Arson.—Free Pardon.—£150 Reward.

Department of Justice,
Wellington, 6th July, 1892.
HEREAS on or about the 19th June last the schoolhouse situated in Hampden Street, Nelson, was set

on fire:

This is to notify that His Excellency the Governor will grant a free pardon to any person implicated in the said fire, not being the principal offender, who will give such information as will lead to the apprehension and conviction of any one or more of the other offenders; and that a reward of £150 is offered to any person, not being the principal offender, who shall first give such information. Lincoln.—£50 Reward: Between 5 p.m. and 11.30 p.m. on the 18th ultimo, at Tai Tapu, a clover-shelling machine, the property of James McVeigh, was maliciously set on fire and partly destroyed, and two clover-stacks close to, belonging to Henry E. Perryman, burnt down. A man, of whom no description can be given, was observed running away from the fire. The machine was insured for £170, and the stacks for £90, both in the Standard Office, under their respective values. Mr. Perryman guarantees the above reward on conviction of the offender or offenders.

Extending Time for Shooting Native Game, Canterbury.

GLASGOW, Governor.

Now, therefore, I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise of the powers vested in me by the said "Animals Protection Act, 1880," do hereby declare that native game, excepting tui, huia, white heron, and crested grebe, may be taken or killed in the aforesaid North Canterbury District, consisting of the Counties of Cheviot, Ashley, Akaroa, and Selwyn, until the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
