Incendiarism.

ABOUT 10 p.m. on the 9th ultimo a six-roomed wooden house, at Kaikoura, Marlborough District, the property of John and Jeremiah Harnett, was, with contents, destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was maliciously caused. The property was insured in the New Zealand Office for £300. About 10 p.m. on the following night a barn and stable, also the property of John and Jeremiah Harnett, were destroyed by fire, supposed maliciously caused. The barn and stable were not insured, but the sum for which the house and contents were insured will cover the value of all the property destroyed.

JOHN CHRISTOPHER CUFF, charged on warrant with uttering a forged promissory note to John Orson McArdell, at Invercargill, and who escaped from the custody of Constable Thomas Whitty, at Waiau, has been arrested by Detective Robert R. Jones, Christchurch Police.

JOHN WILLIAM WENTWORTH is charged, on warrant issued by the Invercargill Bench, with having, about the 5th January last, at Invercargill, obtained £55 from Max Bulling by false pretences. Description: English, a farmer and contractor, thirty-one years of age, about 5 feet 7 inches high, very stout build, fair fresh complexion, brown hair, clean-shaved except small dark moustache and goatee; dressed in blue- serge suit and black hard hat with leaf drawn down over eyes; carries a black walking-stick. He was seen at Invercargill on the 4th instant. He is well known at Ashburton and Christchurch.

EDWARD LARKINS is charged, on warrant issued at Queensland, with embezzling £2 14s. 4d. and other amounts; the property of the Graziers' Butchery Company, Towonga. Description: A native of Ipswich, Queensland, about twenty years of age, 5 feet 4 inches high, slight build, sallow complexion, thin face, small features, jaws full at back of head, prominent ears, black hair, no beard, quiet manner. It is supposed he left Queensland on the 7th instant by steamer for this colony. His arrest is very desirable.

ON the 26th ultimo, supposed between Balclutha and Dunedin, one of the leather cushions in a first-class railway carriage, the property of the Government, was maliciously cut and damaged to the value of about 15s.

JOHN VICKERY, *alias* Bennett, *alias* Brown, is charged, on warrant issued by the Auckland Bench, with having, on the 25th ultimo, at Auckland, endeavoured to obtain £65 from Samuel Cohen by false pretences. Description: Supposed English, forty years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high, strong build, dark complexion, dark hair, clean-shaven; wore grey-tweed suit and black dress hat; gentlemanly address and appearance. He lately arrived from Sydney. He left Auckland on the 26th ultimo by the steamer "Wairarapa" for southern ports, accompanied by his wife, who is about twenty-four years of age, medium height, slight build, dark hair and eyes.

OSWALD A. HERZOG is charged, on warrant issued by the Auckland Bench, with having, on the 2nd instant, at Auckland, defrauded the Colonial Insurance Company of £150. Description: A German, a cabinetmaker, thirty-four years of age, about 5 feet 9 inches high, fair complexion, light hair, full light beard whiskers and moustache, but may have shaved; good address, speaks English well; wears dark clothes, black hard hat, and blue-silk tie in gold scarf-ring, sometimes wears a heavy gold ring with large crown stone. He left Onehunga on the 8th instant by the steamer "Penguin" for Wellington. He has in his possession fifteen £10 Bank of New Zealand notes. It is said that a man answering his description left the steamer at New Plymouth.

C. A. ROSS is charged, on warrant issued by the Leeston Bench, with having, on the 19th or 20th January last, at Selwyn, obtained £1 from William Blacklor by means of a valueless cheque. Description: Supposed Scotch, a commercial traveller, about twenty-two years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, slight build, fair complexion, light-blue eyes, fair hair, very small fair beard whiskers and moustache; wore light-grey tweed suit and grey-tweed hat. He is also charged with having uttered valueless cheques at Dunedin and Invercargill. (See *Police Gazette*, 1885, page 25.) He was dismissed from the Telegraph Department at Dunsandel, Canterbury District, about a year ago. He has a brother a railway stationmaster at Wyndham, Southland District.

BETWEEN the 16th and 26th ultimo about sixty panes of glass, value £3, were maliciously broken in the workshop of William Henry Potter, Liddle Street, Invercargill.

BETWEEN the 6th and 8th instant three panes of glass, value £1 5s., were maliciously broken in an unoccupied house at Silverstream, South Canterbury; the property of William Henry Smith.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

CHARLES WRIGHT is charged, on warrant issued by the Wellington Bench, with stealing £11 in silver, on the 11th instant, from the dwelling of Arthur Gadsby, at Taita. De-

scription: English, a cook, about twenty-one years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, dark hair and complexion, clean-shaved except small side whiskers and moustache; when last seen was dressed in blue-serge coat and vest, tweed trousers, and blue stitched hat.

