Murder.

£250 REWARD.—Whereas on the night of the 25th July, 1892, Richard Bell, a farmer, was shot at Lora Gorge, Southland (about fifteen miles from Winton): And whereas a double-barrelled gun (hereinafter described) was found close to the spot where deceased was shot, with one barrel discharged, and was no doubt the weapon used by the murderer, and such gun is now in possession of the Invercargill Police: It is hereby notified that a reward of £250 will be given to the person who first gives information as shall lead to the proof of in whose possession the gun was at the time of the said murder, or immediately previous thereto; such information to be given to the police not later than the 1st of February, 1893. Description of the gun: Double-barrelled, muzzle-loading, apparently new, of very inferior quality, and cheap kind; has the appearance of having lain in a damp place for some time; the ramrod is a manuka-twig, broken at the thick end, and about $\frac{3}{4}$ in. shorter than the barrels; the name "Moore" is stamped on each lock-plate, a crown at the back of hammer, and "London" on the bead-line between the barrels, about 6 in. from the breech; it is marked No. 13 on the web under the barrels, also SV, the latter letter horizontal; a small screw is missing from the left lock, and the left hammer does not work so freely as the right one. The right barrel was found loaded with powder somewhat dirty, No. 3 shot, slightly corroded, and wadding of ordinary brown paper.

Arson.

PATEA.—Between the 1st and 4th instant two unoccupied cottages, the property of R. A. A. Adams and James McKenna respectively, were wilfully set on fire inside the porches; rags and paper saturated with kerosene having been used.

In each case the fire went out before much damage was done. The bricks were also taken off the top of the chimney in McKenna's cottage, thrown down therein, and a register-grate broken. Larrikins suspected.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

PAHIATUA.—Andrew Dawson is charged on warrant of commitment to the Terrace Gaol, Wellington, for twelve months' labour, in default of finding sureties to keep the peace. Description: Colonial, a well-known pugilist and convicted thief, twenty-seven years of age, 6ft. high, fair hair and complexion, and small moustache only, medium build, weak eyes; dressed in dark-tweed suit and hard brown-felt hat. (See also *Police Gazette*, 1892, page 22.) He was fined £1 on the 11th ultimo for assaulting one Albert E. Costall, and allowed four days in which to obtain sureties, but has failed to do so. May make for Auckland, where his mother lives.

AUCKLAND.—Hugh Mattison, *alias* Eugene Matteson, &c., has returned from Sydney, and been arrested by Constable W. M. Jones. Released on obtaining the required sureties to keep the peace.

PALMERSTON NORTH.—The Railway Commissioners report that, between 6 and 9.45 p.m. on the 17th ultimo, a block of wood was wilfully placed across the line at Bunnythorpe.

OXFORD (CANTERBURY).—The Railway Commissioners report that, between 9 p.m. on the 2nd and 6 a.m. on the 6th instant, the line was wilfully obstructed by placing a sleeper across it.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

AUCKLAND.—Charles O'Mara Hart, Remuera, reports that, about midnight on the 17th September last, he was assaulted by three men in Customs Street East, and robbed of his watch (since recovered), a pair of new blucher-boots, size 9, nailed and tipped; a crimean-shirt, and 10s. or 12s. in silver. The watch was pledged on the 7th ultimo at John Mendoza's pawn-office, Victoria Street, by a man who gave his name as Simpson, and address, Paeroa, Thames. He is about twenty-three years of age, 5ft. 8in. or 9in. high, medium build, little or

no hair on face; wore a sac-suit. Can be identified by pawnbroker. The second man is described as about forty years of age, 5ft. 8in. high, stout build, dark complexion, full dark beard. Third, low sized, stout build. Complainant is unable to identify any of the offenders.

AUCKLAND.—Alfred O'Connor, coachman, reports stolen from the Government House Lodge, on the 31st ultimo, a new grey-tweed paget-coat, small size, two pockets behind, and one on outside of breast, light-brown buttons; value £3 10s. Identifiable. Slight suspicion is attached to James Evans, alias Edwards, for whose description see *Police Gazette*, 1892, pages 133 and 185.

