Incendiarism.

Between 7 and 8 p.m. on the 3rd instant a large threshing-sheet, value £2, in the farmhouse of Thomas Wilson, Puke-kohe, Auckland District, was set on fire, and was almost totally destroyed when discovered. The building contained a buggy and harness, about a ton of chaff, and farming imple-ments. The building and contents were uninsured.

On the morning of the 7th instant, at Pukekohe, Auckland District, the dwelling of Thomas Wilson, was destroyed by fire, as was also a stack of oats, value £40, which stood at some distance from the house. The house and stack were too far apart for either to have communicated fire to the other. The house contained six rooms, and was insured for £100, and the furniture for £50, in the Standard Office. The oats were not insured. Some furniture and clothing were saved from the house.

On the night of the 21st ultimo, at Wangaloa, near Kaitangata, an unoccupied four-roomed house, the property of James Hume, value £350, was destroyed by fire. At an inquest, held on the 9th instant, at Kaitangata, by J. S. Flemting, Esq., Coroner, a verdict was returned to the effect that the house was maliciously set on five, but there was not sufficient evidence to say by whom. It was insured in the National Office for £250.

Setting fire to six stacks of corn, at Tarras Station, Lake District, the property of Messis. Dalgetty and Co: An inquest was held by J. S. Hickson, Esq., R.M. and Coroner, extending from the 30th ultimo until the 2nd instant, to inquire as to the cause of the origin of the fire, when the following verdict was returned: "That some person or persons, to the jurors unknown, feloniously, wilfully, and maliciously did set fire to the said six stacks of corn, the property of the said Dalgetty and Co., on the morning of the 22nd April last, past, at Tarras freehold, with intent then and there to injure." The jurors added the following rider: "That grave suspicion lays to James McKenzie, farmer, at Tarras, also to John Beaton McKenzie, his hired servant, and that every care and precaution have been displayed by Mr. John Stronach, manager of Tarras Station, against fire."

SAMUEL McSweeney, charged on warrant with uttering a forged cheque for £9 to Josiah Ballantyne and Co., has been arrested by Detective Austin Kirby, Timaru Police, and committed for trial.

A Maori, name unknown, is charged, on warrant issued by the Hawera Bench, with having, on the 27th ultimo, at Okaiawa, Taranaki District, wilfully broken a pane of glass, value 15s., in one of the windows of the store of George Applegate. Description: About twenty years of age, 5te. Sin. or 9in. high, a medium build, little if any hair on face; dressed in dark coat very much torn about the sleeves, brown trousers, and drab-felt hat with crape round it; speaks broken English. Identifiable. He is suspected of breaking into and stealing stamps from the store.

ROBERT CRAWLEY is charged, on warrant issued by the Wellington Bench, with uttering a forged cheque for £5 10s. to Robert Cate, butcher, Cuba Street, Wellington, at 7 p.m. on the 26th ultimo, Description: A native of the colony, a jockey, twenty-five years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, medium build, fair complexion, fair hair, clean-shaved except moustache; dresssed in light-tweed suit. The cheque purports to be drawn by Andrew Young in favour of William Collins. He is supposed to have gone to Blenheim.

Andrew Brett, alias Fredricson, alias Petersen, alias Semb, is charged with uttering a forged cheque for £4 to Mrs. Breeze, wife of Edward Breeze, at Waiwera, near Clinton, at 6.30 p.m. on the 1st instant. Description: A Norwegian, about thirty years of age, 5ft. 6in. high, medium build, fair hair, fair sandy beard whiskers and moustache, beard and whiskers clipped short; dressed in light-grey tweed sac-suit and light-tweed stitched hat. He is identical with Andrew Petersen, charged on warrant with uttering a forged cheque to Denis Moloney, at the Kensington Hotel, near Dunedin. (See Police Gazette, 1888, pages 97 and 107.) The cheque is drawn on the Colonial Bank, Lawrenco, and purports to be signed by James Smith and Sons, of Greenfield Station, in favour of Brett. He purchased from Mrs. Breeze a pair of balmoral boots, two pairs white-cotton socks, a pair of tweed trousers, and a light-tweed stitched hat, and in payment uttered the forged cheque. He left Clinton by the 6 a.m. train on the 2nd instant for Invercargill. Mrs. Breeze, wife of Edward Breeze, at Waiwera, near Clin-