JOHN FITZGIBBONS is charged, on warrant issued by the Hamilton Bench, with stealing, between the 5th and 28th ultimo, from the Tamahere Hotel, Tamahere, a round gold locket, value £1 10s., since recovered; the property of James T. Camp. Description: Irish, a tailor, forty-one years of age, 5 feet 5 inches high, sallow complexion, brown hair and eyes, marks of corporal punishment on back. (See *Police Gazette*, 1884, page 126.) He sold the locket at Te Aroha, where he left on the 27th ultimo, saying that he was going to the Thames.

A WOMAN, name unknown, is charged with stealing, on the 26th ultimo, from the shop of Mary Ann Woodward, Colombo Street, Christchurch, a satin mantle, draped, pink azaleas worked on it with silk thread; value £1 8s. Identifiable. Description: Supposed English, about twenty-one years of age, about 5 feet 3 inches high, medium build, pale complexion; wore brown ulster and black-fur cape. Identifiable.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with having, at 8 p.m. on the 7th instant, assaulted and robbed Maude Goodhue in her house, at Marton, of a common black-leather purse with steel clasp, one compartment, considerably worn inside, containing 17s. in silver. He is also charged with stealing, at the same time, from the house, a £5 note, TR marked on back, eleven £1 notes, and seven sovereigns. Purse and £5 note identifiable. Description: English, about twenty-nine years of age, about 5 feet 9 inches high, medium build, sharp features, rather fresh complexion, prominent forehead, dark-brown beard whiskers and moustache, when speaking squints with both eyes, nail of middle finger of left hand crushed or deformed and nail beginning to grow, hair beginning to fall off front of head; wore dark-tweed coat and trousers and hard felt hat; did not look like a labourer. Identifiable.

SUPPOSED stolen on the 2nd or 3rd instant, from the person of Frank Wylie, while drunk, at Invercargill, an English silver lever hunting-watch, maker Charles Freeman, No. 364791, hair guard attached; value £5. Identifiable.

BETWEEN 6.30 p.m. on the 9th and 8 a.m. on the 10th instant the store of Edmund Alfred Field, Cumberland Street, Dunedin, was broken into, and a shoe-horn, value 6d., stolen. Identifiable.

STOLEN about the end of January or early in February last, from the hut of Peter Martin, Humphrey's Gully, Westland, a new silver albert guard, pattern long links connected by small links in the shape of a knot, a silver-mounted greenstone pendant attached; value £1 15s. Identifiable. Suspicion attached to John Wesley, English or Scotch, a labourer, between twenty-six and thirty years of age, 5 feet 4 or 5 inches high, medium build, thin features, fair hair, small fair beard and moustache, chin shaved; wore dark-tweed clothes. He has left Humphrey's Gully.

STOLEN on the 2nd instant, from a till in the bar of the Commercial Hotel, George Street, Port Chalmers, a cheque for £3 2s. on the National Bank, North Dunedin, drawn by D. J. Bacon, payable to a number; a £1 note, and about £3 in silver; the property of Edwin Rubin Bolton. Cheque identifiable.

STOLEN between the 15th January last and the 1st instant, from a bedroom in Werry's boardinghouse, Timaru, a nearly-new open-faced silver lever watch, No. 84153, maker's name not known; the property of Andrew Lawrence; value £7. Identifiable. Suspicion attached to Cora Lewis, *alias* Dora Lewson, who was staying in the house at the time. (For her description, &c., see *Police Gazette*, 1884, page 147.) She was sentenced at Timaru on the 14th ultimo to two months' labour on two charges of larceny.

STOLEN on the 1st instant, from the dwelling of Samuel Jacobs, South Town Belt, Christchurch, a small round box containing a gold brooch set with pearls, a gold ring set with pearls and garnets, and two pairs of gold earrings with coral drops. Identifiable.

STOLEN between 8 p.m. on the 27th and 1 a.m. on the 28th ultimo, from the person of John McCaughan, while asleep at Lookout Point, near Dunedin, a silver lever hunting-watch, maker Hamilton, London, No. 7532; value £4. Identifiable. Suspicion attached to Edward Rankin, who was with complainant when he went to sleep. Description: Scotch, a station-hand, about thirty-five years of age, 5 feet 8 inches high, stout build, dark complexion and eyes, dark hair beard whiskers and moustache, mark of recent cut above bridge of nose; dressed in blue double-breasted coat, moleskin trousers, dark soft felt hat, and blucher boots; carried a blue-blanket swag. He is supposed to have gone to Galloway Station, near Clyde, where he has been previously employed.

BETWEEN 7 and 8 p.m. on the 7th instant the dwelling of Joseph Meads, Greytown, Wellington District, was broken into, but nothing was stolen. The front door was opened with a pick-lock, part of which was found in the lock of the door.