AUCKLAND.—Wong Gong, Wakefield Street, reports that, between 7 and 10 p.m. on the 1st instant, his shop was broken into, and a gilt Albert-chain, links 3in. long, connected by short ones, value 7s. 6d., and £1 2s. 3d. in silver and coppers, stolen. Entrance effected by means of a duplicate key.

AUCKLAND.—George Race and William Pollock, bakers, Pitt Street, report that, between 7.45 and 10.30 p.m. on the 7th instant, their dwelling was broken into, and £8, the property of the former, and a double-bladed pocketknife, with black-bone handle, value 2s., the property of the latter, stolen.

RUSSELL.—W. J. Walsh, Postmaster, Opuā, reports that, during the night of the 31st ultimo, the office was broken into, and the following stolen: A small japanned cash-box, minus till, containing a green-coloured stamping-pad, pencils, penholders, &c.; and a wooden drawer (taken from the desk), 21in. by 18in. by 4in., fixed with four wooden cups, containing a post-office tape, 6ft. long, marked "Chesterman's Patent Constantia," and JC in a scroll; thirty-five penny postal cards, some old New Zealand stamps, a Fijian stamp, large ink-eraser, pens, &c.; value £1 1s.; the property of the Government. Entrance effected by smashing a window-sash with a mattock, which was found on the floor.

NEW PLYMOUTH.—France Carthew reports that, about 9 p.m. on the 29th ultimo, in Devon Street, a man dressed in Volunteer uniform, and riding a small-sized horse, presented a revolver at him, demanding his money and valuables, upon which complainant gave him a silver lever open-faced watch, maker Mark, No. 4760, value £5; and three three-penny-bits. Offender then rode off and stopped two other men, but got nothing from them. He then pranced up and down the street for a short time, and disappeared. Although seen by a number of people, no further description of him can be given.

OTAKI.—David John Dick reports stolen from his tent, between the 23rd and 29th ultimo, a silver Geneva hunting-watch, maker Russell, No. 10042, regulating-pin broken, seconds-hand gone, and back case loose, attached was a steel chain, large and small round links alternately, and a brass watch-key stamped "J. Young;" value £2.

Description: A native of the colony, a tanner, twenty-two years of age, 5ft. 11in. high, medium build, dark complexion hair and eyes, slight dark moustache; associates with spiliers, and frequents brothels. CHRISTCHURCH.—Mary Murrigan, cook, Scotch Stores Hotel, High Street, reports stolen from her bedroom, between the 24th and 28th ultimo, a ladies' silver Geneva hunting-watch, No. 4367, maker unknown; a long fine gold chain, 9-carat, long links joined by several small ones, and a red-leather purse, oblong shape, about 4in. by 2½in., fastens with a brass clasp; value £3 7s. Identifiable.

OAMARU.—Robert Johnston, Ure Street, reports stolen from his hut, between the 23rd and 27th ultimo, a pair of blue-tweed trousers, narrow dark stripes, cross pockets, waist fastens with hook and eye, size 5, nearly new; value £1 5s.

Suspicion attached to a man, name unknown, who was seen to enter complainant's gate. Description: Thirty-five to forty years of age, 5ft. 7in. high, stiff-set build, erect walk, supposed shaved except moustache; dressed in a brown coat, dark trousers, and black-felt hat; carried a parcel in a red handkerchief. Said to have left by train on the same day. His identification is doubtful.

MATAURA.—Ernest Le Petit, railway-surface-man, reports that, on the 28th ultimo, his hut was broken into, and three £1 notes and 12s. 6d. in silver stolen.

INVERCARGILL.—Jabez Lyons, butcher, Powelltown, reports stolen from outside his shop-door, on the 25th ultimo, a gentleman's brown macintosh, dolman-make, one side looks like indiarubber, a few small holes in it; value 15s. Identifiable.

INVERCARGILL.—Peter Bell, miner, Tay Street, reports stolen from him, while drunk, at the Park View Hotel, on the 27th or 28th ultimo, one £5 note on the Bank of New Zealand, twenty-one £1 notes, bank unknown, and a gentleman's gold signet-ring, stone of reddish colour with two dark spots near it, has been welded. Complainant suspects Annie Mary Blackmore, a prostitute, with whom he had been drinking, but the case is considered doubtful.

Stealing Otherwise than from the Person or from Dwellings.

