Offences Not Otherwise Described.

CHARLES DELBECK, alias Fritz Carl Delbeck, alias Charles Delberg is charged, on warrant issued by the Picton Bench, with forging a cheque, on the 4th July last, at Blenheim, drawn by John McKay, of the antimony mine, near Picton, on the Colonial Bank, Blenheim, by altering it from £2 7s. to £12 7s. Description: A German, an engineer, about twenty-five years of age, 5ft. 6in. or 7in. high, slight build, fair complexion, large light-coloured eyes, fair hair, no hair on face except slight incipient moustache, top of one of fingers off, supposed of the left hand, a right upper front-tooth out, speaks English fairly well. He was employed for a short time as engineer on the steam-launch "Picton." He left Blenheim on the 5th or 6th ultimo by the steamer "Neptune" for Wellington, and spoke of going to Melbourne. He said that the German Consul at Auckland had money invested for him.

THOMAS J. HICKEY is charged, on warrant issued by the Auckland Bench, with having, on the 14th November last, at Waiuku, embezzled £5, the moneys of the Onehunga and Waiuku Steam Navigation Company, by whom he was employed as clerk and secretary. Description: A native of Ireland, has been in the colony since a youth, a clerk about thirty-three years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, stout build, dark-brown hair, light-brown inclined to sandy or reddish beard warm full brown eyes round features, straight nose, low worn full, brown eyes, round features, straight nose, low broad forehead, short neck, erect gait, speaks in a low tone of voice; dressed in grey-tweed sac-suit and hard round black-felt hat. There are several other similar charges against him. He was seen in Auckland about three months ago. His wife and family live on the Kyber Pass Road, Auckland.

A MAN, who gave his name as Richard or Robert Evens, which is believed to be fictitious, is charged with having, at 6 p.m. on the 9th ultimo, uttered a valueless cheque for £9 9s. 6d., purporting to be drawn by Robert Lamb in favour of Robert Evens, to Frederick David Woodroffe, draper,

Queen Street, Auckland. Description: Supposed Irish, looked like a bushman or gum-digger, between forty and forty-five years of age, 5ft. 7in. or 8in. high, medium build, forty-five years of age, 5ft. 7in. or 8in. high, medium build, brownish beard whiskers and moustache; wore light-grey or slate-coloured tweed suit, soft black-felt hat, and strong working boots; very frequently makes use of the phrase, "My sonny boy." He indorsed the cheque "Richard Evens." He purchased clothing, value £6 15s., from Mr. Woodroffe, in payment for which he uttered the valueless cheque. Mr. Woodroffe declined to give him the clothing until he presented the cheque at the bank on the following day; but he gave him his own cheque for £2 14s. 6d., being the difference between the price of the clothing and the amount for which the valueless cheque was drawn. On the same evening offender purchased three pairs of boots from same evening offender purchased three pairs of boots from Mr. McKerras, of Queen Street, in payment for which he presented Mr. Woodroffe's cheque. Warrant to issue.

MARTIN O'CONNELL is charged, on warrant issued by the MARTIN O'CONNELL is charged, on warrant issued by the Dunedin Bench, with sly grog-selling, at Flat Stream, on the 23rd June last. Description: A native of Cork, Ireland, a labourer, thirty years of age, 5ft. Sin. high, medium build, fresh complexion, blue eyes, dark hair, bald, full dark beard and moustache; when last seen wore light-brown check-tweed sac-suit, heavy overcoat of same material, and black soft-felt hat. Supposed gone to the Bluff, with a view of endeavouring to leave the colony.

Between 7 p.m. and midnight on the 19th ultimo, at Alexandra South, nearly all the hair was maliciously cut off the tail of a horse, the property of District Constable Wong

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

WITH reference to commitments to industrial schools, attention is drawn to the difference between the subsection 1 and the subsection 3 in section 16 of "The Industrial Schools Act, 1882."

Subsection 3 is intended to apply only to cases which, if the persons were old enough, would justify their arrest as vagrants. It is, therefore, improper to lay informations under this subsection in cases of mere destitution and dis-

It will, therefore, be understood that all cases which should properly be brought under subsection I must be dealt with under that subsection, and that mere poverty and distress must not be treated as vagrancy. THOMAS FERGUS.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by the sixth section of "The Licensing Act, 1881," it is enacted that the Governor shall, as soon as conveniently may be after the commencement of the said Act, by Proclamation in the Gazette, from time to time define districts to be licensing districts under the said Act, and from time to time may alter and redefine the boundaries of the same :

Now, therefore, I, William Francis Drummond Jervois, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said Act, alter and redefine the boundaries of the Birkenhead Licensing District, which shall, from and after the thirty-first day of August instant, be those described in the First Schedule hereto; and do hereby proclaim and define the part of the colony mentioned and described in the Second Schedule hereto to be, from and after the said thirtyfirst day of August instant, an ordinary licensing district for the purposes of the said Act.

