The arrest of offenders described in the *Police Gazette*, or respecting whom crime reports have been forwarded for insertion in the *Gazette*, should be promptly notified by the member of the Force effecting the arrest.

When notifying the arrest of persons charged with larceny, or suspected of larceny, it should be stated whether the property stolen, or any portion of it, has been recovered.

A description of property, supposed to be stolen, found in the possession of offenders, for which owners cannot be found, should be furnished for insertion in the Gazette.

#### Arson.

Between 11 p.m. on the 18th and 1 a.m. on the 19th May last, at Waimumu, near Mataura, Southland, two stacks of oats belonging to John Penny were destroyed by fire, and at an inquest held on the 15th ultimo a verdict was returned "That the stacks were fired by some person or persons unknown." As the property was mortgaged, and insured in the New Zealand Office for double its value, suspicion attached to the owner, and also to his father, James Penny.

AT 2 a.m. on the 26th May last the Railway Hotel, at Dipton, Southland, belonging to Mary Gorman, was destroyed by fire, and at an inquest held on the 29th ultimo a verdict was found to the effect that it was wilfully set fire to, but the evidence was insufficient to show by whom. The building and contents were insured.

At midnight of the 26th ultimo a threshing-machine, the property of John Chalker, Fairlie Creek, Canterbury, was discovered to be on fire. Insurance, £50 in the New Zealand Office; estimated loss, £50 more.

#### Offences Not Otherwise Described.

Sydney Morrison is charged with failing to comply with the conditions of his release under section 9, subsections 2 and 5, of "The First Offenders' Probation Act, 1886." Description: English, a labourer and sailor, forty-two years of age, 5ft. 8in. high, medium build, dark complexion, brown hair turning grey, grey eyes, medium nose, heavy dark moustache, "Rosetta Morrison" tattooed on right arm, mark of cut on nose, scar on lower lip; dressed in dirty dark-tweed suit. Convicted at the Supreme Court, Napier, on the 3rd March, 1891, of larceny as a bailee, sentenced to two years' probation, and ordered to pay £21 costs, but has failed to pay the first instalment or report himself. On the 23rd of May last he was discharged from Wanganui Gaol, having been committed for twenty-four hours, in default of fine, for drunkenness. Previously worked in the Momohaki Bush for

James Leo, of Waverley, and will most likely ship on board some vessel.

ADELAIDE.—Bruce E. Middleton is charged on warrant with having, on or about the 25th May last, embezzled the sum of £25, and a like amount on or about the 3rd ultimo, from Her Majesty's Government, Public Works Department, of which he was a clerk. Description: About twenty-seven years of age, 5ft. 3in. or 4in. high, medium build, fair complexion, hair cut close and parted in centre, slight fair moustache, light eyes, straight nose, square bulldog-looking face, surly expression; generally wears dark-tweed sac-suit and silver ring; a prominent South Australian football-player; associates with sporting-men and gamblers; last seen in Adelaide on 8th ultimo. Photograph now in Commissioner's Office. Arrest important. (91/1069.)

A MAN who gave his name as Dr. Kennedy ("Dr." is probably fictitious), is charged, on warrant issued by the Auckland Bench, with forging and uttering a cheque for £6 10s. to John W. Shackelford, hatter and draper, Queen Street, Auckland, on the 27th ultimo. Description: About twenty-eight years of age, about 5ft. 7in. or 8in. high, dark complexion, dark hair, small dark moustache only, rather thin face, medium build; dressed in dark coat trowsers and vest, sometimes wears a dark tight-fitting overcoat and has another one with a cape, hard black hat, brown-kid gloves, carries a stick; is of rather good address. The cheque is on the Bank of New Zealand, Auckland, and purports to be signed by Arthur Yates and Co., seedsmen. Complainant took it in payment of £1 4s. 6d. for three shirts, and gave offender the balance in cash. Offender left Auckland on the 27th ultimo, as a saloon-passenger, in the steamer "Richmond" for Tonga, in the name of Kennedy. He is supposed to have arrived from Sydney three days previously. There are several other similar charges against him.

ROBERT JOHNS, charged with using obscene language and failing to pay a fine at Temuka, has passed under the name of James Smith, and is now serving a sentence of two months for cruelty to a horse. (See preceding notice.)

