Arson.

HAWERA.—Thomas Henry Blackwell is charged on warrant with having, on the 10th November last, wilfully set fire to a four-roomed cottage at Normanby, the property of Felix Hungar. Description: Supposed a native of Wales, about forty-seven years of age, 5ft. 2in. high, heavy build, black beard whiskers and moustache, florid complexion, downcast look, awkward gait. (See *Police Gazette*, 1892, page 37.) Offender was working on the Rotokere Road, near Eltham, up to about the 21st ultimo, but has not been there since. Supposed to have gone in the direction of Wellington.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

CHRISTCHURCH.—William Scott is charged with failing to comply with the conditions of "The First Offenders Probation Act, 1886." Description: A native of the colony, sixteen years of age, 5ft. 3in. high, slight build, sallow complexion, sickly appearance, brown hair and eyes, subject to or shams epileptic fits. He was placed on probation for six months from the 25th ultimo, and handed over to Mr. Herrick, of the Christchurch Mission Home, whose supervision he has left. Is believed to be identical with a boy named Fake, an absconder from the Burnham Industrial School.

DUNEDIN.—Albert Hughes is charged on warrant of commitment (addressed to Robert Thomson Aitken, Inspector of Cruelty to Animals) for seven days' labour in default of paying £3 1s. 6d., fine and costs, for ill-treating a cow. He is a native of the colony, a labourer, sixteen years of age, slight build, dark complexion; dressed in white-moleskin trousers and light-coloured-tweed trousers. No further description can be obtained. Said to have gone up country to look for work.

HUNTERVILLE.—£25 Reward.—Alexander Dalzell, farmer, Otairi, reports that, between 8 p.m. on the 1st and 4 a.m. on the 2nd ultimo, the hair was cut off the mane and tail of a horse in his yard. Suspicion attached to John Woolston, a labourer, about twenty-six years of age, 5ft. 9in. high, medium build, dark complexion, brown eyes, black hair whiskers and moustache, long sharp chin (shaved). Lives at Hunterville. Complainant guarantees the above reward on conviction of the offender or offenders.

Illicit Distillation, &c.

(Circular Memo. No. 9/92.)

WITH reference to the illicit distillation which it is believed is still carried on in some of the inland districts, it is notified for general information and guidance that, although the rewards now offered under Customs G.O. No. 338 are very liberal, still, as a further incentive to zeal and energy, the Hon. the Defence Minister is pleased to direct that any conviction of importance obtained through the special exertions of a police official shall, on the recommendation of the Customs Department, be made a cause for promotion under Regulation No. 61.

The discovery and suppression of illicit distillation in

inland districts depend to a large extent, if not altogether, on the police, and at seaports they should be a valuable agency against smuggling.

Regulations for the Sale of Strychnine and Arsenic.

JAMES PRENDERGAST,

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this thirty-first day of March, 1892.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT
IN COUNCIL.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Sale of Poisons Act, 1871," His Excellency Sir James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the regulations following with respect to the sale of certain poisons, and doth declare that such regulations shall come into force and take effect on and after the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

REGULATIONS.

1. "The Sale of Poisons Act, 1871," is hereinafter referred to as "the said Act."

2. It shall not be lawful for any person to sell or dispose of strychnine or arsenic in any quantities unless such person shall, previous to making the entry required by the provisions of the twelfth section of the said Act, obtain from the intending purchaser of such strychnine or arsenic a statutory declaration setting forth the particulars hereinafter mentioned. Immediately upon completion of the purchase the seller of such poison shall forward such statutory declaration to the Registrar of the district appointed under the said Act: Provided that this regulation shall not apply to the sale of arsenic wholesale for use in the cure of diseases in sheep.

3. Every such declaration shall state precisely (1) the Christian name and surname of the intending purchaser at full length, together with his or her occupation and address; (2) the exact quantity and name of the poison required; and (3) the express purpose or purposes for which such poison is alone intended to be used, and the places or localities where the same is to be used or deposited respectively.

Shooting Season for Imported and Native Game, License-fee, &c., Hawera District.

JAMES PRENDERGAST,

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by "The Animals Protection Act, 1880," and the Acts amending the same, I, James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby notify that cock-pheasants and quail may be taken or killed within the Hawera District, consisting of the Counties of Hawera and Patea, from the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, both inclusive (subject nevertheless to the restrictions in the said Acts mentioned). And I do further notify that licenses to take or kill such game within the said district shall be issued on payment of the sum of twenty shillings each, and that licenses to sell game and native game shall be issued on payment of the sum of five pounds each; and the Postmasters at Hawera and Patea are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses.

And I do further declare that native game, excepting tui, huia, white heron, and crested grebe, may be taken or killed

within the above-mentioned district from the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, both days inclusive.

As witness the hand of His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, this thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the eleventh day of December then instant, as amended by a further Proclamation dated the eighth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the ninth day of April then instant, the area of Native land described in the First Schedule hereto was declared to be an area within which no license under "The Licensing Act, 1881," should be granted:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said Proclamations, and make other provisions in lieu thereof:

Now, therefore, I, James Prendergast, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred by "The Licensing Act, 1881" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, and acting with the consent and at the request of the owners of the lands described in the said First Schedule hereto, do hereby revoke the said recited Proclamations of the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and the eighth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, respectively, and in lieu thereof do hereby proclaim and declare that no license under the said Act shall be granted within the area of Native land described in the Second Schedule hereto, such area being a portion of the area described in the First Schedule aforesaid.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Provincial Districts of Auckland, Taranaki, and Wellington, bounded towards the north-west by Te Whararua Block, from the Aotea Harbour to the Waitetuna River; thence towards the north-east generally by the said Waitetuna River to its intersection by a right line running from Mount Tahuani over the Teriki Range, where the Native track crosses the latter; thence by the said right line to Mount Tahuani; thence by a right line to Mount Pirongia; thence by the confiscation boundary-line to and across the Waipa River to the Puniu River; thence by the latter river and again by the confiscation boundary-line to the Waikato River; thence by the said Waikato River to the Tatua West Block; thence towards the east by that block and the Whangamata Block to Lake Taupo; thence by a right line across that lake to the mouth of the Tauranga River, and by that river to its source in the Kaimanawa Range; thence towards the south-east and south by the summit of that range and the summits of the watersheds between the sources of the rivers Moawhanga and Waikato, and Waikato and Wangaeu, to Ruapehu Mountain; thence towards the south-west and south generally by the south-western boundary-lines of the Okahukura and the Aotea Blocks respectively to the Taranaki confiscation boundary-line; and thence by that boundary-line to the ocean; and thence towards the west and again towards the north-west by the sea.

SECOND SCHEDULE.