FIRST SCHEDULE. WAITEMATA COUNTY.

Birkenhead Licensing District.—All that area in the County of Waitemata, bounded towards the north-east and east generally by a right line from the easternmost corner of Section No. 305, Parish of Pukeatua, to the north-western corner of Section No. 36, Parish of Paremoremo; thence by the northern and eastern boundary-lines of the latter section, the northern and eastern boundary-lines of Section No. 33 of the said Parish of Paremoremo to the south-eastern corner of that section; thence by a right line to the westernmost corner of Section No. 200, Parish of Takapuna; thence by the last mentioned section and its south-western boundary-line produced to the middle of the road; thence by a line along the middle of the road to a point in line with the south-western boundary-line of Section No. 232; thence by a right line to the north-western corner of the last-mentioned section; thence by Section No. 232 aforesaid and Section No. 241, across a road, and by Sections Nos. 243, 105, 106, 107, across a road, and by Sections Nos. 102, 94, 95, and 96, across a road, and by Sections Nos. 13, 12, 11, 7, and 55, all of the said Parish of Takapuna, to Waitemata Harbour; towards the south-west generally by the Borough of Birken-head, as described in the New Zealand Gazette No. 24, 12th April, 1888, by Hellyer's Creek, and again by Waitemata Harbour; and towards the north-west by Lucas's Creek to the commencement of the road forming the eastern boundary of Section No. 299 of the said Parish of Pukeatua; thence by that road and the road forming the south-eastern boundaries of Sections Nos. 300, 301, and 305 of the lastmentioned parish to the place of commencement.

Regulations for Trout-fishing, Southland District.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this fourth day of September, 1888.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

N pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulations for that portion of the Provincial District of Otago formerly known as the Province of Southland, and the waters thereof, with the exception of the Aparima River; and doth hereby declare that these regulations shall, as from the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette, supersede all regulations at variance therewith.

REGULATIONS.

1. LICENSES to fish for trout in all the waters within and forming the District of Southland, including Mataura River, southern side, with the exception of the Aparima River, in which fishing is hereby prohibited, will be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Southland Acclimatisation Society (hereinafter termed "the said society"), at Invercargill, and for every such license a fee of ten shillings will be charged. Provided that it shell not be obligated. be charged: Provided that it shall not be obligatory on the

society to issue a license.

2. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said waters from the first day of October, in any one year, to the Tuesday after Easter Day in the following year, inclusive, between the hours of four a.m. and ten p.m. only; but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.

3. No person shall fish for, take, catch, or kill, or have in his possession, or attempt to fish for, take, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, any of the salmonidæ or trout, except

during the above-mentioned period.
4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with one rod and line only, and with the following baits: natural or artificial fly, natural or artificial minnow, silveries, bullies, grasshoppers, spiders, caterpillars, creepers, and worms.

5. No person shall use any other bait, or any method, device, or contrivance of any sort or kind whatever, for the purpose of fishing for, taking, catching, or killing trout, except a rod and line, and a landing-net or gaff for fish taken with rod and line.

 No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other un-sportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing trout; nor shall any of the baits above mentioned be used with any medicated or chemical preparation whatever.

7. No person shall fish without a license, and every person fishing shall, on demand of any ranger, constable, member of the said society, or person producing a license, produce and show to such ranger, member, constable, or person his license and the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait

used by him for taking, catching, or killing trout.

S. Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length from nose to tip of tail, taken or caught by any person, shall immediately be returned alive into the water from which the same is taken.

9. No person shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, in any of the said waters, any sawdust or sawmill refuse, or anything of any kind or description what-

ever poisonous, deleterious, or noxious to fish.

10. No person shall take, fish for, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, or have in his possession, any salmon, salmon-parr, or smolts, or the ova, young, or fry of any salmon in any stage whatever; and any of the above-named taken by accident or otherwise shall immediately be re-

turned to the water from whence it was taken.

11. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale within the district to which these regulations relate, any of the salmonidæ or trout, or take, fish for, catch, or kill any of the salmonidæ or trout in order to make sale of the same, without permission in writing under the hand of the Secretary of the said society.

12. The penalty for the breach of any of these regulations shall not be less than forty shillings or more than fifty

pounds.

REGULATIONS.

 No person shall use any net for the purpose of taking fish in Hall's Creek or in the Halswell or Kaituna Streams, or within a radius of one mile from the middle of such creek and streams, at the places where they flow into Lake Ellesmere at low-water ordinary spring-tides.

2. Any person committing a breach of the above regulation shall be liable to a penalty of not less than one pound and not exceeding fifty pounds.
