Incendiarism.

DURING the night of the 14th ultimo, at Wrey's Bush, Southland, two stacks of wheat, the property of Thomas Murphy, were maliciously set on fire, by which they were destroyed. The stacks were insured in the Equitable Office for £60.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

WILLIAM WENLOCK is charged, on warrant issued by the Auckland Bench, with having, on or about the 5th September, 1883, at Auckland, embezzled £2 12s., the money of J. W. Nichol, by whom he was employed as travelling agent for the Singer Manufacturing Company. Description: English, a clerk, about thirty years of age, 5 feet 8 inches high, slight build, fair complexion, bright sunken eyes, dark-brown hair; when last seen was clean-shaved except brown moustache, solemn appearance. He is supposed to be in Christchurch, and is said to be a member of the Salvation Army.

JOHN THOMAS, *alias* William Jackson, arrested by Constable William Lawler, Christchurch Police, for uttering a forged cheque to Messrs. Kincaid and Marriott, is identical with William Jackson, *alias* Michael Hanlon, charged with uttering forged cheques to Patrick Croft and others, at Oamaru and Livingstone. He was sentenced on the 9th ultimo, at the Supreme Court, Oamaru, to eight years' penal servitude for the offences committed at Oamaru and Livingstone. His real name is Joseph Cullen, and he is identical with Joseph Cullen, *alias* James Anderson, sentenced at Dunedin, on the 15th August, 1882, to six months' labour for false pretences. JAMES PEACOCK is charged with having obtained on the 26th ultimo, at Mercury Bay, the sum of 5s. from Thomas Carina, by means of a valueless cheque for £2 drawn on the Bank of New Zealand, Coromandel. Description: A native of England, about forty years of age, 5 feet 9 inches high, slight build, dark-brown hair beard whiskers and moustache; wore dark-brown-tweed sac-coat and vest, and hard felt hat; gentlemanly appearance. He tendered the cheque

to Mr. Carina in payment for liquors and a bed, and received 5s. change. No warrant issued in the case.

THOMAS GIBSON is charged, on warrant issued by the Wellington Bench, with having, on the 16th February last, at Petone, forged the name of F. McLeod to a receipt for £27 17s. 4d., with intent to defraud the Petone Town District Board, by whom he was employed as clerk, treasurer, and collector. Description: A native of Scotland, a veterinary surgeon and clerk, about thirty-six years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, dark complexion, dark hair beard whiskers and moustache; generally wears dark-tweed paget-suit and hard black-felt hat; smart active appearance and good address, speaks with a strong Scotch accent. He is fond of drink, and when under its influence is inclined to be noisy. He is also charged, on warrant issued by the Wellington Bench, with having, on the 15th May last, at Petone, forged an acceptance and receipt for £10 1s., also with intent to defraud the Petone Town District Board. There are several other charges pending against him. He was seen in Wellington on the 3rd instant. He will likely endeavour to leave the colony.

ON the 26th ultimo, at Ruapekapeka, Auckland District, a horse, value £10, the property of Whaturau, was maliciously shot dead with a bullet.

FRANCIS TUKE, charged on warrant with having uttered a forged cheque to Thomas Harrison, at Dunedin, left Port Chalmers on the 7th instant, by the barque "Mountain Laurel," for Auckland.

ON the 5th instant, at Winton, a stone was maliciously thrown through the window of a house, the property of John E. Black, damaging it to the extent of 2s.

ABOUT the night of the 8th ultimo, at Hoteo North, Auckland District, a horse, the property of James T. Pain, was taken from his farm to a bush two miles away, tied to a tree, and maliciously wounded on each side, supposed with a knife, and a charge of shot fired into both wounds. The horse was tied to the tree for three days and nights. A reward of £10 is guaranteed on conviction of the offender. A resident of the district is suspected.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

THE warrant issued by the Wellington Bench for the arrest of Henry Davis, for refusing to provide for the support of his illegitimate child by Mary Jane Wickham, has been withdrawn. The child is dead.

HENRY POPPLETON is charged with absconding from the Caversham Industrial School on the 26th ultimo. Description: About thirteen years of age, ruddy complexion, hardy appearance; dressed in check-moleskin suit. His parents live in High Street, Dunedin.

ASH OLIVER is charged, on warrant issued by the Christchurch Bench, with failing, since the 29th July last, at St. Albans, to provide for the support of his illegitimate male child by Eliza Alice Perryman. Description: A carpenter, twenty-three years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, slight build, pale complexion, thin sharp face, small dark whiskers and moustache; dressed in grey-tweed suit.

