They must be of police interest, or no notice will be taken of them. Officers in charge of districts are requested to report to the Commissioner the non-delivery of the Gazette, and to suggest from time to time such alterations in the addresses and in the mode of transmission as may be considered necessary

CRIME REPORTS.—A copy of each crime report should be immediately forwarded to the Commissioner's office for

Gazette purposes.

Warrants:—All reports of crime must state whether a warrant has been issued for the arrest of the offender, and by whom and where. Should a warrant not have been issued in the first instance, but one be subsequently obtained, a supplementary report announcing the issue must be immediately forwarded to all places where the original report has been The supplementary report should give the date of the original crime report, or quote the date and page of the Police Gazette in which the previous notice has appeared. Persons reporting crimes should be requested to obtain

offenders should be accurately described; their native country, usual occupation, and every particular likely to lead to their arrest and identification minutely given.

Names.—It is particularly requested that in all crime

reports the names of persons and places may be spelt cor-rectly and written legibly, the Christian name being given with the surname whenever possible, and written in full to prevent mistakes.

STRAY CATTLE.—No advertisement of lost horses or cattle will be published in this Gazette unless they be Government property; but notices of horses or cattle believed to be stolen

will be inserted.

Property Described.—The age, height, breed, colour, particular marks, value, &c., of horses should be given, and the brands imitated as nearly as possible, and their exact position stated. Cattle should also be carefully described. In forwarding the brands of horses and cattle per telegram, it should be stated of what kind of letters the brands consist, whether of Roman capitals or in writing. In describing watches, it should be stated whether they are open-faced, watenes, it should be stated whether they are open-raced, hunting, double-cased, or half-hunting, the term "double cased" being reserved for those watches whose outer case is removed in order to wind, "half-hunting" implying a very small glass in the metal cover of the dial. All property

should be described as minutely as possible.

Previous References.—It is requested that, in all reports respecting cases gazetted, members of the Force will be good enough to quote the date and page of the Police Gazette in

of districts will be held responsible for the proper circulation of reports relating to crime committed in their respective Where there is reason to believe that the offender districts. Where there is reason to believe that the oliender is proceeding towards any particular part of the colony, the police of the district in which the crime was committed should report the fact to the police of that place with the least possible delay. They should also communicate without delay with the police of any part of the colony from which it is thought probable that important information regarding any of sular can be obtained. any offender can be obtained.

When the member of the Force in charge of a station considers it necessary, so as to insure the speedy arrest of offenders or the recovery of stolen property, &c., to forward crime reports or supplementary crime reports direct to the Commissioner's office, it should be distinctly stated on the one forwarded to the officer in charge of the district that a copy has been supplied to the Commissioner's office; otherwise duplicates may be received, and, being mistaken for

originals, may cause confusion.

The arrest of offenders described in the Police Gazette, or respecting whom crime reports have been forwarded for insertion in the Gazette, should be promptly notified.

When notifying the arrest of persons charged with larceny, or suspected of larceny, it should be stated whether the property stolen, or any portion of it, has been recovered.

A description of property, supposed to be stolen, found in the possession of offenders, for which owners cannot be found,

should be furnished for insertion in the Gazette.

REWARDS.—No notice of reward offered by any private person or persons will be inserted in the *Police Gazette* unless there be forwarded to the Commissioner's office the guarantee of some responsible person that the reward shall be payable to the person who performs the service for which it is offered. If such notice be communicated by telegraph, the addition of the words "Guarantee received" will be sufficient; in such case, however, the guarantee must be forwarded to the Commissioner's office without delay.

In reporting the arrest of offenders, the recovery of property, or otherwise referring to anything notified in the Otago or Canterbury Police Gazette, the date and page in

which the previous notice appeared should be given.

WHEREAS by the seventeenth section of "The Licensing Act, 1881," it is enacted that the Governor, by Order in Council, may from time to time alter the limits of any Native licensing districts or abolish the same: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the Native Licensing District of Upper Wanganui, and to constitute another district in lieu thereof:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of all powers enabling him in this behalf, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, doth hereby abolish, from and after the first day of February next, the said Native Licensing District of Upper Wanganui, and doth constitute and define the portion of the colony mentioned and described in the Schedule hereto to be a Native licensing district from and after the said first day of February next.

SCHEDULE.

UPPER WANGANUI.

Bounded towards the North by a right line due east from the summit of Mount Egmont to the summit of the watershed between the Wanganui and the Mangawhero Rivers; thence towards the East by that summit to the northern boundary of the Karewarewa Block; thence by that block to the Upokongaro Stream, and by that stream to the northeastern boundary-line of Section No. 281, Block XIV., Waipakura Survey District; thence towards the South-west generally by that section and Sections Nos. 282 and 174 of said Block XIV. to the Wanganui River; thence across that river to the north-eastern corner of Section No. 203, Block XIII., said Waipakura Survey District, and by that section and Sections Nos. 191, 208, and 130 to the Kai-iwi Stream; thence by that stream to its confluence with the Mangaone Stream; thence by the Kai-iwi Native Block and Sections Nos. 12, 76, 9, 8, and 5, and Native Reserve No. 2, Pakaraka, all of Block X., Nukumaru Survey District, and Section No. 4, and Native Reserve (Auroa), Block IX., said Nukumaru Survey District, to the Waitotara River; thence towards the South-east by that river to the ocean; thence again towards the South-west by the ocean to the Kaupokonui River; and thence towards the West by a right line to the summit of Mount Egmont aforesaid, the place of commencement: exclusive of the Boroughs of Hawera and Patea, and the Town Districts of Waverley, Normanby, Manaia, and Stratford.
