Arson.

WAIPAWA.—About 1 a.m. on the 26th ultimo a shed, the property of Dr. R. von Mirbach, was set on fire and damaged to the extent of £3, and at an inquest held on the 4th instant a verdict was returned to the effect that the fire was wilfully caused by some person unknown.

PUREKOHE.—James McAllister, for forging and uttering a cheque to Thomas Kinsey, Patumahoe: A warrant has been issued by the Auckland Bench for offender's arrest.

Waverley.—James Walker, charged with forging and uttering a cheque to W. H. Southcombe: It has been ascertained that this offender is identical with Duncan Calvert Monteith, alias H. M. Brandon, wanted for obtaining money by means of a valueless cheque from Robert T. Batley, Moawhanga, on the 21st December last. (Vide Police Gazette, 1893, page 2.) Amended description: Scotch, a woolclasser, about sixty years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, slight build, grey hair, florid complexion, dark-brown side-whiskers and moustache, chin shaved, small face, lips and mouth disfigured, teeth gone, except a few front ones, which are very black; dressed in a brown-tweed suit, black slouch hat, Zealandia shooting-boots (new), with nails. He is further charged with having forged and uttered a cheque for £4 2s. to Thomas Ellis, of the Commercial Hotel, Waverley, on the 2nd instant. Arrest important.

Wanganui.—Griffith L. Davies is charged on warrant with having, on or about the 9th instant, embezzled the sum of £2, money of his employers, Dimond and Hart, photo.-enlargers, Wellington. Description: A native of South Australia, twenty-seven years of age, 5ft. 9in. high, fair complexion, long fair hair, medium build, slight moustache only, weak eyes; dressed in a dark-tweed coat and vest, check-tweed trousers (worn at bottoms), hard black hat, and lace-up boots (worn at sides); gentlemanly appearance. He was employed to obtain orders for enlargements, it being stipulated that all moneys were to be remitted to his employers within forty-eight hours after receipt. He received the above amount from a Miss Sweeney, but has failed to account for it, and is supposed to have left for New Plymouth by train on the 22nd instant. Other charges pending.

HAWERA.—G. Cameron (name probably fictitious) is charged on warrant with having, on the 19th ultimo, at Normanby, uttered to George Robert Marsh, storekeeper, a forged cheque for £5 10s. Offender is about twenty-four years of age, about 5ft. 7in. high, medium build, rather heavy shoulders, full round face, dark hair and complexion, small dark moustache, very small side-whiskers; has the appearance, but not the accent, of a Scandinavian. He purchased a waterproof coat for £2 10s., receiving the balance in change. The cheque purports to be signed by H. F. Turner, but has been returned marked "Signature unknown."

Wellington.—George Kidd, a passenger per s.s. "Mawhera" to Hokitika, reports that on the 25th ultimo the sum of £2 was obtained from him by false pretences. He was accosted by a stranger, who said he also was a passenger, and asked him to walk to the Royal Oak Hotel to see about his luggage. On their way thither they were overtaken by a man in porter's garb, who, addressing the stranger, said he had put his luggage on board, and asked for payment of the hotel bill, at the same time presenting a piece of paper. For this alleged purpose the person so addressed obtained the above amount from complainant, saying he would repay it on board, but disappeared with his confederate, the bogus porter. Offenders are supposed to be James Jefferd and John Moore, who are now said to be in Christchurch. The former is about 5ft. 5in. high, thin features, dark complexion, brown hair, squints. Moore is a native of the colony, a labourer, 5ft. 9½in. high, fair hair and complexion, blue eyes, medium nose. Complainant's address is Kaponga, Hawera. No warrant.

Extending Time for Shooting Native Game, Inangahua District.

GLASGOW, Governor.

WHEREAS by a warrant made under "The Animals Protection Act, 1880," dated the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the fourteenth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, it is, amongst other things, notified that native game, with certain exceptions, may be taken or killed in the Inangahua District from the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three: And whereas it is expedient to extend the time during which the said native game may be taken or killed in the aforesaid district:

Now, therefore, I, David, Earl of Glasgow, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise of the powers vested in me by the said "Animals Protection Act, 1880," do hereby declare that native game, excepting tui, huia, white heron, and crested grebe, may be taken or killed in the aforesaid Inangahua District, consisting of the County of Inangahua, until the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three.
