features, thick nose, black hair, rather long and inclined to curl at back, clean-shaved except short black side whiskers and moustache, short-sighted, and wears spectacles; dressed in shabby-black suit and hard black hat. The cheque is on the Colonial Bank, Oamaru, and purports to be signed by R. F. Lewis, whom offender said was his uncle, and resided at Oamaru. He is also charged, on warrant issued by the Ashburton Bench, with uttering a forged cheque for £4 to Thomas Quill, at Ashburton, on the 12th ultimo. He went by the name of Marks at Ashburton. The cheque purports to be signed by S. D. Nathan, Christchurch, by whom the offender was lately employed. He left Ashburton on the 12th ultimo by train for the South, accompanied by a man about twenty-two years of age, 5 feet 3 or 4 inches high, shabby appearance. A Mrs. Hyman, of Dunedin, is an aunt of the offender's. It is believed he will make for Melbourne, where he had been before he came to this colony. He is also charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with uttering a forged cheque for £10 (drawn on the Bank of New Zealand, Christchurch, purporting to be signed R. B. Turner in favour of F. Marks) to James Nixon, at Dunedin, on the 20th ultimo. When in Dunedin he wore pepper-and-salt-tweed suit and hard black-felt hat. He is fond of playing billiards and singing Pinafore airs. He frequently expressed a wish to go to Sydney to Richard Thatcher, a friend of his, who keeps an hotel there, but was formerly a theatrical agent. Supposed to have gone to Melbourne or Sydney.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with having indecently exposed his person to Annie McCutchen and Elizabeth Stephenson, aged seven years and six years respectively, in the Cricket-ground, Kensington, near Dunedin, about 1.30 p.m. on the 26th ultimo. Description: About thirty years of age, 5 feet 8 or 9 inches high, very dark complexion, dark hair, beard, whiskers, and moustache; wore dark-tweed suit and soft black-felt hat; looked like a loafer. Identifiable.

FRANCIS DOCHERTY is charged, on warrant issued by the Oamaru Bench, with having committed a breach of "The Debtors and Creditors Act, 1876," at Oamaru, on the 11th August last, by concealing £200 from his creditors. Description: Irish, recently an hotelkeeper in Oamaru, about forty-five years of age, 5 feet 9 inches high, medium build, dark complexion and eyes, sharp features, dark hair, beard, whiskers, and moustache, worn long; usually wears dark-paget coat, grey-tweed trousers, and hard black-felt hat. He left Lyttelton on the 6th ultimo by the steamer "Rotorua" for Melbourne.

JOHN GORDON is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with fraudulent bankruptcy, committed at Dunedin on the 23rd February last, by concealing £300 and a gold watch from his creditors. Description: Scotch, formerly a dairyman at Halfway Bush, fifty-two years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high, medium build, sallow complexion, sharp nose, grey sunken eyes, dark hair, beard, whiskers, and moustache, turning grey; wore brown-mixture tweed coat and vest, bedford-cord trousers, red-and-white-plaid shirt, black-felt hat, and lace-up boots. He was arrested at Dunedin on the 20th ultimo on a charge of drunkenness. A daughter of his lives at Port Chalmers.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with having indecently exposed his person to Elizabeth Mary Munnings and Margaret Ellis, in the Museum, Christchurch, about 3.30 p.m. on the 19th ultimo. Description: About twenty-five years of age,

5 feet 6 or 7 inches high, medium build, small dark-sandy beard, whiskers, and moustache, very red face; wore dark clothes and small hard black hat; carried a walking-stick; respectable appearance. Identification doubtful.

#### Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

ABOUT 3 a.m. on the 18th ultimo Jabez Harrison was assaulted by two men, names unknown, in Worcester Street, Christchurch, and robbed of three half crowns. Description: 1st. About twenty-five years of age, about 5 feet 10 inches high. 2nd. About twenty years of age, about 5 feet 7 inches high. Harrison was under the influence of drink at the time.

JOHN POWELL, arrested by Sergeant Henry Martin, Auckland Police, for stealing a gold watch, &c., from the Temuka Hotel, Temuka, the property of Thomas Joseph Selious, is identical with John Warden, *alias* Gallagher, sentenced at Oamaru on the 1st September, 1869, to fifteen years' penal servitude for wounding with intent to murder. Also a pair of lace-up boots, a pair of elastic-side boots, and a pair of tweed trousers, size 5; the property of David Melrose; value £2 8s. Identifiable.

Suspicion attached to Henry Watson, English, a labourer, twenty-eight years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, slight build, fair complexion, weak eyes, winks frequently, light-brown hair, very little hair on face; supposed to have gone to the Wairarapa.

