### Incendiarism.

ABOUT 10.45 p.m. on the 19th ultimo an unoccupied seven-roomed two-story wooden house in Tuam Street, Christchurch, the property of William John White, was destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was maliciously caused. The house was insured in the Union Office for £300.

On the morning of the 2nd instant, at Winton Plains, Southland, a stable and implement-shed, containing 100 bags of wheat, seven horses, sheep oats, a self-binder, harness, &c., the property of George Crosbie, value about £600, were destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was wilfully caused. The buildings were insured in the New Zealand Office for £150, but the other property was not insured.

### Offences Not Otherwise Described.

DENIS MURPHY, *alias* Leary, is charged, on warrant issued by the Waipawa Bench, with assaulting Constable Frank Schulz, at Ormondville, Hawke's Bay, at 6.30 p.m. on the 7th instant, while in the execution of his duty. Description: Irish, a navy, about thirty years of age, about 5 feet 8 inches high, stout build, dark complexion, dark hair beard whiskers and moustache, broad shoulders; dressed in dark coat, white moleskin trousers, and dark hat. He worked until lately on the Makotoku Railway-line. He went towards Woodville, supposed *en route* for Wellington or Palmerston North.

THE man charged with having obtained £1 19s. 6d. and a drink from Frederick Fox, in the Prince of Wales Hotel, Christchurch, by means of a valueless cheque, is identical with Daniel Mann, recently sentenced at Christchurch to three years' penal servitude for forgery and uttering.

WILLIAM DAVIE, charged on warrant with uttering a forged cheque to Messrs. Coy and Drummond, has been arrested by Constable Robert McClelland, Lyttelton Police, remanded to Timaru, and committed for trial.

ASSER WREN is charged, on warrant issued by the Auckland Bench, with embezzling £3 on the 27th ultimo, at Auckland, the moneys of the Accident Insurance Company. Description: A canvassing clerk, about thirty years of age, about 5 feet 6½ inches high, brown hair and eyes. He was formerly a groom at Hamilton, Waikato, where he was known by the name of Bill. He will likely have the company's receipt-book in his possession. He is supposed to have gone to Te Awamutu.

### Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

BREAKING into the *Otago Daily Times* office, Dunedin, and stealing money: William Jones, *alias* White Horse Bill, is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with this offence. Description: English, a labourer, about twenty years of age, 5 feet 4 inches high, medium build, fresh freckled complexion, dark hair, sandy moustache, blue eyes, large nose; wore grey-tweed coat, moleskin trousers patched on right knee, drab-felt hat with cord and tassel, and black overcoat; carried a blue-blanket swag and tent. Arrest important. It is said that he worked for a butcher in Timaru some time ago. He left Dunedin on the 4th instant, supposed by the northern road. He was sentenced at Timaru on the 22nd November, 1878, to one month's labour for larceny; on the 1st January, 1879, to one month's labour for larceny; and on the 24th March, 1879, to six months' labour for indecent exposure. (See *Police Gazette*, 1879, pages 8, 33, and 170.) His accomplices, James Williamson and William O'Hearn, have been arrested by Detective John Mitchell Walker, Dunedin Police, and remanded.

DANIEL SPENCE is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with stealing, between the 9th and 12th instant, from the dwelling of Thomas Montague, at St. Kilda, a pair of blankets, a pawn-ticket for a watch, and a pawn-ticket for a silver chain, value £6 7s., since recovered. Description: Scotch, a coal-miner, thirty-five years of age but looks younger, 5 feet 7½ inches high, stout build, dark complexion, dark hair, full dark beard whiskers and moustache, moustache clipped; wore light-grey tweed coat, brown-tweed vest with sleeves, old moleskin trousers, white-felt hat, and old cookham boots. He was seen on the South Road on the 12th instant.

## SUSPENDING PART OF PROCLAMATION UNDER "THE ARMS ACT, 1880."

JAMES PRENDERGAST,

## ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this tenth day of July, 1882.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT  
IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, made under "The Arms Act, 1880," it was, among other things, declared that gunpowder of every description, in cartridge or otherwise, should be considered as warlike stores for the purposes of that Act: And whereas the Governor may, by Order in Council, suspend or relax the operation of any of the provisions of this Act, or any part of any such provisions, and either for a limited time or without any limit of time, and either as regards the whole colony or any district thereof, to be defined in any such Order in Council: And whereas it is expedient to suspend so much of the said Proclamation as relates to gunpowder used as blasting powder for mining purposes:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of every power and authority vested in him under the said Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby order that so much of the hereinbefore in part recited Proclamation as includes among warlike stores gunpowder used as blasting powder for mining purposes shall be and the same is hereby suspended; and, in further pursuance of the said power and authority, and with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, doth hereby declare that such suspension shall be without any limit in point of time, and shall extend and apply to the whole colony, and be of a general character.

## NOTICE.

MURDER NEAR DEEP LEAD, VICTORIA.—On the 17th January, 1882, the headless body of a man was found near the Deep Lead Railway-station, Stawell, and at an inquest held subsequently it was shown that the man had been wilfully murdered. The remains are believed to be those of one Charles Forbes or Forbys, who worked on the Dimboola line of railway during the months of October, November, and December, 1881, with a man named Robert Francis Burns. The said Robert Francis Burns has since been arrested, and committed for trial at the Central Criminal Court to be held at Melbourne on the 15th August, 1882, for the murder of Charles Forbes or Forbys; but, as the prisoner alleges that Forbes is still alive, it is requested that the said Charles Forbes or Forbys, if living, or any person acquainted with him, or able to give information about him since the date of his disappearance, should at once communicate with the Chief Commissioner of Police, Melbourne. Description of the missing man, Charles Forbes, is as follows: About forty years of age, 5 feet 10½ or 11 inches high, 14 stone weight, full sandy beard, and hair a shade darker. DEEP LEAD MURDER.—The photograph of the supposed murdered man has been identified by a Mr. Whitaker, contractor, Coleraine, who states that Charles Forbes was in his employment a long time, and left about three years ago for Narracoorte, South Australia, in company with two men named Christy Joyce and Kerry Jack. Forbes was better known about Coleraine as "Blathering Charlie," and had a large scar on the upper lip, supposed right side. Nothing has been seen of him since he left Mr. Whitaker's. Kerry Jack had a set of false teeth.—O. 582.—5th June, 1882.
