Murder.

DURING the night of the 2nd instant Georgina Butler was murdered in her house, at Waverley Street, South Dunedin. She was much beaten about the head, and her skull was fractured seemingly with a blunt instrument. Apparently she was murdered when lying on her bed. Deceased's daughter, Margaret Butler Brown, and her three children under seven years of age, were the only persons who occupied the house with deceased on the night of the murder. No marks could be discovered to indicate that violence had been used in either getting into or out of the house. Deceased and her daughter had been drinking the previous day.

Incendiarism.

On the morning of the 27th ultimo, at Waimumu, near Mataura, four stacks of oats, value about £60, the property of George Barclay, were maliciously set on fire, by which they were destroyed. The oats were insured in the National

During the night of the 18th or morning of the 19th ultimo, at South Beach Road, near Greymouth, a two-roomed house with fowlhouse and dairy attached, the property of Eliza Newsome, was maliciously set on fire, by which it and contents were destroyed. The contents of the house, which were not of much value, belonged to Ellen West. The house was insured in the Equitable Office for £50.

ABOUT noon on the 29th ultimo a fire was discovered in a cupboard, in which linen was kept, in the kitchen of the dwelling of Charles John Curry, Roxburgh Street, Welling-ton, but the fire was extinguished before much damage was done. At 9.30 a.m. on the following day a fire was again discovered in the bedroom of the same house, by which a

considerable quantity of wearing apparel, bed-clothes, &c., were destroyed, and the building completely gutted, before the fire could be extinguished. The contents of the house were not insured.

AT 8 a.m. on the 2nd instant and 7.30 p.m. on the 4th instant a box containing old clothes and paper, which was in the sitting-room of the dwelling of Andrew and Mary Curry, Roxburgh Street, Wellington, was discovered on fire, which, it is supposed, was maliciously caused. The fire was confined to the box, the contents of which were of trifling

On the morning of the 3rd instant, at the Recreationgrounds, Hawera, a stack of oaten straw, the property of David Spence, value £10, was maliciously set on fire, by which it was destroyed.

On the morning of the 29th ultimo the stable of the Carriers' Arms Hotel, Dee Street, Invercargill, the property of John Hughes, was maliciously set on fire, by which it, four horses, a calf, &c., were destroyed. The fire extended to the hotel, also the property of John Hughes, which was also destroyed. The stable was insured in the Norwich Union Office for £200, the hotel in the London, Liverpool, and Globe Office for £800, and the stock and furniture in the New Zealand and Colonial Offices for £350 each. The amounts insured for are said to be largely in excess of the value of the property destroyed.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

UTTERING a forged cheque to G. M. Ross, at the Bank of New Zealand, Queenstown: A warrant has been issued by the Arrowtown Bench for the arrest of William Johnston, alias Tom Carroll, for this offence. Amended description: altas Tom Carroll, for this offence. Amended description: Irish, between thirty-five and forty years years of age, about 5 feet 6½ inches high, medium compact build, thin face, very dark full beard whiskers and moustache; wore dark coat, moleskin trousers, and heavy watertight boots; carries a tent-swag. He was at Miller's Flat, between Queenstown and Arrowtown, on the 6th ultimo, and then said that he intended going to the Criffel Diggings. He had a liver-and-white-coloured dog (a cross between a spaniel and retriever) with him, and, when travelling the dog carries a billycan or with him, and, when travelling, the dog carries a billycan or some other article. The blank cheque was taken from the dwelling of Timothy Collins, near Skipper's Point, near whose house the offender lived in an old hut for a few days about a week before the forged cheque was uttered; and on the day on which it was uttered he was seen near Queenstown in company with John Collins, a son of Timothy Collins, from whose house the blank cheque was taken. Offender is very fond of speaking of the good qualities of his dog.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-ninth day of September, 1885.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the "Salmon and Trout Act, 1867" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor may from time to time make, rescind, or vary regulations for the purposes

therein mentioned:
And whereas by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," ti is, among other things, enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, and revoke regulations for the purposes therein mentioned, which said regulations shall have force and effect only in any waters or places specified therein:

And whereas it is expedient to make the regulations hereinafter set forth with respect to salmonidæ, trout, perch, and tench inhabiting the waters in the Counties of Mackenzie and Waimate, and that part of the County of Geraldine lying to the south of the Opihi River:

Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the said Act and "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, do hereby make the following regulations; and, with the like advice and consent, I do order that these regulations shall have force and effect within the aforesaid Counties of Mackenzie and Waimate, and that part of the County of Geraldine lying to the south of the Opihi River, and in the waters thereof, as interpreted by "The Fisheries Conserva-tion Act, 1884."

REGULATIONS.

1. LICENSES to fish for trout, perch, and tench in all the waters in the Counties of Mackenzie and Waimate, and that part of the County of Geraldine lying to the south of the Opihi River, shall be issued under the hand of the Secretary Opin River, shall be issued under the hand of the Section, of the South Canterbury Acclimatisation Society (hereinafter termed "the said Acclimatisation Society"), at Timaru, and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged: Provided that it shall not be obligatory upon the

said Secretary to issue a license.

2. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said waters from the first day of October in any year to the thirty-first day of March in the year following inclusive, between the hours of five a.m. and ten p.m. only, but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.

3. No person shall fish for, take, catch, or kill, or attempt to fish for, take, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, or have in his possession, any trout, perch, or tench, except during the above-mentioned period.