The jacket was pledged at Cohen's pawn office, Princes Street, by a girl about seventeen years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, fresh complexion; wore dark dress and small black hat. She said the jacket belonged to her mother, Mrs. Stewart, of South Dunedin.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with stealing, on the 18th ultimo, from the Panama Boarding-house, Ashburton, a swag, value £1 10s., since recovered; the property of Alfred Smyth. Description: About forty years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, slight build, fair beard, whiskers, and moustache; wore light-tweed coat and trousers. Identifiable.

STOLEN between 6 p.m. on the 25th and 8 a.m. on the 26th ultimo, from the Post Office and Railway Office at Featherston, a £5 note on the Bank of New Zealand, a £1 note, a small calico bag containing about 13s. in small silver and copper, two second-class railway-tickets, Nos. 9798 and 9799, from Featherston to Wellington, and a second-class return-ticket, No. 249, from Greytown; the property of the Government. Tickets and bag identifiable.

Description: Supposed a German, twenty-three years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high, stout build, very florid complexion, clean-shaven except stiff red moustache; wore new dark-brown cardigan jacket, dark trousers, and billycock hat.

#### CONDITIONS FOR TROUT-FISHING IN MAITAI AND WAIMEA RIVERS, NELSON.

JAMES PRENDERGAST,  
Administrator of the Government.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Provincial District of Nelson:—

#### REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of October, 1881.  
2. Any holder of a license, as hereinafter mentioned, may fish with rod and line for trout in the Maitai and Waimea Rivers, and their affluents, from the 1st day of October, 1881, until the 31st day of March, 1882, but only between the hours of 5 o'clock in the morning and 10 o'clock in the evening.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the said waters will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Nelson Acclimatisation Society, and for every license a fee of ten shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police officer or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water; and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any river or stream within the Provincial District of Nelson; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put thrown, or placed, into any river or stream within the said Provincial District of Nelson, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

#### CONDITIONS FOR TROUT-FISHING IN CANTERBURY.

JAMES PRENDERGAST,  
Administrator of the Government.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for that part of the Provincial District of Canterbury lying to the north of the Rangitata River:—

#### REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the 1st day of October, 1881.

2. Licenses to fish for trout in all the rivers, streams, and lakes in the Provincial District of Canterbury north of the Rangitata River will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Canterbury Acclimatisation Society at Christchurch, and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged; provided that it shall not be obligatory upon the said Secretary to issue a license in case he shall have sufficient good reason for refusing the same.

3. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said rivers, streams, and lakes, from the 1st day of October, 1881, until the 31st day of March, 1882, between the hours of 5 a.m. and 10 p.m. only, but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.

4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with rod and line only, and any person who shall use any ground-bait, or any net (except a landing net), or other engine, instrument, or device, or shall use or employ either of the methods known as "cross-line fishing," or "stroke-hauling," or any other unsportsmanlike device, or shall use as bait salmon-roe or any bait prepared with any chemical or medicated dressing whatever, for taking fish in any of the said rivers, streams, or lakes, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £50; and every such net, or other engine, instrument, or device used contrary to these regulations shall be forfeited.

5. Any person fishing without a license, and any person who shall, on the demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police officer or constable, or of any officer of the said Acclimatisation Society, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, constable, or officer his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

6. Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length taken by any person shall be immediately returned alive into the water from which the same is taken, and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

7. Any person who shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river, stream, or lake in the said Provincial District of Canterbury, any poisonous, deleterious, or noxious material, with intent to destroy any fish therein, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £100.

8. If any person shall be convicted of any offence against these regulations, the convicting Magistrate or Justices may, over and above any penalty inflicted, also declare the license of

the offender to be forfeited, and thereupon his license shall become void.

CONDITIONS FOR TROUT-FISHING IN OTAGO.

ARTHUR GORDON, Governor.

In pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor doth hereby make the following regulations for the District of Otago:—

1. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in all the streams and lakes within and forming the boundaries of the following district (except the Water of Leith), from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, to the thirty first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, both inclusive, viz.:—

All that area in the Provincial District of Otago, bounded on the East and South by the ocean, from Shag Point to the mouth of the Mataura River; on the West, South-west, and South by the Mataura River and the Counties of Southland and Wallace; on the North-west by the ocean; and on the North, North-west, and North-east by the Counties of Westland and Waitaki.

2. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in the Water of Leith, in the months of November, December, January, and February next ensuing.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the above-described district will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Otago Acclimatisation Society at Dunedin, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line, and between the hours of four o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water, and any person convicted of infringing this regulation

shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream within the above-described district, and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said district, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

9. These regulations shall come into force as from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.