Deserters from Merchant Vessels.

MICHAEL DOGHERTY is charged with deserting from the ship "Nelson," at Port Chalmers, on the 27th or 28th ultimo. Description: Irish, an able seaman, twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 9 inches high, stout build, dark fresh complexion, dark-blue eyes, dark-brown hair worn short, clean-shaved, slightly pockpitted; wore shabby black-cloth suit and black wideawake hat. He was seen in Dunedin on the 28th ultimo. A reward of £2 is offered for his arrest if effected on or before the 1st proximo.

DANIEL ELLIOTT and George Leishman are charged with deserting from the steamer "Elderslie," at Oamaru, on the 27th ultimo. Description: Elliott is a native of the North of England, a stoker, about thirty-six years of age, 5 feet 3 or 4 inches high, medium build, reddish hair, clean-shaved except reddish moustache; may be dressed in a dark coat and dark-grey-tweed or dark-moleskin trousers. Leishman is English, a fireman, twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, slight build, dark hair beard whiskers and moustache worn rather short; may be wearing a new dark-tweed sac-coat and light-tweed trousers.

JOSEPH JEFFRIES and August Leinstrum are charged with deserting from the steamer "Elderslie," at Oamaru, on the 5th and 6th instant. Description: Jeffries is English, thirty-five years of age, 5 feet 8 inches high, medium build, very dark beard and moustache, cheeks shaved, right hand injured; wore long black coat, black trousers, and hard black-felt hat. Leinstrum is a German, twenty-seven years of age, 5 feet high, medium build, fair hair and complexion, very small blue eyes.

HUGH LINDSAY, George May, and Peter Schonebergen are charged, on warrants issued by the Wellington Bench, with deserting from the barque "Glenmore," at Wellington, during the night of the 12th instant. Description: Lindsay is an Irishman, an ordinary seaman, twenty-one years of age, about 5 feet 10 inches high, slight build, fair complexion, fair hair, no hair on face; usually wears grey-tweed suit. May is a negro, an able seaman, thirty-five years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, black curly hair beard whiskers and moustache; usually wears blue-cloth suit and hard felt hat. Schonebergen is a German, an able seaman, twenty-eight years of age, 5 feet 5 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, fair hair beard whiskers and moustache. A reward of £2 each is offered for their arrest.

WILLIAM TAITE, Denis Campbell, Charles Perks, and John Novis, able seamen, are charged, on warrants issued by the Wellington Bench, with deserting from the barque "Brisbane," at Wellington, during the nights of the 9th, 12th, and 13th instant. Description: Taite is Scotch, thirty-two years of age, about 6 feet high, medium build, dark complexion, dark hair, clean-shaved except dark moustache and goatee. Campbell is Scotch, twenty-three years of age, 5 feet 8 inches high, stout build, fair complexion and hair, clean-shaved except fair moustache. Perks is Scotch, twenty-two years of age, 5 feet 9 inches high, medium build, fair complexion and hair, no hair on face. Novis is English, twenty years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, dark complexion and hair, clean-shaved. A reward of £3 each is offered for their arrest.

Escaped Lunatic.

Description: A native of Ireland, about forty years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, dark complexion, brown hair beard whiskers and moustache turning grey; dressed in shabby light-tweed coat, moleskin trousers, white shabby billycock hat, and blucher boots. His coat, trousers, and shirt are marked "M2" on back.

Her sister Ellen left England for this colony in February, 1880, by the ship "Geraldine Paget," and has since married. T. H. Bellamore, who was employed in the Telegraph Office, Wellington, in 1880, is her half-brother. She is inquired for at the instance of Mrs. Gibbons, 30, Lupus Street, S.W., London, and the Poplars, Battle Road, St. Leonards-on-Sea.

INFORMATION is requested respecting Thomas Henry Morrison, believed to be a native of Hokitika, who deserted his wife and children, at Sydney, about five or six years ago, and came to this colony. His wife followed him here, where she found him living in some town, the name of which is not known, with another woman as his wife. She then returned to Sydney, where she recently died, leaving two children unprovided for. He is inquired for so that proceedings may be taken against him for the support of the children.

INFORMATION is requested respecting John Bain, a native of the colony, sixteen years of age, 5 feet 2 inches high, fair complexion, very weak eyes, large mouth, fair hair; wore grey-tweed sac-coat and vest, blue-serve trousers, white soft felt hat, and blucher boots. Conditions for Trout-fishing in Nelson.