ALFRED KERR is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin ALFRED KERR is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with having, on the 23rd ultimo, obtained by false pretences from William McBeath, George Street, Dunedin, a sac-suit, a brown overcoat, two white shirts, two pairs of socks, and a pair of gloves; value £3 16s. 7d. Description: A native of the colony, a jockey, sixteen years of age, 4ft. 10in. high, medium build, fresh complexion, and brown hair; wore dark sac-suit and soft black hat. He falsely represented that he was sent for the clothing by Mr. Holmes, of Cargill Street.

FRANK GODKIN RUDKIN is charged, on warrant issued by the Hawera Bench, with having, on the 15th ultimo, at Okaiawa, Taranaki District, obtained £6 from John Murdoch by false pretences. Description: A native of England, about seventeen years of age, about 5ft. 6in. high, medium build, fair complexion, fair hair, no hair on face; a recent arrival from Home. He left for Auckland or Onehunga on the 1st instant.

Andrew Brett is charged, on warrant issued by the Lawrence Bench, with uttering a forged cheque for £1 to Jonas Harrop, at Lawrence, on the 31st ultimo. Description: Supposed a German, about thirty years of age, 5ft. 6in. high, medium build, fair hair, fair sandy beard whiskers and moustache, beard and whiskers clipped short; dressed in light-tweed sac-suit and light-tweed hat; speaks with a slight foreign accent. He is no doubt identical with Andrew Brett, alias Fredrieson, alias Petersen, alias Semb, charged with uttering a forged cheque to Mrs. Breeze, at Waimera. The cheque is drawn on the Colonial Bank, Lawrence, and purports to be signed by James Smith and Son, Greenfield Station, where offender was recently employed for a short time.

On the 29th ultimo, at Aratapu, North Wairoa, Bay of Islands District, the testicles were maliciously cut out of a dog, value £50, the property of John Neild.

About the 29th ultimo a forged cheque for £6 8s. was uttered by a man, name unknown, of whom no description can be obtained, to Messrs. Taylor and Papps, grocers, High Street, Christchurch, in payment for goods, and received the balance in cash. The cheque is on the Bank of New Zealand, Kaiapoi, and purports to be drawn by Thomas Dickenly in favour of Fred. Lange. No such persons are known at Kaiapoi.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

AH Fun is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with stealing, on the 29th ultimo, from the pawnbroker's shop of Abigail Isaacs, Maclaggan Street, Dunedin, a pair of dark-grey tweed-trousers, value 10s., since recovered. Description: A Chinaman, about twenty-eight years of age, 5ft. 3in. high, slight build, black hair, long pigtail, no hair on face, pale complexion; dressed in dark sac-coat, dark-grey trousers and vest, and black soft-felt hat. Identifiable. He left Dunedin on the 3rd instant, and is supposed to have gone up country.

Between 8 a.m. on the 27th and 8 a.m. on the 28th ultimo the store of George Applegate, Okaiawa, Taranaki District, was broken into, and an envelope containing about £1 worth of shillings and sixpenny stamps stolen. Envelope identifiable. Suspicion attached to a Maori, name unknown, about twenty years of age, about 5ft 8in. or 9in. high, medium build, little if any hair on his face; dressed in dark coat, very much torn about the sleeves, brown trousers, and drab felt-hat with crape round it; speaks broken English. Identifiable. He is charged, on warrant issued by the Hawera Bench, with wilfully breaking a pane of glass, value 15s., in one of the store-windows.

Breaking into and stealing from the dwelling of Neil Henderson, Waikaia Flat: Albert Edward Mawer and Henry Treen, arrested by Constable Thomas Griffith, Lumsden Police, were charged with this offence, but the charge was dismissed on account of complainant declining to swear that anything was stolen from his dwelling. Both men were committed for trial on two other charges of housebreaking.

STEALING from the hut of Arthur William Dutson, St. Andrew, near Waimate: All the stolen property except the gold guard has been recovered. It was found secreted in a hedge near St. Andrew. The sack, containing one pair of the new boots, the pair of old boots, the moleskin trousers, the hat, a packet of bootpreservers, and two pairs of slippers, was found, on the 25th ultimo, under a hay-stack in the Park Reserve, Invercargill.