CARL MILLER, charged with larceny as a bailee of Andis Wickland's property, has been arrested by Constable W. Walker, North-east Valley Police. Case dismissed. Articles recovered, except spring-balance.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

STOLEN on the 26th May last, from George Travers's hotel, Tuparoa, East Coast, a case of square gin, anchor brand; value £4 10s. Suspicion attached to Henare Huupe and Rawira Waikare. Description: First, forty years of age, 5ft. high, stout build, whiskers, beard, and small moustache. Second, thirty-two years of age, 5ft. 9in. high, medium build, small whiskers and moustache. Supposed gone to Heruherama.

STOLEN on the 23rd ultimo, from the Aurora Hotel, Victoria Street, Auckland, a wooden eight-day clock, 18in. by 10in., round face; value £1; the property of Samuel Tooman, licensee. Identifiable.

Between 9 p.m. on the 22nd and 9 a.m. on the 23rd ultimo Nathaniel Fowler's brewery, Manaia, Taranaki, was broken into, and 3s. 6d. in silver and 3 or 4 gallons of beer stolen.

Henry Scarf's gold breast pin, stolen from the Timaru Restaurant, Timaru, and Mary Jenkins's gold brooch, stolen from the Coffee Palace, Oamaru, have been recovered from Goldston's pawn-office, Dunedin, where they were sold on the 16th ultimo by a man answering the description of suspect, who is identical with James Robinson, charged with stealing Sydney German's watch, trousers, and vest from the Old Times Restaurant, Dunedin. Also a white pointer, with lemon-coloured forehead and ears, answers to "Grouse:" this dog, being of the Spanish type, has peculiar large head and ears, with heavy chops and flews, resembling a bloodhound. It is requested that a lookout may be kept for some months at the various ports, as it is considered they have been stolen for sale in Australia, and that vessels arriving there from this colony may be searched. Offenders gave the rug to Eva Smith, a prostitute.

#### Horse- and Cattle-Stealing.

RE Kemera Rangitiwhiria, charged with larceny of Tangata te Hapuku's mare: Offender belongs to Chinemutal Rotorua. His mother's name is Roka, and by sisters, Okura and Ngatu: the former is merried to Hareta Kerol. These people live sometimes of Olunemutu, Te Ngai, and Paeroa. There is no road to Casborne or Tolago Pay from Tarawera; the latter place is on the direct route from Hawke's Bay to Rotorua.

TE WHERO, otherwise Hohepa, charged with stealing F.
W. Littlewood's gelding, has been arrested by Constable B.
Sheehan, Te Kuiti Police, and committed for trial.

STOLEN between the 17th and 24th ultimo, from a paddock near Hilton, Canterbury, twenty three-quarter-bred ewes, 2-tooth, branded JS, back and front of near-ear bit close to head; value £14; the property of James Skinner.

SUPPOSED stolen on the 24th or 25th ultimo, at Katikati, near Tauranga, a heavy-draught bay mare, 17 hands high, branded HK on off hip, one hind foot white; value £15; the property of Alexander Turner. Deserting Wives and Families, &c.

WILLIE GEORGE is charged on warrant with deserting his wife, at Petone, Wellington, since the 29th April last. Description: English, a sailor or labourer, fifty-two years of age, 5ft. 7in. high, medium build, fair complexion, light brown hair whiskers and moustache (whiskers cut short), blue eyes, large prominent nose, full features, some front teeth missing; anchors, &c., tattooed on arms; short quick walk, swings his arms very much; dressed in blue-serge suit and soft-felt hat. Worked at Edward Barber's, Petone, as gardener, and was seen at the last sittings of the Supreme Court, Wellington.

DAVID MORRISON is charged, on warrant issued by the Reefton Bench, with having deserted his wife, at Reefton, since the 25th April last. Description: Scotch, a labourer and miner, about forty years of age, about 5ft. 7in. high, dark complexion, dark-brown hair beard whiskers and moustache, hair and whiskers turning grey; supposed dressed in dark-tweed clothes and hard-feft hat with crape band. He spoke of going to Westport to seek work, but cannot be found there.

JAMES McMaster is charged on warrant with disobeying an order of the Resident Magistrate's Court, Christchurch, made in November, 1887, to pay 2s. 6d. per week towards the support of each of his four children. Description: Irish, a labourer, forty-one years of age, about 6ft. high, slender build, stoops slightly, slovenly appearance, sandy beard whiskers and moustache, eyes inclined to be red; fond of drink and frequenting publichouses. He was £39 10s. in arrears on the 20th ultimo.