WM. F. DRUMMOND JERVOIS,
 Governor.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Provincial District of Nelson:—

1. Any holder of a license as hereinafter mentioned may fish with rod and line for trout in each river or stream in the Provincial District of Nelson which flows into Blind Bay, from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, both inclusive, but only between the hours of five o'clock in the morning and ten o'clock in the evening.

2. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the said waters will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Nelson Acclimatisation Society, at Nelson, and for every license a fee of ten shillings will be charged.

3. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

4. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall, on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

5. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive into the water; and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

6. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream within the above district; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said district, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

8. These regulations shall come into force as from the date hereof.

Conditions for Trout Fishing in North Canterbury.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for that part of the Provincial District of Canterbury lying to the north of the Rangitata River:—

1. These regulations shall come into force from the date of the publication thereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

2. Licenses to fish for trout in all the rivers, streams, and lakes in the Provincial District of Canterbury north of the Rangitata River will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Canterbury Acclimatisation Society, at Christchurch, and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged: Provided it shall not be obligatory upon the said Secretary to issue a license.

3. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said rivers, streams, and lakes from the fifteenth day of October in any year until the fifteenth day of April in the year following inclusive, between the hours of five a.m. and ten p.m. only, but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent; and any person fishing or attempting to fish or take any salmon or trout except during the above-mentioned period shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with one rod and line, and with the bait or devices authorized by these regulations only; and any person who shall use any ground-bait, or any net (except a landing-net) or other engine, instrument, or device not expressly authorized by these regulations, or shall use or employ either of the methods known as "cross-line fishing" or "stroke-hauling," or any other unsportsmanlike device, or shall use as bait salmon-roe, fish-roe, or any bait prepared with any chemical or medicated dressing whatever, for taking fish in any of the said rivers, streams, or lakes, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds; and every such net or other engine, instrument, or device used contrary to these regulations shall be forfeited.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on the demand of any ranger, constable, or officer of the Acclimatisation Society, fail to produce and show to such ranger, officer, or constable his license, or the contents of his creel or bag, or the bait used by him for taking fish, or any person who shall on demand of a person holding and showing a license fail to produce and show to such person the license (if any) held by him, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. No person shall use or fish with or place on any hook or other device used for taking trout any bait of any kind or description whatever, except the following: Natural and artificial fly, natural and artificial minnow, silveries, beetles, grasshoppers, spiders, caterpillars, the larvae of the caddisfly and worm. Any person found infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length, taken by any person, shall be immediately returned alive into the water from which the same is taken; and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

8. Any person who shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river, stream, or lake in the said Provincial District of Canterbury, any poisonous, deleterious, or noxious material, with intent to destroy any fish therein, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

9. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale, or shall fish for the purpose of obtaining, any salmon, trout, perch, or tench, in order to make sale of the same or any part thereof for a period of two years from the date of the publication of these regulations in the *New Zealand Gazette*;

and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

10. If any person shall be convicted of any offence against these regulations the license of the offender shall thereupon become void.

1. Any holder of a license may fish with rod and line for trout in all the streams and lakes within and forming the boundaries of the County of Waitaki from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, both inclusive.

2. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the above district will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Waitaki County Acclimatisation Society, at Oamaru, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

3. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

4. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall, on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

5. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length taken by any person fishing as aforesaid shall be immediately returned alive into the water, and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

6. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream within the above district; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Any person who puts, throws, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said district, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

8. These regulations shall come into force as from the date hereof.

Condition for Trout-fishing in Southland.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the District of Southland:—

1. Any holder of a license as hereinafter mentioned may fish with rod and line for trout in the Orawia, Oreti, Makarewa, Otamita, Eyre, and Mataura Rivers, and their tributaries, from the fifteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, both inclusive.

2. Licenses to fish with rod and line in the said rivers and streams will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Acclimatisation Society, at Invercargill, and for every license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged.

3. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that only with rod and line.

4. Any person fishing without a license, or otherwise than as above, or any person who shall, on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

5. All trout not exceeding seven inches in length, taken by any person fishing as aforesaid, shall be immediately returned alive to the river or stream; and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, and his license shall thereupon become void.

6. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any lake, river, or stream in the Counties of Fiord and Wallace, and of Southland to the west of the Mataura River; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Any person who puts, throws, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any lake, river, or stream in the said counties, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

8. These regulations shall come into force as from the date hereof.

Conditions for Trout Fishing in South Canterbury.