Between 11.90 p.m. on the 6th and 6 a.m. on the 7th instant the Victoria Hotel, Abel Smith Street, Wellington, was burglariously entered, and the following stolen: Eive bottles of Hennessy's brandy and a bottle of gin, value £2 1s. 6d.; 12s. in silver, and 8s. 1½d. in coppers; the property of Alexander Smith.

watch, case flowered, gold hinges, ketch to regulate hands, no glass, number not known, value £6; and a large gold chain, four-plat bar, 2in. drop, value £8. Identifiable.

STOLEN on the 7th instant, from the Leviathan Temperance Hotel, Cumberland Street, Dunedin, a rather long greycheck tweed overcoat with cape, a strap of similar material on left side of collar, dark-check lining, value £8; there was a pair of brown-kid gloves, value 3s., in one of the pockets; the property of Charles Mitchelson. Identifiable.

Between 11.50 p.m. on the 16th and 8.30 a.m. on the 17th instant, the railway-station, Potone, near Wellington, was broken into, and the following stolen: An iron-safe containing about £90 in notes, gold, silver, and coppers, a cheque for £2 1s. 4d., drawn by B. Brown in favour of the New Zealand Government Insurance Department or bearer; about forty-five postal notes for the sum of £17, for various amounts from 1s. to £1; about £7 worth of postage-stamps, value from 1d. to 1s.; a post-office savings-bank book, No. 25611, issued at Featherston to G. W. Bennett; a post-office savings-bank book, No. 43292, issued at Petone to T. F. Bennett; and a cylindrical wooden case, about 15in. long by 3in. in diameter, supposed made of kauri-timber, not painted, for holding stamps, &c.; the property of the Government. Identifiable except the money. The safe was found on the morning of the 17th instant in a paddock about half a mile from the railway-station, broken open, and the contents missing, except a sovereign, £1 4s. in silver, 1s. 8d. in coppers, and 10s. worth of stamps. A large sledge-hammer was found at the place, with which the safe was broken open. A handtruck, which was taken from the railway-station, was also found at the place, in which, no doubt, the safe was conveyed to where found.

STOLEN on the 30th ultimo, from the shop of Gordon Matheson, Laurence Street, Mornington, Dunedin, a gold shield-pin with diamond in centre; value £5. Identifiable. Suspicion attached to a man, name unknown, who was in the shop on that day. Description: Supposed English, a hawker, about thirty years of age, 5ft. 7in. or Sin. high, dark hair and whiskers; wore dark-check clothes and dark-check hat.

STOLEN on the 6th instant, from the dwelling of Thomas Johnstone, Woolcombe's Gully, near Timaru, a nearly-new brown-coloured accordian with ten keys, black-leather strap handles lined with red leather, nickle-plate ornaments at corners, well finished, and fastens with two brass slides, both considerably bent; value £1 10s. Identifiable.

Stolen between the 24th ultimo and 6th instant, from the dwelling of John H. Hawkins, Opua, Bay of Islands, Jewt. of kauri-gum, a boat-rudder painted white, a brass ornamented rudder-yoke, two paint-brushes, a tin dish, five kauri-planks, 6 by 2, 14ft. long, a kauri spar and sail-sprit 12ft. long; value £2 2s. 6d. Identifiable except the gum.

Three men, names unknown, supposed labourers, are charged with attempting to rob Basil Latham and Albert Gough, with violence, about 9.30 p.m. on the 16th instant, on the Masterton and Carterton Road. Description: First, about forty years of age, about 5ft. 10in. high, long thin features, full dark beard whiskers and moustache; wore dark overcoat and trousers, and dark slouched hat. Second, about twenty seven years of age, about 6ft. high, stout build, clean-shaved except dark moustache; wore dark suit and dark broad brimmed hat. Third, about thirty-six years of age, about 5ft. 6in. or 7in. high, stoutish build, bushy beard; wore dark-tweed coat and vest, white or light-coloured moleskin trousers, and dark slouched hat. Identification doubtful. Complainants were riding in company towards Masterton, and when passing a clump of trees the offenders ran from under the trees in front of their horses, ordering them to stop; two of them caught hold of Latham and his horse, and endeavoured to unseat him, but he succeeded in making his escape from them, accompanied by Gough. Mr. Latham, who carries on butchering business, &c., at Waingawa, is in the habit of bringing large sums of money into Masterton on Saturdays, and had a considerable amount in his possession at the time.

