Murder.

£250 REWARD.—Whereas on the night of the 25th July, 1892, Richard Bell, a farmer, was shot at Lora Gorge, Southland (about fifteen miles from Winton): And whereas a double-barrelled gun (hereinafter described) was found close to the spot where deceased was shot, with one barrel discharged, and was no doubt the weapon used by the murderer, and such gun is now in possession of the Invercargill Police: It is hereby notified that a reward of £250 will be given to the person who first gives information as shall lead to the proof of in whose possession the gun was at the time of the said murder, or immediately previous thereto; such information to be given to the police not later than the 1st of February, 1893. Description of the gun: Double-barrelled, muzzle-loading, apparently new, of very inferior quality, and cheap kind; has the appearance of having lain in a damp place for some time; the ramrod is a manuka-twig, broken at the thick end, and about $\frac{1}{4}$ in. shorter than the barrels; the name "Moore" is stamped on each lock-plate, a crown at the back of hammer, and "London" on the bead-line between the barrels, about 6 in. from the breech; it is marked No. 13 on the web under the barrels, also SV, the latter letter horizontal; a small screw is missing from the left lock, and the left hammer does not work so freely as the right one. The right barrel was found loaded with powder somewhat dirty, No. 3 shot, slightly corroded, and wadding of ordinary brown paper.

Special Inquiry.

On the 14th instant a man giving the name of John Buckley, and his address, Big King Street, Wellington, called at the Seacliff Lunatic Asylum, and represented himself as brother-in-law to a patient, Annie Ritchie, whose

release he obtained. He stated he was going to take her to Wellington by the s.s. "Penguin," but they did not book from Dunedin or Lyttelton, and it appears that there is no street of the name given in Wellington. The Medical Superintendent, Dr. King, is now anxious to have the patient returned to the asylum. She is from forty-five to fifty years of age, medium height, spare build, very thin face, small head, black hair streaked with grey and cut short, stoops slightly, hangs her head, and has a vacant demented look; wore a black dress, blue ulster, black bonnet with red flowers, and thick black veil. She was committed on the 9th September, 1863, but it is not known from where. Buckley is thirty-five to forty years of age, medium height and build, sandy beard whiskers and moustache; dressed in a tweed-suit. They went by train to Dunedin, and were seen partaking of luncheon with another woman, name unknown, in the Triangle on the above date. The patient was also seen alone in that locality during the same evening. Special efforts are requested to trace these people, and any information obtained should at once be communicated to Inspector Hickson, Dunedin.

Arson.

NELSON.—At 2.30 a.m. on the 24th instant the Tasman Street Boys' School, the property of the Government, was found to be on fire in the centre room, which was entirely destroyed. There is no doubt that it was the work of an incendiary, who appears to have entered the building at an unlocked door.

AUCKLAND.—Robert Clarke, Manukau Road, Epsom, reports stolen from his dwelling, between the 5th September last and 5th instant, two white table-cloths, almost new, one large size, the other small; and a white-linen sheet, marked "R. Clarke, No. 3, 1878;" value £3. Identifiable.

AUCKLAND.—Susan Hamley, Karangahape Road, reports stolen from her at the cattle-show, Epsom, on the 11th instant, an old dark-brown-leather purse, containing £2 10s. Purse identifiable.

AUCKLAND.—George Sibbins, Edward Street, Devonport, reports stolen from off his verandah, between the 8th and 12th instant, nine Fijian shells—five known as "spider," and the others as "tiger;" value £1 10s. Identifiable.

AUCKLAND.—Edward Hope, Ardmore, Papakura, reports stolen from him at the Auckland Railway-station, on the 14th September last, a gold Geneva keyless hunting-watch, about the size of a shilling, No. 16064, glass broken in front; and a gold albert-chain, EAH engraved on lob; value £26 10s. Suspicion attached to Henry Follas Ereny, a passenger with complainant in the s.s. "Talune" from Sydney on the above date, and who accompanied him to the station. Suspect is now awaiting trial for larceny from Regan's Hotel, Freeman's Bay.