IN pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for that part of the Provincial District of Canterbury lying to the south of the Rangitata River:—

1. These regulations shall come into force from the date of the publication thereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*,

2. Licenses to fish for trout in all the rivers, streams, and lakes in the Provincial District of Canterbury south of the Rangitata River will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the South Canterbury Acclimatisation Society, at Timaru, and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged: Provided that it shall not be obligatory upon the said Secretary to issue a license.

3. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said rivers, streams, and lakes from the fifteenth day of October in any year until the fifteenth day of April in the year following inclusive, between the hours of five a.m. and ten p.m. only, but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent; and any person fishing or attempting to fish or take any salmon or trout except during the above-mentioned period shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with one rod and line, and with the bait or devices authorized by these regulations only; and any person who shall use any ground-bait, or any net (except a landing-net) or other engine, instrument, or device not expressly authorized by these regulations, or shall use or employ either of the methods known as "cross-line fishing" or "stroke-hauling," or any other unsportsmanlike device, or shall use as bait salmon-roe, fish-roe, or any bait prepared with any chemical or medicated dressing whatever, for taking fish in any of the said rivers, streams, or lakes, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds; and every such net or other engine, instrument, or device used contrary to these regulations shall be forfeited.

5. Any person fishing without a license, or any person who shall on the demand of any ranger, constable, or officer of the Acclimatisation Society, fail to produce and show to such ranger, officer, or constable his license, or the contents of his creel or bag, or the bait used by him for taking fish, or any person who shall on demand of a person holding and showing a license fail to produce and show to such person the license (if any) held by him, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. No person shall use or fish with or place on any hook or other device used for taking trout any bait of any kind or description whatever, except the following: Natural and artificial fly, natural and artificial minnow, silveries, beetles, grasshoppers, spiders, caterpillars, the larvæ of the cadisfly and worm. Any person found infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

7. Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length, taken by any person, shall be immediately returned alive into the water from which the same is taken; and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

8. Any person who shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river, stream, or lake in the said Provincial District of Canterbury, any poisonous, deleterious, or noxious material, with intent to destroy any fish therein, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

9. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale, or shall fish for the purpose of obtaining, any salmon, trout, perch, or tench, in order to make sale of the same or any part thereof, for a period of two years from the date of the publication of these regulations in the *New Zealand Gazette*; and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

10. If any person shall be convicted of any offence against these regulations the license of the offender shall thereupon become void.

Extracts from Victoria Police Gazette.

MURDER.—About 5 o'clock on the morning of the 30th August last the body of An Goon, keeper of a Chinese store and cookshop, was found dead, but still warm, in his bedroom, at No. 78, Little Bourke Street East, with a jagged and a punctured wound on the right cheek, some scratches on the neck, and a contused wound on the left side of the head over the ear. The post-mortem examination showed that the cause of death was suffocation. It has been ascertained that £68 11s. cash, and the following articles, were stolen that morning from a box in his bedroom: A small oval-shaped gold nugget, about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in length, a bend in one side with a little sand in it; a gold ring, with a plain band in the centre and a twisted rope-pattern band on each side, the maker's name in Chinese inside; a gold ring, with a plain broad band about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide; a gold wedding-ring, the same maker's name in Chinese inside; a gold-

nugget breast-pin, triangle shape.—O. 5308, 3rd September, 1884.

AN GOON, MURDER OF.—A gold ring, which had been left by another Chinaman with the deceased a few days before his death, was pledged at Rosenwax's, Stephen Street, Melbourne, on the night of the 4th instant, by a Chinaman, who gave the name of Ah Ping. He is about twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 4 inches high, medium build, smooth face, rather good-looking, like a mechanic, speaks English well enough to be understood. He cannot be found in Little Bourke Street. Special inquiry is requested in the suburbs and country towns. If found he should be searched for the pawn ticket, and also for the articles stolen from the deceased. He also offered in pledge a ladies' dress-ring set with four or five stones of no value, and a small piece of a broken gold ring, but the pawnbroker declined to take them. The following property is said to have been in the possession of the deceased prior to the murder, and every exertion must be made to trace it: A ladies' gold open-face keyless watch, flowered on back; a small gold nugget, oval shape, about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch long, bend in one side, with a little sand in it; a gold ring, plain band in centre, a twisted rope-pattern band on each side, maker's name in Chinese inside; a gold wedding ring, same name inside; a gold ring, plain broad band, about $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide; a gold-nugget breast-pin, triangle shape; a ladies' gold albert, narrow flat links, believed curb pattern; a gold nugget, about 4dwt., triangular shape, small hole in one point for ring; a red-and-white stone, with hole in it, carved on one side like a frog, and a fish with tail broken off on the other. In addition to the articles previously reported, it has been ascertained that deceased had in his possession at the time of the murder a brown-cameo brooch, oval shape, a female head and neck with curls, about $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches by $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches, figure of a bird flying to the left at top, a hook for a pendant at bottom, small leaves or rosettes all round the frame, about five on each side and one at bottom, the head faces to the right.—O. 5308, 16th September, 1884.