Stealing Otherwise than from the Person or from Dwellings.

DANIEL TIDEY, charged on warrant with stealing money, &c., at Swanson, the property of James Patterson Sinclair, has been arrested by Constable John Ryan, Danevirke Police, and remanded to Auckland.

STEALING a letter containing a cheque for £50, the property of William Judd: C. W. Smith, who presented the stolen

cheque at Boath and Co.'s draper's shop, Nelson, is charged, on warrant issued by the Westport Bench, with this offence. He was at Nelson in April last.

John Bicknell is charged, on warrant issued by the Hawera Bench, with the larceny, as a copartner, on the 22nd ultimo, at Stratford, of the sum of £66 13s. 6d.; the property of Peter Hunter and Richard Rogers. Description: A native of England, a labourer, about thirty-eight years of age, about 5ft. high, medium build, fair complexion, fair hair, fair beard whiskers and moustache inclined to red, beard worn rather long for a man of his size; dressed in grey-tweed suit, black soft-felt hat, and lace-up boots. He left Stratford by train on the morning of the 22nd ultimo, and is supposed to have gone to Halcombe or Rangitikei, where he is well known. He was a partner of complainant's in a contract for fencing land at Stratford for a Mr. Manson, and on completing the work received a cheque for the sum of £66 13s. 6d., being the balance of the amount due. He cashed the cheque on the 19th ultimo, and has failed to divide the amount with complainants. He passed through Feilding on the 22nd ultimo in the 4.20 p.m. train, supposed for Wellington.

Charles Warren and Frederick Padgham are charged, on warrant issued by the Marton Bench, with stealing, on the 31st ultimo, from the fowlhouse of Emma Ann Stubbs, Turakina, two hens and a rooster, value 10s., since recovered. Description: Warren is fifty years of age, 5ft. 8m. high, stout build, fresh complexion, pockpitted, brown beard whiskers and moustache, lobe of both ears cut off; dressed in brown-tweed coat, moleskin trousers, and dark-tweed hat. Padgham is forty years of age, 5ft. 7in. high, medium build, dark complexion, very full dark-brown eyes, large nose (broken), large nostrils, dark-brown whiskers and moustache; wore dark-brown tweed coat (collar generally turned up), moleskin trousers, and black-felt hat; usually employed as a cook. He left Turakina on the 1st instant for Wanganui on foot.

Identifiable.

STOLEN on or about the 21st April last, from the railwaystation, Walton, Waikato, a parcel containing a ladies' velvet dress; the property of Charles N. Murray; value £5. Identifiable.

STOLEN between 10.30 p.m. on the 26th and 8 a.m. on the 27th ultimo, from the Red House Hotel Stables, New Plymouth, a dapple-grey gelding, hack-breed, about nine years old, 15½ hands high, mark from wire from near shoulder extending nearly across breast, which is noticeable through being of a dark colour, value £10; a small cow-hide saddle, "H. Waite" written in ink under flap, nickel-silver stirrup-irons, and a single-rein bridle with silver bit and iron buckles, end of roins split, value £8; the property of Henry Waite. Identifiable.

JOHN DIGNAN, alias Ginger, charged on warrant of commitment to gool for one month's labour, in default of paying £5 6s., fine and costs, for unlawfully taking rock-oysters, has been arrested by Constable Edward Mackey, Auckland Police. Fine and costs paid.

JOHN INGLEBY, alias Matthews, is charged, on warrant issued by the Christchurch Bench, with failing to provide his wife with adequate means of support, at Sydenham, near Christchurch, since about June, 1886. Description: A native of Yorkshire, an iron-smelter and labourer, fifty-seven years of age, 6ft. lin. high, stout build, light-blue eyes, brown hair beard whiskers and moustache turning grey, turns right foot slightly in when walking; slovenly appearance, fond of drink. He is a great agitator at meetings of the unemployed. He was at Brisbane in December last.
