### Arson.

[Extract from *New Zealand Gazette* of 7th July, 1892.]

*Arson.*—Free Pardon.—£150 Reward.

Department of Justice,  
Wellington, 6th July, 1892.

**WHEREAS** on or about the 19th June last the school-house situated in Hampden Street, Nelson, was set on fire:

This is to notify that His Excellency the Governor will grant a free pardon to any person implicated in the said fire, not being the principal offender, who will give such information as will lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one or more of the other offenders; and that a reward of £150 is offered to any person, not being the principal offender, who shall first give such information. **LINCOLN.**—£50 Reward: Between 5 p.m. and 11.30 p.m. on the 18th ultimo, at Tai Tapu, a clover-shelling machine, the property of James McVeigh, was maliciously set on fire and partly destroyed, and two clover-stacks close to, belonging to Henry E. Perryman, burnt down. A man, of whom no description can be given, was observed running away from the fire. The machine was insured for £170, and the stacks for £90, both in the Standard Office, under their respective values. Mr. Perryman guarantees the above reward on conviction of the offender or offenders.

**NASEBY.**—John Bruhns, Hyde, reports that, about 10 p.m. on the 11th ultimo, a stack of rye and straw, value £50, uninsured, was destroyed by fire. At an inquest, held on the 21st, a verdict of incendiarism was returned against some person or persons unknown.

**BALCLUTHA.**—Between 12.30 and 1.30 a.m. on the 3rd ultimo the Anglican church at Owake was destroyed by fire; and at an inquest, held on the 17th, a verdict was returned to the effect that such fire was wilfully caused by some person or persons unknown. The building was the property of the Diocesan Trustees, Dunedin; value £175; insured in the New Zealand Office for £100.

**REEFTON.**—About 12.55 a.m. on the 19th ultimo a five-roomed house at the corner of Church and Mace Streets, the property of Richard Wills, Merrijigs, was destroyed by fire, which, it is supposed, was wilfully caused. Insured in the Royal Office; building £100, furniture £30; about half the respective values.

**SHEFFIELD.**—Samuel Broomfield, hawker, Waddington, reports that, during his absence, between the 10th and 30th ultimo, his whare was wilfully set on fire, and damaged to the extent of £1 10s.

### Offences Not Otherwise Described.

**DUNEDIN.**—A warrant of distress has been issued against James Aitchison, in default of paying £5 19s., fine and costs, inflicted on the 3rd December last, for a breach of "The Gaming and Lotteries Act, 1881." Description: Scotch, about fifty years of age, 5ft. 10in. high, medium build, sandy beard whiskers and moustache; a frequenter of racetracks. If found, to be kept under surveillance, and a report sent to the Inspector of Police, Dunedin.

**DUNEDIN.**—Charles Hunter and Alexander Duquid are charged on warrants with having, on the 12th ultimo, maliciously broken seven panes of glass in the windows of Mrs. Catherine Cotter's house, Adelaide Street, South Dunedin, thereby causing damage to the extent of £1 4s. 6d. Hunter is a butchers' assistant, about twenty-three years of age, about 5ft. 5in. high, medium build, fair hair and complexion, little or no hair on face. Duquid is a tailor, about twenty-one years of age, about 5ft. 7in. high, fresh complexion, slight build, dark hair, none on face; usually wears a dark-tweed suit and soft black-felt hat. Both natives of the colony. There is another charge against them.

**PAHAUTANUI.**—The Judgeford School Committee report that, on the 14th or 15th ultimo, two rope-swings, value 7s. 6d., were maliciously cut. The Committee offer a reward of £2 for any information leading to the conviction of the offender.

**AUCKLAND.**—Henry Arthur Bond is charged with the larceny as a bailee, on the 2nd instant, of £6, money of William Knox, fish-curer, Albert Street. Description: A native of Sydney, a groom or labourer, about seventeen years of age, about 5ft. 2in. or 3in. high, dark hair, none on face, medium build, rather round-shouldered; dressed in dark

sac-coat and vest, printed-moleskin trousers, and hard black-felt hat. Offender, who was in complainant's employ, was sent to the latter's residence for £5 to pay wages; he, however, asked Mrs. Knox for £6, which he received and absconded with. No warrant.