WANGANUI.—Thomas James Gibbs reports stolen from his dwelling on the Industrial School Reserve, on the 13th instant, a ladies' gold lever half hunting-watch, makers Russell and Son, Liverpool, number unknown, AEG in monogram on back; and a ladies' gold double albert-chain, long links, with gold tassel-pendants; value £17. Suspicion attached to Mary Connor, complainant's servant.

PAHIATUA.—Mrs. E. Bacon reports that about 10.30 p.m. on the 14th instant, while crossing the river-bed near Pahiatua, she was accosted by a man who robbed her of a kid purse, 4in. by 3in., two compartments, containing about £7; a ladies' silver Geneva double-cased watch, maker and number unknown, with silver chain, cord-pattern, and tassel attached; a wedding-ring and keeper; value in all £13 2s. 6d. Complainant states that the thief pulled a mask off his face, but she can give no description of him except that he had a nice soft hand. The case is considered doubtful.

One of the £10 notes can be identified, as it is very black and dirty, the reading, except at one end, being scarcely legible.

Description: A native of the colony, a painter, about twenty-one years of age, 5ft. 4in. high, slight build, thin features; wore a dark suit, hard brown-felt hat, and new boots or slippers. He left for Wanganui on the 11th ultimo, and lodged there at Mrs. Low's, River Bank, up to the 4th instant, when he left surreptitiously, his effects being handed over to the police. SYDNEY.—James Wignall is charged on warrant, issued on the 1st September, with having deserted his wife, Nellie Wignall, about four weeks previously. Description: A Yorkshireman, a wool-classer, twenty-eight years of age, about 5ft. 6in. high, rather stout build, dark hair turning grey, dark side whiskers and long moustache, shaved on chin or may have grown a beard, fresh complexion, blue eyes, slightly bow-legged. Said to be well known to Detective Kirby, now at Napier. In May last a man named Williamson, who answers the description, and no doubt is identical with the offender, arrived in Taranaki from Christchurch, and left again on the 24th July following, *via* Auckland, for Sydney, from whence he returned to New Plymouth on the 22nd September last. He went away shortly afterwards, in what direction is not known, leaving Mrs. Williamson and child behind. It would therefore seem that offender, while in Sydney, committed bigamy with the complainant, and special efforts are requested to ascertain his whereabouts. He told a neighbour that he was going to England, but this is considered to have been said for the purpose of misleading. Information to be sent to the Commissioner's Office before taking action. SYDNEY.—Richard Alfred Dunn (has assumed the name of George Dunn) is charged on warrant, issued on the 21st ultimo, with having deserted his wife and two children about five years ago. Description: About forty-nine years of age, about 6ft. high, medium build, dark complexion, dark curly hair, tattoo-mark, believed to resemble a compass and square, on fore arm, a native of Sydney, a sea-captain by profession. He is said to be living with a woman by whom he has had two children, and to be employed as manager of a gold-mine at the Thames, but no trace of him can be obtained throughout that district. Further inquiries are requested, and, if found, he should be informed that, unless he remits means for the support of his wife and family, the warrant will be enforced. Inquest.

CHARLESTON (WESTLAND).—On the 24th September last the remains of a man, apparently of slender build, and brown hair turning grey, were found on the beach, seven miles south of Brighton, and at the inquest held on the 2nd ultimo a verdict of "Found dead" was returned. The clothing consisted of a blue diagonal-cloth coat, grey vest, coloured-moleskin trousers, cotton shirt, blucher-boots (uppers cut away), soft black hat, and a peculiar head-cover, made of tin, lined with cloth, fastened by pieces of hide, and formed so as to cover the nose and back of head. Three eye-glasses, two ties, three pocketknives, brown blanket, tent, pair of swag-straps, and a kit of mussels were also found. A man of eccentric manner, wearing a similar head-dress, has frequently been seen on the roads between Greymouth and Westport during the past two years. He is said to have given his name as John Ross, of Dundee, Scotland, single, and no doubt the remains found were his. Further inquiries concerning him are, however, requested. He appears to have been last seen at Lyell about five months ago. (I.R. 611.)