Identifiable. Suspicion attached to Thomas Blocksome and John Maber, who are working with complainant, with Messrs. Derritt and Blake's threshing-machine, at Manutahi. Description: Blocksome is English, about twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, dark complexion, small whiskers and moustache; dressed in black coat, grey-cloth vest, dirty moleskin trousers, black soft felt hat, and red sash round waist. Maber is English, about thirty years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, light complexion, small whiskers and moustache; dressed in light-grey coat and vest, dirty striped-moleskin trousers, and straw hat.

SUPPOSED stolen during the night of the 7th ultimo, from a paddock off Hanson Street, Wellington, a bright-bay light-draught mare, six years old, about fifteen hands high, dark points, branded HP on off shoulder, there are other brands on the same shoulder and on off rump; the property of John William Biggs; value £12. CHARLES O'CONNELL, charged with the larceny as a bailee of a mare, the property of John Molloy, has been arrested by Constable Charles Herbert Colborne, Fairlie Creek Police, and remanded to Oamaru.

STOLEN between the 26th January last and the 9th ultimo, from a paddock at Thornbury, Southland District, about seventy sheep, chiefly Lincoln ewes, aged, a few cross-bred wethers and ewes with lambs. The ewes and wethers are branded OA in blue on off ribs, and the lambs with a similar brand on near ribs. The Lincoln ewes and the ewe lambs have a round hole in near ear and the ram lambs in off ear; the cross-bred ewes have two pieces cut out of the sides of near ear, and the wethers out of off ear, and some of the ewes have small notches cut out of ear; all were shorn about the end of January last except the lambs; the property of Frederick Sutton; value about £50. Identifiable.

SUPPOSED stolen about the 5th instant, at Mount Benger, Moe Flat Station, Otago, three merino sheep, three-prong-fork brand on back; the property of James Cameron; value £1 10s. Identifiable. Suspicion attached to Henry Balliston, Irish, a rabbit, about fifty years of age, 6 feet high, square build, long grey hair beard whiskers and moustache turning grey, stoops when walking, slouching gait. It is supposed that he killed the sheep and salted the carcasses for use during the winter.

Deserting Wives and Families, &c.

THOMAS SMITH is charged, on warrant issued by the Oamaru Bench, with deserting his wife and three children, at Oamaru, since the 13th ultimo. Description: English, a labourer, groom, and gardener, thirty-five years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, thin features, reddish beard whiskers and moustache; usually wears dark-tweed coat, brown-moleskin trousers, and black soft felt hat. He may have gone to one of the New Zealand and Australian Land Company's stations, near Christchurch, where he was employed about three months ago.

WILLIAM LEWIS, *alias* George Smith, is charged on warrant of commitment to gaol for twenty-four hours' labour issued by the Christchurch Bench, in default of paying 5s. fine and 2s. costs for creating a disturbance in the streets at Christchurch on the 2nd January last. Description: A West Indian negro, a groom, 4 feet 6 inches high, slight build, very much bow-legged; boasts of having ridden races in Victoria; of intemperate habits.

CHARLES WAKEFIELD is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with deserting his two children, at Dunedin, since about the 1st January last. Description: A native of Victoria, a carpenter, about thirty years of age, about 5 feet 4 or 5 inches high, slight build, fair complexion and hair, clean-shaved except small fair moustache; generally wears grey clothes.

DAVID SAMPSON is charged, on warrant issued by the Christchurch Bench, with disobeying an order to pay 7s. 6d. per week towards the support of his illegitimate child. Description: English, a labourer, lately a member of the Salvation Army, about thirty-eight years of age, about 5 feet 7 inches high, stout build, fair complexion, brown hair beard whiskers and moustache, very short-sighted; wore dark sac-coat, brown-tweed trousers, and black cheese-cutter cap. He was £9 in arrears on the 4th instant.

WALTER GEORGE WILLOUGHBY is charged, on warrant issued by the Gisborne Bench, with deserting his wife. Description: English, a carpenter, thirty years of age, 5 feet 5 or 6 inches high, medium build, fair complexion, grey eyes, brown hair, reddish beard and moustache, two small scars on nose, small lump on right little finger; dressed in brown or dark-brown slop-made tweed suit and black hard felt hat. He left Napier by the 3 p.m. train on the 10th instant.

Description: Wheeler is a Dane, twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 3 inches high, stout build, very little hair on face; Sullivan is Irish, thirty years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, sharp features, fair complexion, and fair moustache; McFadden is Scotch, twenty-five years of age, 5 feet 2 inches high; Turner is English, thirty years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high, sharp features, beard whiskers and moustache. A reward of £3 each is offered for their arrest.

Description: Fourteen years of age, red cheeks, dark eyes, and dark-brown hair; wore print dress, black-and-white pinafore, and black-straw hat trimmed with brown velvet. It is thought she has been enticed by John Pearce to go to Melbourne with him.