MURDER IN LITTLE BOURKE STREET EAST, MELBOURNE.—£400 REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.—Whereas on the morning of Saturday, the 30th August last, a Chinaman, named Chin Yin Goong, was found murdered in his house in Little Bourke Street East, Melbourne: And whereas the Chinese have offered a reward of £200 in the matter: Notice is hereby given that a reward of £200 (supplemental to that offered by the Chinese) will be paid by the Government for such information as will lead to the conviction of the person or persons who committed the murder aforesaid. RE MURDER OF MARIA COOK AND HER INFANT DAUGHTER, NEAR EDENHOPE.—A warrant has been issued by the Hamilton Bench for the arrest of Robert Cook on a charge of having murdered Maria Cook and Louisa Jane Sugers Langley. It is doubtful whether the description previously given of Robert Cook is correct, there being a difference of opinion as to whether he walked lame or not. People who knew him well, and can be best relied on, say he had a peculiar stiff way of walking, and was in the habit of throwing one shoulder back, and was tattooed on one arm. The wagon he left Mount Gambier in was a light American with four wheels, and had a canvas cover.—O. 4481, 13th September, 1884.

It is reported that Robert Cook was working as a bullock-driver, on Wilcannia Station, on the Murray, as late as October, 1883.—O. 4481, 20th September, 1884.

MURDER ON THE MARYVALE STATION, NEAR EDENHOPE.—£100 REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN ACCOMPLICE.—Whereas on Saturday, the 21st day of June last, the skeletons of an adult and child were found under some brushwood on the Maryvale Station, near Edenhope: And whereas at an inquest held on the remains on Tuesday, the 19th August last, the jury returned the following verdict, viz.: "That we are unanimously of opinion that the remains produced are those of Maria Cook and her child, Louisa Jane Sugers. We are also agreed that the said Maria Cook and Louisa Jane Sugers were feloniously murdered by some person or persons unknown in or about the month of March, 1874, at the spot in the Maryvale Station, near Edenhope, where the remains were found. We also wish to add that, on account of the grave suspicion that attaches to Robert Cook, the husband of the said Maria Cook, the Government offer a reward for any information concerning his whereabouts if alive, or for proof of his death." And whereas a warrant has been issued against the said Robert Cook, charging him with having committed the crime: Notice is hereby given that a reward

of one hundred pounds will be paid by the Government for such information as will lead to the apprehension and conviction of the said Robert Cook on the charge aforesaid; and, further, that His Excellency the Governor will extend Her Majesty's free pardon to any person giving the required information, provided such informant did not actually commit the murder aforesaid.—GRAHAM BERRY, Chief Secretary.—Chief Secretary's Office, Melbourne, 18th September, 1884.

PARTICULARS RELATING TO ROBERT COOK.—Robert Cook is a native of Holbeach, near Gedney, Lincolnshire, England. He arrived in Adelaide about the year 1865 or 1866, and subsequently worked on stations about Mount Gambier, the Darling, Swan Hill, and Nhill. About the year 1870 he was employed on Tintandra Station, about ten miles from Swan Hill, the then owner being Mr. Beveridge. When he left

Mount Gambier, with his wife and child above referred to, he had with him a brown horse branded L on near shoulder, two hind feet white, and a light-coloured four-wheel American wagon with canvas cover. Cook is described as being about thirty-six years of age, about 5 feet 4 or 5 inches high, medium build, dark sallow complexion, black straight hair, dark-brown eyes, medium nose inclined to be thick at the point, rather small round features, and when last seen had a full black beard whiskers and moustache. He is said to have a scar-mark over one eye, is supposed to walk rather stiffly from an injury to one hip, and is also supposed to bear a tattoo-mark on one arm. When he left Mount Gambier he could not write, and it is doubtful whether he could read. He generally had a double-barrelled gun and a dog, and was very fond of shooting.