Supreme Court Criminal Sittings, 1893.

CRIMINAL sittings of the Supreme Court for the year 1893 have been fixed as follows:—

AUCKLAND, on the following days, at 11 a.m.: Tuesday, 7th March; Monday, 29th May; Monday, 28th August; Monday, 27th November.

Treaty between Great Britain and United States of America respecting Merchant Seamen Deserters.

MY LORD,—I have the honour to transmit to you, for publication in the colony under your government, a copy of a treaty between the Governments of Great Britain and the United States of America relative to merchant seamen deserters, signed at Washington on the 3rd of June, and of which the ratifications were exchanged at Washington on the 1st August last, together with a copy of an Order of the Queen in Council, dated the 18th of August, extending the provisions of "The Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," to the United States.

TREATY BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND THE UNITED STATES RESPECTING MERCHANT SEAMEN DESERTERS.—[Signed at Washington, 3rd June, 1892. Ratifications exchanged at Washington, 1st August, 1892.]

WHEREAS the Governments of Great Britain and the United States of America are desirous to make provision for the apprehension, recovery, and restoration of persons who may desert from merchant-vessels of their respective countries while in the ports of the other country, and to conclude a treaty for the above purpose, the high contracting parties have accordingly appointed as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude the said treaty, that is to say,—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland: Sir Julian Pauncefote, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the United States; and

The President of the United States of America: James G. Blaine, Secretary of State of the United States;

Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers found in due and good form, have agreed upon the following articles:—

ARTICLE I.

The Consuls-General, Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents of either of the high contracting parties, residing in the dominions, possessions, or colonies of the other, shall have power to require from the proper authorities the assistance provided by law for the apprehension, recovery, and restoration of seamen who may desert from any ship belonging to a subject or citizen of their respective countries while in the ports of the other country. If, however, any such deserter shall have committed any crime or offence in the country where he is found, his surrender or restoration may be delayed until the proper tribunal before which the case shall be pending, or may be cognisable, shall have pronounced its sentence, and the sentence shall have been carried into effect.

It is understood that the preceding stipulations shall not apply to the subjects or citizens of the country where the desertion shall take place.

ARTICLE II.

The present treaty shall be ratified, and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London or at Washington without delay.

ARTICLE III.

The present treaty shall come into operation at the expiration of thirty days from the date of the exchange of ratifications. It shall remain in force for five years after that date, and thereafter until terminated by a twelve months' notice to be given by either high contracting party to the other.

In faith whereof we, the respective Plenipotentiaries, have signed this treaty, and have hereunto affixed our seals.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.—SEAMEN DESERTERS (UNITED STATES).

At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the eighteenth day of August, 1892.

THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY,
Lord Chancellor, Lord President, Lord Privy Seal, Marquess of Salisbury, Marquess of Lothian, Lord George

Hamilton, Viscount Cross, Secretary Lord Knutsford, Mr. Secretary Stanhope, Mr. Goschen, Mr. Balfour, Sir J. Parker Deane.

WHEREAS by "The Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," it is provided that, whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities are or will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant-ships in the territories of any foreign Power, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council stating that such facilities are or will be given, declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant-ships belonging to a subject of such Power when within Her Majesty's dominions shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation of such order, and may render the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being citizens of the United States) who desert from British merchant-ships in the territories belonging to the said United States will be given under a treaty between Her Majesty and the President of the United States, signed at Washington on the third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the ratifications of which were exchanged on the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that, from and after the publication hereof in the *London Gazette*, seamen, not being slaves and not being British subjects, who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant-ships belonging to citizens of the United States shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships: Provided always that, if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, he may be detained till he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence, if any, has been carried into effect.

And the Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, and the Secretary of State for India in Council are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