LOUIS LE ROUZE, *alias* Le Ruez, is inquired for by the Auckland Police, with a view of compelling him to pay arrears owing for the support of his children when in the Girls' Industrial School, Parnell. WHEREAS an Order in Council prohibiting the exportation from the colony of all rock-oysters taken or produced in the waters of the colony was made, under the powers conferred by "The Fisheries Encouragement Act, 1885," on the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 77, of the fifteenth day of the same month:

And whereas so much of the said Order in Council of the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, as prohibited the exportation from the colony of shore oysters or mangrove oysters was revoked by Order in Council dated the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 14, of the eleventh day of the same month:

And whereas it is desirable to revoke the remainder of the said Order in Council of the sixth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one:

WHEREAS it is provided by the thirteenth section of "The Fisheries Encouragement Act, 1885" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), that the Governor may, by Order in Council, from time to time regulate or prohibit the exportation from the colony of any fish caught or produced

in the waters of the colony: And whereas it is also provided by the said Act that the term "fish" shall include oysters; And whereas it is advisable to prohibit the exportation of the oysters known as *Ostrea purpurea*, *Ostrea glomerata*, *Ostrea mordax*, or the rock, shore, drift or mangrove oyster respectively:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby prohibit, as from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the exportation from the colony of all oysters known as *Ostrea purpurea*, *Ostrea glomerata*, *Ostrea mordax*, or rock oysters, shore oysters, drift or mangrove oysters, or by whatever name they may be locally known respectively, taken or produced in the waters of the said colony.

Prohibiting Licenses on certain Native Lands.

(L.S.) GLASGOW, Governor.  
A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the fourteenth day of April then instant, the area of the Native land described in the First Schedule hereto was declared to be an area, within which no license under "The Licensing Act, 1881," should be granted:

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said Proclamation, and make other provisions in lieu thereof:

Now, therefore, I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred by "The Licensing Act, 1881" (hereinafter called "the said Act"), and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf, and acting with the consent and at the request of the owners of the lands described in the said Schedules hereto, do hereby revoke the said recited Proclamation of the thirteenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, and in lieu thereof do hereby proclaim and declare that no license under the said Act shall be granted within the area of Native land described in the Second Schedule hereto.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Provincial Districts of Auckland, Taranaki, and Wellington, bounded towards the north-west by Te Wharaurua Block, from the Aotea Harbour to the Waitetuna River; thence towards the north-east generally by the said Waitetuna River to its intersection by a right line running from Mount Tahuauui over the Teriki Range, where the Native track crosses the latter; thence by the said right line to Mount Tahuauui; thence by a right line to Mount Pirongia; thence by the confiscation boundary-line to and across the Waipa River to the Puniu River; thence by the latter river and again by the confiscation boundary-line to the Waikato River; thence by the said Waikato River to the Tatua West Block; thence towards the east by that block and the Whangamata Block to Lake Taupo; thence by a right line across that lake to the mouth of the Tauranga River, and by that river to its source in the Kaimanawa Range; thence towards the south-east and south by the summit of that range and the summits of the watersheds between the sources of the rivers Moawhanga and Waikato, and Waikato and Wangaehu, to Ruapehu Mountain; thence towards the south-west and south generally by the south-western boundary-lines of the Okahukura and the Aotea Blocks respectively to the Taranaki confiscation boundary-line; thence by that boundary-line to the ocean; and thence towards the west and again towards the north-west by the sea; excepting from the above-described area Subdivision C of the Orahiri Block, containing by admeasurement 1 acre.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Provincial Districts of Auckland, Taranaki, and Wellington, bounded towards the north-west by Te Wharaurua Block, from the Aotea Harbour to the Waitetuna River; thence towards the north-east generally by the said Waitetuna River to its intersection by a right line running from Mount Tahuauui over the Teriki Range, where the Native track crosses the latter; thence by the said right line to Mount Tahuauui; thence by a right line to Mount Pirongia; thence by the confiscation boundary-line to and across the Waipa River to the Puniu River; thence by the latter river and again by the confiscation boundary-line to the Waikato River; thence by the said Waikato River to the Tatua West Block; thence towards the east by that block and the Whangamata Block to Lake Taupo; thence by a right line across that lake to the mouth of the Tauranga River, and by that river to its source in the Kaimanawa Range; thence towards the south-east and south by the summit of that range and the summits of the watersheds between the sources of the Rivers Moawhanga and Waikato, and Waikato and Wangaehu, to Ruapehu Mountain; thence towards the south-west and south generally by the south-western boundary-lines of the Okahukura and the Aotea Blocks respectively to the Taranaki confiscation boundary-line; and thence by that boundary-line to the ocean; and thence towards the west and again towards the north-west by the sea.