## Deserters from Her Majesty's Service.

From H.M.S. "Curaçoa," at Lyttelton.

Despatch .- Extradition Treaty with the Orange Free State.

Colonial Secretary's Office,

Wellington, 26th June, 1891. THE following despatch, received from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, is published for general information.

P. A. BUCKLEY.

(Circular.) Downing Street, 9th April, 1891. My Lord,—I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your Government, a copy of an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the 20th of March, 1891, for giving effect to the treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the Orange Free State for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, signed at Cape Town on the 20th of June, 1890, and at Bloemfontein on the 25th of June, 1890, the ratifications of which were exchanged at Bloemfontein on the 16th of December, 1890.

The treaty came into operation on the 6th instant, in conformity with Article XX.

[Extract from the London Gazette of Friday, March 27, 1891.] At the Court, at Windsor, the 20th day of March, 1891.

Present:

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY, LORD PRESIDENT, DUKE OF RUTLAND, LORD CHAMBERLAIN. WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, it was, amongst other things, enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent order, limit the operation of the order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient; and that if, by any law made after the passing of the Act of 1870 by the Legislature of any British possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within such possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in such British possession, Her Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Acts in the case of any foreign State, or by any subsequent order, suspend the operation within any such British possession of the said Acts, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to such foreign State, and so long as such law continues in force there and no longer:

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Canada passed in 1886, and entitled "An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals," provision is made for carrying into effect within the Dominion the surrender of fugitive

criminals:

And whereas by an Order of Her Majesty the Queen in Council, dated the seventeenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, it was directed that the operation of the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, should be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as the provision of the said Act of the Parliament of Canada of 1886 should continue in force and no longer:

And whereas a treaty was concluded on the twentieth and twenty-fifth days of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety, between Her Majesty and the President of the Orange Free State, for the mutual extradition of fugitive

criminals, which treaty is in the terms following:

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Honour the President of the Orange Free State, in the name of the Government of that Republic, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up

His Excellency Sir Henry Brougham Loch, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, Her Majesty's High Commissioner for South Africa, &c., acting on behalf and in the name of Her said Majesty; and His Honour Francis William Reitz, President of the Orange Free State, acting on behalf and in the name of the Government of the Orange Free State, have agreed upon and concluded the following

articles :-

#### ARTICLE I.

The high contracting parties engage to deliver up to each other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present treaty, those persons who, being accused or con-victed of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II., committed in the territory of the one party, shall be found within the territory of the other party.

#### ARTICLE II.

Extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences :

1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide,

poisoning), or attempt or conspiracy to murder.

2. Manslaughter.

3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

4. Rape.

5. Unlawful carnal knowledge, or any attempt to have unlawful carnal knowledge, of a girl under sixteen years of age, if the evidence produced justifies committal for those crimes according to the laws of both the contracting parties.

6. Indecent assault.

7. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child-stealing.

8. Abduction. 9. Bigamy.

10. Maliciously wounding or inflicting grievous bodily

The Officer Administering the Government of New Zealand.

Assault occasioning actual bodily harm.
 Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.

13. Perjury or subornation of perjury.

14. Arson. 15. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence,

larceny, or embezzlement.

16. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

17. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.

18. (a.) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.

(b.) Forgery, or counterfeiting or altering, or uttering what is forged, counterfeited, or altered.

(c.) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin of the realm.

19. Crimes against bankruptcy law.

20. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger the safety of any person travelling or being upon a railway

Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

22. Crimes committed at sea :-

(a.) Piracy by the law of nations.

(b.) Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

(c.) Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

(d.) Assault on board a ship on the high seas, with intent to destroy life or to do grievous bodily harm.

23. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute a criminal offence against the laws of both States.

The extradition is also to be granted for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both contracting parties.

Extradition may also be granted at the discretion of the State applied to in respect of any other crime for which, according to the laws of both the contracting parties for the time being in force, the grant can be made.

Either Government may, in its absolute discretion, refuse in any case to deliver up its own subjects to the other Government.

ARRICLE IV.

The extradition shall now take place if the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of the Orange Free State, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of the Orange Free State or in the United Kingdom respectively, for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

If the person claimed on the part of Her Majesty's Government, or on the part of the Government of the Orange Free State, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of the Orange Free State or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execuion of any punishment awarded to him.

ARTICLE V.

The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

ARTICLE VI.

A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

ARTICLE VII.

