Incendiarism.

On the morning of the 27th September last an unoccupied eleven-roomed building at Tuapeka Mouth, near Lawrence, known as the Old Bridge Hotel, the property of Oliver Dawson, value about £50, was destroyed by fire, which it is believed was wilfully caused. At an inquest held on the 14th ultimo, by E. H. Carew, Esq., R.M. and Coroner, a verdict was returned to the effect that there was no evidence to show how the fire originated. The building was insured in the National Office for £200.

On the morning of the 10th ultimo, Saunders's Buildings, Ashburton, the property of the Bank of New Zealand, were maliciously set on fire, but the fire was discovered and extinguished before much damage was done.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

WILLIAM NEARY is charged with having obtained £2 by false pretences from William Price, at Havelock, Marlborough, on the 15th ultimo. Description: English, a labourer, twenty-six years of age, 5 feet 7½ inches high, stout build, dark complexion and hair, very little hair on face; dressed in light-tweed frock-coat, greyish trousers and vest, greyish guernsey worn over vest, light soft-felt hat with black-velvet band, and watertight boots. Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

Between the 14th and 21st ultimo the whare of William Manes, Upper Selwyn, was broken into, and the following stolen: A pair of elastic-side boots, size 7, about half worn; a pair of light-tweed trousers and vest, size 5, nearly new; a white shirt with gilt studs in sleeves; a double-breasted oil-cloth coat, a hole at back sewn with black thread; a dark-tweed vest, with moleskin back and sleeves, about half worn; a double-breasted dark-brown coat, stain from paint on one side; and a pair of white Kaiapoi flannel drawers, patched at knees; value £4 4s. EXTENDING TIME DURING WHICH IT IS PROHIBITED TO HUNT, CATCH, OR KILL SEALS.

JAMES PRENDERGAST, Administrator of the Government. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this eighteenth day of October, 1881.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is provided by the fifth section of "The Seals Fisheries Protection Act, 1878," that, if he shall think it necessary for the preservation of seals to do so, the Governor may, by Order in Council, extend the time during which it is prohibited to hunt, catch, or kill seals over any term not exceeding three years:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony of New Zealand, and in pursuance of the above-mentioned power, doth hereby extend the time during which it is prohibited to hunt, catch, or kill seals from the first day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

FIXING SITTINGS OF DISTRICT COURT OF WANGANUI.

James Prendergast, Administrator of the Government.

In pursuance and exercise of the power and authority in that behalf enabling me, I, Sir James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby fix and appoint that sittings of the District Court of Wanganui shall be held as follows, in lieu of those previously fixed and appointed:—

In the Courthouse at Wanganui, for the despatch of civil business, on the fourth Monday in the months of January, February, May, July, August, and November; and, for the despatch of civil and criminal business, on the fourth Monday in the months of March, June, and September, and on the second Monday in the month of December, in each year.

In the Courthouse at Palmerston North, for the despatch of civil and criminal business, on the Tuesday before the fourth Monday in the months of March, June, and September, and before the second Monday in the month of December, in each year.

In the Courthouse at Patea, for the despatch of civil and criminal business, on the Monday before the second Thursday in the months of January, April, July, and October, in each year.

Provided that in case any of the days so fixed as aforesaid shall happen to be a holiday, then the Court appointed for that day shall be holden on the first day thereafter not being a holiday.