WOODVILLE.—Thomas Cosgrove is charged on warrant with having, on the 16th ultimo, stolen from Thomas Quinlivan's stables a saddle belonging to one Percy Lewis, since recovered. Offender is a colonial, of Irish parentage, a labourer, seventeen or eighteen years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, slight build, fair complexion, slightly freckled, thin boyish face, blue eyes, fair hair, erect walk; dressed in dark-tweed sac-coat, dark-striped trousers, and grey-tweed hat with small turned-up brim; fond of racing and gambling in publichouses. He is also suspected of stealing, on the 17th ultimo, from the same premises, a half-worn saddle, colonial pads, one leather nearly worn through, fancy sewing on flaps, and a double-reined bridle, the head-piece of which is sewn on to a chain-bit; value £5 15s.; the property of Thomas Quinlivan, above mentioned. Offender is supposed to be at Palmerston North, Wanganui, or New Plymouth, and has relatives in the latter town. He sold Lewis's saddle to a George Ormond, at Palmerston North, three days after the theft, and it is now in the possession of the police.

Deserting Wives and Families, &c.

INVERCARGILL.—Francis Stone is charged on warrant with having deserted his wife, Ann, at Riverton, since the 28th September last. Description: A Cornishman, thirty-seven years of age, 5ft. 10½in. high, stout build, fresh complexion, dark hair, light-brown beard whiskers and moustache (rather long), smart active appearance, an old mark like a half-moon on forehead; dressed in dark navy-blue coat and vest, dark-tweed trousers, and soft black-felt hat; carried a reddish-brown overcoat. May be accompanied by Isabella McKay, twenty years of age, very tall and slender, fair complexion and hair, good-looking; wore a light fancy-straw hat, maroon dress trimmed with black braid and small fancy red buttons in front, and grey jacket; carried a light ulster trimmed with black shaggy fur. She left Invercargill for Dunedin on the 14th instant, saying she would stay at Mrs. Sick's Temperance Hotel. Offender drew his money from an Invercargill bank, and is supposed to have gone to Dunedin some few days previously. He recently kept the Reefers' Arms Hotel, Maori Point, near Skippers, and said he was going to look for another hotel.

HAWERA.—Thomas McDonald is charged on warrant with having deserted his wife Minnie, since about the 25th April last. Description: A farmer or labourer, about forty-five years of age, about 5ft. 7in. high, stout build, very round shoulders, sandy hair (turning grey), full beard and moustache, partly bald, cut on lip. He was inquired for in June last (see *Police Gazette*, 1892, page 97), but the description then given differs slightly from the foregoing, which has been furnished by complainant, who thinks he may be about Masterton or the Taieri Plains. It is, however, considered probable that she may wish to put the police on the wrong track.

WESTPORT.—Thomas Stokes is charged on warrant with refusing to contribute towards the support of his illegitimate child by Winifred Mary Jones. Description: A native of the colony, a painter, about twenty-one years of age, 5ft. 4in. high, slight build, thin features, wore a dark suit, hard brown-felt hat, and new boots or slippers. He left for Wanganui on the 11th ultimo, and lodged there at Mrs. Low's, River Bank, up to the 4th instant, when he left surreptitiously, his effects being handed over to the police. His two brothers are still in Wanganui.

HENRY CUST HANKINSON is inquired for by his uncle, Robert C. Taylor, C.E., Christchurch. Description: Born in New Zealand, a clerk, nineteen years of age, 5ft. 7in. or 8in. high, black hair, dark complexion and eyes, may have small moustache, good-looking, 10 to 11 stone weight, gentlemanly, plays the piano, and fond of music. May take up with some theatrical company. Was employed by Ornant and Davidson, solicitors, Hobart, who have been communicated with, but can give no information. In his last letter, dated Hobart, 24th January, 1892, he said he was leaving for the New South Wales goldfields, and gave his address as "Care of Commercial Banking Company, Pitt Street, Sydney." IN pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by "The Animals Protection Act, 1880," I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, do hereby notify and declare that the imported birds known as black swans (*Cygnus atratus*) are established in the Otago Provincial District, and are to be considered as native game; and I also declare that this notification shall take effect from and after the date hereof.

As witness the hand of His Excellency the Governor, this second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two.
