Incendiarism.

On the morning of the 17th ultimo the Makarewa Junction Hotel, near Invercargill, the property of Robert S. Patton, was destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was maliciously caused. The fire originated in an unoccupied bedroom upstairs. The building was insured for £800 in the New Zealand Office, and the stock and furniture for £200 in the Victoria Office.

On the morning of the 19th ultimo, at Bowen Town, Katikati, Thames District, a barn and contents, the property of Charles Harley, value about £200, were destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was maliciously caused. The contents consisted of about 14 or 15 tons of caten straw, 7 tous of potatoes, 2 tons of carrots, and 2 tons of pumpkins. The property was not insured.

On the morning of the 13th ultimo, at Waerengahika, Poverty Bay District, a stable, the property of William Adair, was destroyed by fire. The racing stallion "Leonata," the property of Thomas Bray, which was in the stable, was burned to death. The stable was insured for £100 in the New Zealand Office, and the horse for £200 in the South British Office. The insurance in both cases was excessive. At an inquest held on the 21st ultimo, at the Sir George Grey Hotel, Waerengahika, to inquire as to the cause of the origin of the fire, the following verdict was returned: "That the stable was wilfully and maliciously set on fire by some person or persons unknown, with intent to defraud the New Zealand and South British Insurance Companies."

About 7.30 p.m. on the 28th ultimo, at Menzies Ferry, near Wyndham, a stack of oats containing about a ton, the property of Charles Cunningham, was maliciously destroyed by fire.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

JOHN ROBINSON is charged, on warrant issued by the Whiskers and mous Nelson Bench, with having, on the 22nd ultimo, at Nelson, with the Whiskers and mous nelskin trousers. In the did not appear.

of the New Zealand Clothing Depôt, Nelson. Description: Supposed a native of Marlborough, twenty-five years of age, 5ft. 7in. or Sin. high, medium build, brown hair, clean-shaved except moustache, blue eyes; usually wears grey-tweed suit and grey soft felt hat with crape band. The cheque is on the Colonial Bank, Nelson, and purports to be drawn by W. Kinzett in favour of J. Robertson. Offender indorsed the cheque "W. Robinson." He left Nelson on the 22nd ultimo by the steamer "Hawea" for Wellington, supposed with the intention of going to Sydney. Other charges of a similar nature are pending against him.

Thomas Mason and a man name unknown are charged with having, about 10 p.m. on the 26th ultimo, at the corner of Stafford and William Streets, Dunedin, demanded money, with menaces, from Emanuel Levy. Description: Mason is between forty and fifty years of age, about 5ft. 5in. high, medium build, fresh complexion, grey hair, clean-shaved except grey beard. The other man wore a handkerchief over the lower part of his face, which is the only description that can be obtained of him. They are supposed to be still in Dynadia. in Dunedin.

On the 20th or 21st ultimo a quantity of broccoli and cabbage in the garden of George Richard Hilton, Ellis Road, South Invercargill, was maliciously trampled down, pulled out of the ground, and damaged to the extent of about £10.

JOHN REANY is charged, on warrant issued by the Christ-church Bench, with being a rogue and vagabond, at Christ-church, on the 24th ultimo. Description: A native of Dunedin, about twenty-five years of age, about 5ft 9in. or 10in. high, good erect build, dark complexion, clean-shaved except small moustache; wears grey-tweed suit. He is charged with a breach of section 28, subsection 5, of "The Police Offences Act, 1884." He is supposed to have gone to Dunedin, where his father keeps an hotel. WHEREAS by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884" W (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, and revoke regulations for the purposes therein mentioned, which said regulations shall have force and effect only in any waters or places specified

And whereas by Order in Council dated the twenty-seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, certain regulations were made, in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, prescribing a close season for seals, and extending such close season until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six:

And whereas it is expedient to further extend such close

Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by the said Act, and by and with the consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, do

hereby make the following regulation:-

The close season for seals in the Colony of New Zealand, prescribed and extended by the regulations made under the said Act by Order in Council bearing date the twenty-seventh day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, is hereby further extended until the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven.