4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with one rod and line only, and with the following baits, namely, natural and artificial fly, natural and artificial minnow, silveries, bullies (Electris gobioides), grasshoppers, spiders, beetles, caterpillars, creepers, and

5. No person shall use any other bait, or any method,

device, or contrivance of any sort or kind (except a rod and line and landing-net or gaff) whatever for the purpose of fishing for, catching, killing, or taking trout, perch, or tench.

6. No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other unsportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of catching, killing, or taking trout, nor shall any of the baits above mentioned be used with any medicated or chemical prepareties whatever.

preparation whatever.
7. No person shall fish without a license, and every person fishing shall, on the demand of any ranger, constable, member of the said Acclimatisation Society, or person producing a license from such society, produce and show to such ranger, constable, member, or person his license, or the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait used by him for catching, killing, or taking trout, perch, or tench, as the case may be.

Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length taken or caught by any person shall be immediately returned alive

into the water from which the same is taken.

9. No person shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, into any of the waters hereinbefore mentioned, any sawdust or sawmill refuse, or anything of any kind or description whatever poisonous, deleterious, or noxious to fish.

10. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale any of the salmonide, trout, perch, or tench, or take, fish for, catch, or kill any of the salmonide, trout, perch, or tench, in order to make sale of the same, for a period of one year from the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred

and eighty-five.

11. No person shall take, fish for, catch, or kill in any manner whatever, or have in his possession any salmon, salmon-parr, or smelt, or the young of any salmon; and any of the above-named taken by accident or otherwise shall immediately be returned to the water from whence it is taken.

12. No person shall have in his possession any of the salmonide, trout, perch, or tench during the period appointed

for a close season for any of such fish.

13. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty of not less than one pound

and not exceeding fifty pounds.

14. Nothing in the foregoing regulations shall be deemed to prevent any person authorized in writing under the hand of the Secretary of the said Acclimatisation Society from taking salmon or trout, or the spawn thereof, for acclimatisation purposes.

15. These regulations shall come into force as from the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

Conditions for Trout-fishing in Wellington and Wairarapa.

In pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Salmon and Trout Act, 1867," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand doth hereby make the following regulations for the Wellington and Wairarapa Acclimatisation District:

1. Licenses to fish for trout in the rivers in the Wellington and Wairarapa Acclimatisation District will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Wellington and Wairarapa District Acclimatisation Society, hereinafter termed "the said society," or any one authorized by the said Secretary in that behalf, and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged: Provided it shall not be obligatory upon the said Secretary or his Deputy to not be obligatory upon the said Secretary or his Deputy to issue a license.

2. The Secretary of the said society may issue day licenses to bona fide travellers and strangers not resident within the district aforesaid, on their introduction to him by any two members of the said society, and on payment of a fee of two shillings and sixpence for each day's fishing: Provided that this payment may be remitted if the applicant be a member of or hold a valid license from any other society in New Zealand which grants the like privilege.

3. Any holder of a license may fish with one rod and line for trout, and may use a landing-net or gaff to secure any trout caught with such rod and line, in the above-named rivers, between the hours of five a.m. and ten p.m., from the

first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eightyfive, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six, both inclusive.

4. No license shall authorize any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that with natural or arti-ficial fly or minnow only.

5. Any person fishing either without a license, or with any other bait than as aforesaid, or who shall, on demand of any person holding and showing a license, or on the demand of any ranger, police officer, or constable, fail to produce and show to such person, ranger, police officer, or constable his license, or the contents of his creel, basket, or bag, or the bait used by him for taking fish, shall be liable to a penalty

not exceeding twenty pounds.

6. No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other unsportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing trout, nor shall any of the abovementioned baits be used with any medicated or chemical preparation whatever.

preparation whatever.

7. All trout not exceeding ten inches in length taken by any person shall be immediately returned alive to the water and any person convicted of infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

8. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking fish in any river or stream within the district aforesaid, or at the mouth or entrance of any such river or stream; and all persons offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds.

9. For the purposes of these regulations the mouth of every such river or stream shall be deemed to include every outlet of the same and the sea-shore between such outlets, and shall extend over a radius of one-quarter of a mile from the point or line where the waters of such river or stream meet those of the sea or of any harbour at low water.

10. Any person who puts, throws, or places, or allows to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river or stream in the said district, or at the mouth or entrance of any such river or stream, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any matter or liquid deleterious to fish, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds.

11. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale, or shall fish for the purpose of obtaining for sale, any salmon or trout, or any part thereof; and any person infringing this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty

pounds.

12. If any person shall be convicted of any offence against these regulations the license (if any) held by the offender shall thereupon become void.

13. Nothing in these regulations shall be deemed to prevent any person or persons authorized in writing under the

hand of the Secretary of the Society from taking salmon or trout, or the spawn thereof, for acclimatisation purposes.

14. These regulations shall come into force as from the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette.

MURDER, ETC.—Murder of Maria Cook and her infant daughter near Edenhope: Information has been received by the Nhill Police that a man answering the description of Robert Cook was killing rabbits on the Avoca Run, Sturts, Bilabong, about twenty-two miles from Wentworth, New South Wales, about twelve months ago. The man in course of conversation said his name was Cook, and that his friends resided at Lawloit; that on coming over from Mount Gambier to Horsham in a trap his wife died, and that he subsequently sold the horse and trap at one of the mining centres. The name of the place cannot be remembered, but it is supposed to be Sandhurst. It is thought that the man referred to was known on the station as Murphy, not as Cook, and that he left Avoca Run for Piroo. Nothing was known on the station regarding the Horsham murders, as it is reported newspapers rarely reached the stations there. Robert Cook's photograph has been shown to the person supplying the above information, and he identified it as that of the man who was rabbiting on the Avoca run.
