And I do further notify that licenses to take or kill such game within the said district shall be issued on payment of the sum of ten shillings each, and that licenses to sell game and native game shall be issued on the payment of the sum of five pounds each; and the Chief Postmaster at Napier, and the Postmasters at Waipawa, Woodville, Wairoa, Danevirke, Hastings, Mohaka, Waipukurau, Norsewood, Ormondville, Porangahau, and Wimbledon, are hereby appointed to sign and issue the said licenses.
