£200 Reward.-Murder.

£200 Reward.—Murder. JOHN CAFFERY, master of the cutter "Sovereign of the Seas," and Henry Albert Penn, the mate, are charged, on Coroner's warrant, with having, on the morning of the 19th ultimo, murdered Robert Taylor, by shooting him dead in his house, at Great Barrier Island, near Auckland. Descrip-tion of offenders. Caffery is a native of the colony, a sea-man and labourer, about thirty-six years of age, but looks older, about 5ft. 7in. high, square stout build, about 12 stone weight, brown hair, sandy complexion, face freckled, sandy or brownish goatee and moustache with a reddish tinge, rather small weak greyish eyes, occasionally wears gold earrings, scar on left eyebrow, a star tattooed on right forearm and an anchor on left arm, boil-marks and a mole on right side. Penn is a native of the colony, a seaman and labourer, twenty-four years of age, about 5ft. 7in. high, slight build, fair complexion but inclined to sallowness, dark eyes, brown hair, and small brown moustache. £200 reward eyes, brown hair, and small brown moustache. £200 reward is offered by the Government for their arrest, or £100 for such information as will lead to their arrest. After committing the murder they went to sea in the cutter. Description of cutter: Twenty-nine tons register, cutter-rig, bulwarks painted white, with a yellow stripe round centre, hull black, her name is painted in black letters on both bows and on the her name is painted in black letters on both bows and on the stern, registered No. 52415; has a new set of sails. She is a fast sailer, and has regularly won the large cutters' prize at the Auckland annual regatta. The cutter and cargo are the property of Messrs. Henderson and Spraggon, of Auckland. Search has been made along the coast for the cutter and the offenders, but no tidings of them can be obtained, so that they have no doubt left the colony in her. Offenders and a young woman named Grace Reid, *alias* Grace Graham, are supposed to be the only persons on board. She is a native of Gisborne, a prostitute, about sixteen years of age, about 4ft. 10in. high, medium build, brown hair, pale complexion, HP tattooed on left arm, and WS on one of legs above the knee.

Incendiarism.

At 5 o'clock on the morning of the 16th ultimo, at Jeru-salem Farm, Shag Valley, Oamaru District, a water-wheel, chaff-house, and stable, the property of Donald Campbell, were set on fire, by which they were damaged to the extent

of £35. At an inquest held on the 30th ultimo to inquire as to the cause of the fire the following verdict was returned: "That the place was set on fire, but how and by what means there was no evidence to show the said jurors." The premises were insured in the Colonial Office for £200, which amount seems to be greatly in excess of their value.

ABOUT 1.30 a.m. on the 18th ultimo, at Otaria, Southland District, a threshing-mill, the property of Alexander Camp-bell, value about £100, was maliciously set on fire, by which it was destroyed. It was insured in the Australian Mer-cantile Union Office for £125.

On the night of the 2nd instant, at Manurewa, Auckland District, two stacks of hay, value £200, the property of Alfred Hills, were destroyed by fire, which it is supposed was maliciously caused. The hay was not insured.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

A MAN, name unknown, is charged with having, on the 3rd instant, uttered a forged cheque for £8 10s. to A. and T. Inglis, drapers, George Street, Dunedin. Description: A labourer, about thirty years of age, 5ft. 9in. or 10in. high, stout build, black hair, clean-shaved except black moustache. Identifiable. The cheque is on the National Bank, Dunedin, and purports to be drawn by Martin and Watson, in favour of Francis Fogarty.

HENRY SMITH is charged, on warrant issued by the Auck-land Bench, with having, on the 8th ultimo, at Auckland, embezzled £16, the property of Arthur Hyman Nathan and Co., by whom he was employed as traveller. Description : Supposed Scotch, a commercial traveller, thirty-eight years of age, 5ft. 9in. high, stout build, fresh complexion, brown hair, light-brown moustache, and small side whiskers, chin shaved, large scar on forehead from a recent buggy-accident; generally wore dark suit and black hard hat with flat crown snaved, harge scar on forenead from a recent buggy-accident; generally wore dark suit and black hard hat with flat crown, but lately wore a tweed peaked-cap, to hide the scar on forehead. His defalcations, so far as known at present, amount to about $\pounds400$, and it is said he has committed other fraude. He is averaged to have a fact the scar of the sca frauds. He is supposed to have gone South by steamer with the intention of leaving the colony.

ABOUT 8.15 p.m. on the 12th instant four panes of glass, value £3, were maliciously broken in the shop-windows of William John Leybourne, Palmerston North.

WILLIAM JONH LYSAGHT Moss is charged, on warrant issued by the Christchurch Bench, with having, on the 18th February, the 6th April, and the 12th June last, at St. Albans, embezzled £6 14s. 1d., the property of the St. Albans Borough Council, by whom he was employed as clerk and collector. Description: A native of the colony, a clerk, about twenty years of age, about 5ft. 6in. high, medium build, sallow complexion, brown eyes, no hair on face except very small dark moustache, how-legged, smart active appear-ance; generally wears dark-tweed suit and small black billy-cock hat; frequents hotels, and is fond of the society of barmaids. It is believed he left Lyttelton on the 30th ultimo by the steamer "Hauroto" for Sydney.

JAMES SHEAREB, alias Sherrin, alias Stewart, &c., charged on warrant with stealing a watch and money from the person of Arthur Miller, at Christchurch, has been arrested by Detective Alexander Henderson, Dunedin Police, remanded to Christchurch, and committed for trial.

CHARLES WHISKEN is charged, on warrant issued by the Helensville Bench, with stealing, on the 3rd instant, from the store of William Letts, at Swanson, nine pairs of men's socks; value 11s.; since recovered. Description: English, a gum-digger, about twenty-six years of age, 5ft. Sin. or 9in. high, slight build, fair complexion, dark-brown hair, and small light moustache, protruding lips, blackguard appearance. He is supposed to have gone to Auckland.

STOLEN on the 3rd or 4th instant, from the person of Patrick Maguire, while drunk at Auckland, an English silver lever hunting-watch, No. 2420, maker's name not known, a rusty steel chain attached; about 8s. in silver, a white-linen pocket-handkerchief, some tobacco, and a clay pipe; value £5 9s. M. Wakefield. Identifiable. Offender left brown-leather strap in the bedroom from which the property was stolen.

BETWEEN 9 a.m. on the 24th and 5 p.m. on the 25th ultimo the dwelling of John Muir, Inaha, near Manaia, was broken into, and the following stolen : A light-brown-leather purse, about 4in. by 3in., with brass clasp, two compartments, and a ticket-pocket, containing two £1 notes on the Bank of New Zealand, about 10s. in silver, and three twopenny stamps.