A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison, or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place, until he has been restored, or has had an opportunity of returning, to the State by which he has been surrendered. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

ARTICLE VIII.

The requisition for extradition shall be made through Her Majesty's High Commissioner for South Africa on behalf of the United Kingdom and Her Majesty's colonies or foreign possessions, not excluded from this treaty by Article XVIII., and through the Consul-General of the Orange Free State at London on behalf of the Government of the said State.

The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

A sentence passed in contumaciam is not to be deemed a conviction, but a person so sentenced may be dealt with as an accused person.

ARTICLE IX.

If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

#### ARTICLE X.

A fugitive criminal may be apprehended, under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such infor-mation or complaint, and such evidence, or after such pro-ceedings as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominious of the two contracting parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction; provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. The criminal shall, in accordance with this article, be discharged, as well in the Orange Free State as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of forty-five days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the diplomatic agent of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this treaty.

The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

#### ARTICLE XI.

The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and that the crime of which he has been convicted is one in respect of which extradition could, at the time of such conviction, have been granted by the State applied to; and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

#### ARTICLE XII.

In the examinations which they will have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to for said extradition shall admit as valid evidence the depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, under oath or under solemn affirmation to tell the truth, according as its legislation may affirmation to ten the truth, according as its legislation and provide, or the copies of these depositions or statements, and likewise the warrants issued and sentences pronounced in the State which demands the extradition, the certificates of the fact of the condemnation, or the judicial documents which prove it, provided the same are authenticated as follows

A warrant must purport to be signed by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

2. Depositions or affirmations, or the copies thereof, must purport to be certified, under the hand of a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State, to be the original depositions or affirmations, or to be true copies thereof, as the case may require.

3. A certificate of, or a judicial document stating the fact of, a conviction must purport to be certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or officer of the other State.

4. In every case such warrant, deposition, affirmation, copy, certificate, or judicial document must be authenticated either by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of the other State; but any other mode of authentication for the time being permitted by law in the State where the examination is taken may be substituted for the foregoing.

ARTICLE XIII.

If the individual claimed by one of the two high contracting parties, in pursuance of the present treaty, should be also claimed by one or several other Powers on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date,

#### ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, or within such further time as the State applied to, or the proper tribunal thereof, shall direct, the fugitive shall be set at liberty.

#### ARTICLE XV.

All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place; and the said delivery shall extend not merely to the stolen articles, but to everything that may serve as a proof of the crime.

#### ARTICLE XVI.

All expenses connected with extradition shall be borne by the demanding State.

#### ARTICLE XVII.

The present treaty shall apply to crimes and offences committed prior to the signature of the treaty.

#### ARTICLE XVIII.

The stipulations of the present treaty shall not be applicable to the South African colonies and possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

#### ARTICLE XIX.

With the exceptions mentioned in the preceding article, the stipulations of the present treaty shall be applicable to all the colonies and foreign possessions of Her Britannic Majesty, so far as the laws for the time being in force in such colonies and foreign possessions respectively will allow.

The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal

who has taken refuge in any of such colonies or foreign possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such colony or possession by the chief consular officer of the Orange Free State in such colony or possession.

Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such colony or foreign possession will allow, to the provisions of this treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British colonies and foreign possessions for the surrender of Orange Free State criminals who may take refuge within such colonies and foreign possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, and so far as the law of such colony or foreign possessions will allow, of the provisions of the present treaty.

Requisitions for the surrender of a fugitive criminal emanating from any such colony or foreign possession of Her

Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding articles of the present treaty.

#### ARTICLE XX.

The present treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the high contracting parties. It may be terminated by either of the high contracting parties by a notice not exceeding one year and not less than six months.

The treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be

exchanged at Bloemfontein as soon as possible.

In witness whereof the respective Plenipotentiaries have signed the same, and have affixed thereto the seal of their

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, and in virtue of the authority committed to her by the said recited Acts, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the sixth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, the said Acts shall apply in the case of the Orange Free State pursuant to the arrangement made by the said treaty with the President of the Orange Free State.

Provided always, and it is hereby further ordered, that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall be suspended within the Dominion of Canada so far as relates to the Orange Free State and to the said treaty, and so long as the provisions of the Canadian Act aforesaid of 1886 continue in force, and no longer; and provided also that the operation of the said Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, shall not extend to the South African colonies and possessions of Her Majesty so far as relates to the Orange Free State and to the said treaty.
