Incendiarism.

ABOUT 9 p.m. on the 27th ultimo an unoccupied four-roomed weatherboard lean-to, at Colombo Road, Knightstown, Christchurch, the property of John Stephens, was maliciously set on fire, but the fire was discovered and extinguished before much damage was done. The building was insured in the Standard office for £50, which is considerably in excess of its value.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

JOHN BEATTIE, charged on warrant with having assaulted and stabbed John Wilson, at Ettrick, is now described as twenty-eight years of age, 5 feet 9½ inches high, stout square build, fresh complexion, downcast look, fair hair, whiskers clipped close or shaved off; dressed in blue-cloth sac-coat, printed-moleskin trousers, soft black-felt hat, and lace-up boots. He came to this colony from Melbourne or Sydney about two years ago, and it is believed he will endeavour to return thither by way of the Bluff, Port Chalmers, or Lyttelton.

FRANK SMITH, *alias* Johnson, is charged, on warrant issued by the Hawera Bench, with having, on the 7th instant, at Hawera, obtained a grey-tweed sac-coat, a white shirt, and a set of plated shirt-studs, value £1 11s., from E. Pulford, by false representations. Description: A native of Wanganui, a labourer, about seventeen years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, pale complexion, brown hair, stoops forward when walking; wore dark-grey sac-coat, trousers, and vest, and soft black-felt hat with left rim turned under. He recently worked for Mr. John Douglas, near Hawera. William Johnson, carpenter, Hill Street, Wanganui, is his father.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with having indecently assaulted Annie Butler, aged eight years, in a railway-wagon near Stuart Street, Dunedin, about 6 p.m. on the 6th instant. Description: Between thirty and forty years of age, about

5 feet 4 or 5 inches high, florid complexion, fair hair, beard, whiskers, and moustache worn full, dirty teeth, some front teeth out; dressed in black-cloth coat and trousers, check shirt and collar, black necktie, hard black-felt hat, and lace-up boots with toe-caps. Identifiable.

A MAORI, who gave the name of F. Williams, is charged with obtaining, on the 28th ultimo, from Robert Stanhope Cooper, at Napier, by false representations, a silver lever hunting watch, large size, maker F. Morrison, Napier, No. 23045; value £9. Identifiable. Description: About thirty years of age, about 5 feet 5 inches high, medium build, speaks very good English. No warrant issued.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

STOLEN between 5 p.m. on the 27th and 8 a.m. on the 28th ultimo, from the store of Messrs. Arthur and Sons, Queen Street, Auckland, a gold chain, small curb-pattern; a silver hunting lever watch, value £10; four plated imitation-gold watches, value £1 5s. each; two open-faced silver Geneva watches, one a stop-watch; four silver Geneva hunting watches, one a duplex; an open-faced gold Geneva watch; an open-faced watch, compensation balance, chain attached; two dozen imitation-gold pins, value 18s.; two men's imitation-gold rings set with stones, value 15s.; a small six-chambered revolver, about 4 inches long, with imitation-coral handle; and about 7s. in copper; value £36 9s. Identification doubtful. All the watches have been worn except the four plated ones.

Stealing Otherwise than from the Person or from Dwellings.

WILLIAM MORGAN is charged, on warrant issued by the To Archa Bench, with stealing, on the 26th December last, at Waitoa, an open-faced silver lever watch; value £4; the property of Thomas Grattan. Identifiable. Description: A Welshman, a bullock-driver, about forty-five years of age, about 5 feet 6 or 7 inches high, black whiskers and moustache turning grey, one or two upper front teeth out, bow-legged, slovenly gait. CONDITIONS FOR TROUT FISHING IN WELLINGTON.

JAMES PRENDERGAST,

Administrator of the Government.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Provincial District of Wellington:—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. Any holder of a license, as hereinafter mentioned, may fish with rod and line, but with artificial flies only as bait, for trout in the River Hutt and its tributaries, except the Pakuratahi, and in the River Wainuomatua, in the Provincial District of Wellington, from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, until the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line as aforesaid in the said rivers and streams will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Acclimatisation Society at Wellington, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line, and such bait as aforesaid.

5. Any person fishing without a license or otherwise than as above, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police

officer or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding eight inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the river or stream, and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. No person shall use any live bait, ground-bait, net, or other engine, instrument, or device for taking any fish in any river or stream within the Provincial District of Wellington; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river or stream in the said Provincial District of Wellington, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

CONDITIONS FOR TROUT FISHING IN THE COUNTIES OF WAIMATE AND GERALDINE.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine:—

REGULATIONS.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

2. Any holder of a license, as hereinafter mentioned, may fish with rod and line for trout in all rivers, streams, and lakes within the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine, from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, until the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, but only between the hours of five o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening.

3. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the said waters will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the South Canterbury Acclimatisation Society, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any police officer or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water; and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

7. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any river, stream, or lake within the Counties of Waimate and Geraldine; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

8. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river, stream, or lake in the said Counties of Waimate and Geraldine, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

CONDITIONS FOR TROUT FISHING IN WAITAKI.

1. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in all the streams and lakes within and forming the boundaries of the County of Waitaki, from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, to the thirty-first

day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, both inclusive.

2. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the above district will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Waitaki Acclimatisation Society at Oamaru, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

3. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line, and between the hours of four o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening.

4. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

5. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive to the water, and any person convicted of infringing this

regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

6. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream within the above district; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said district, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

8. These regulations shall come into force as from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.
