### Offences Not Otherwise Described.

Moawhanga.—Duncan Calvert Monteith, alias H. M. Brandon, is charged, on warrant issued by the Napier Bench, with having, on the 21st ultimo, at Moawhanga, obtained from Robert T. Batley, storekeeper, the sum of £3 by means of a valueless cheque. Offender is about sixty-five years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, very grey hair, moustache only, teeth gone except four front ones, which are large and very black; dressed in dark-tweed suit and dark-felt hat, nearly new. (See also Police Gazette, 1889, page 191, and 1891, page 99.) He arrived by coach from Napier, and obtained the amount in exchange for his cheque on the National Bank, which has been returned marked "No account." He then left for Karioi, and was seen next morning on the road to Wanganui.

Wanganui.—Leo William De La Fontaine, alias William Evans, is charged on warrant with having, on or about the 3rd instant, forged and uttered to Hugh Black, Victoria Avenue, a cheque for £9 9s. Description; A French Canadian, a sailor and labourer, twenty-seven or twenty-eight years of age, 5ft. 8½in. or 9in. high, over 40in. round chest, clean-shaved except fair to auburn moustache, JE in heart tattooed on left wrist, large wound-mark at left armpit, bullet-wound on left side, three upper front teeth out; wore a blue-tweed hat and black or dark sac-coat; served on a man-of-war for some years; was a soldier in the Salvation Army at Feilding. Offender purchased two blank cheques at the Bank of Australasia, Wanganui, filled one in for the above amount (purporting to be signed by Edward Dunn, in favour of Charles Clarke), and paid it to complainant for £1 10s. worth of goods, receiving the balance in change. No such person as Dunn is known to the bank. The other cheque (No. 119413) has not yet been presented. Offender left Feilding surreptitiously during the night of the 5th instant, leaving his effects behind. He was seen in Marton on the following day, and went in the direction of Bull's.

Wellington.—Walter Williams, alias Turpin, is charged on warrant with false pretences on Annie Kelly, servant at the Cambridge Hotel. Description: A colonial, a cashbetter, thirty-five years of age, 5ft. 10in. or 11in. high, slight build, sallow complexion, dark moustache only. Offender obtained the sum of £109 14s. from complainant, on the 5th instant, on the pretence of marrying her, and entering into possession of the Rainbow Hotel, Kaiwara. He left by train for the north on the following day.

Petone (Wellington).—John Mitchell is charged on warrant with having, on the 4th instant, wilfully and obscenely exposed his person to Gertrude and Grace Hartley. Offender is a Frenchman, about forty years of age, 5ft. 9in. high, stout build, sallow complexion, light-brown hair cut short, sandy whiskers and moustache, long sandy beard; dressed in dirty brown-tweed coat and vest, dirty moleskin trousers, and light straw hat. He was summoned to appear at the Resident Magistrate's Court on the 11th instant, but left by train for Wellington on the previous day.

Accused obtained the loan of the coat, and a few days afterwards it was found to have been sold to S. Cohen, a pawnbroker.

# Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

Auckland.—Frederick Gaudin, licensee, Grand Hotel, reports stolen from the bar, on the 31st ultimo, a silver lemon-knife, round ivory handle, saw edge, flowering on blade; value 7s. 6d. Identifiable.

AUCKLAND.—John Bushell, Lower Vincent Street, reports stolen from him at the Epsom Racecourse, on the 31st ultime, eight £1 notes.

AUCKLAND.—John McKenzie, Daily News office, New Plymouth, reports stolen from him during the passage from the latter port in the s.s. "Takapuna," or at Auckland, on the

30th or 31st ultimo, a brown-leather purse, containing four £1 notes and a Union Company's return-ticket in complainant's name.

Auckland.—Thomas Edward Fitzgerald, Waitemata Street, Ponsonby, reports stolen (supposed), between the 16th November last and 29th ultimo, a small jewel-box, lined with silk velvet, tray on top, containing a pair of old-fashioned gold earrings, hoop-shape, set with about fifty small pearls; three rosettes, set with about fifty large pearls; a ladies' double-cased gold watch, large size, old fashioned, maker and number unknown; a gold scarf-pin, large nuggethead; blue-enamelled ditto, woman's head, set with four diamonds; an ivory ditto, death's head setting; two gentlemen's gold watch-chains, oblong links; a gentlemen's gold ring, greenstone shield; an oval miniature on ivory of a colonel, dated 1820, size 3in. by  $2\frac{1}{2}$ in., set with twenty-four diamonds inside the frame; three red-coral shirt-studs, three torquoise vest-buttons, a gold horseshoe scarf-pin, walking-stick pattern, with ivory head; and a number of other articles which cannot be described; estimated value £100. Complainant, who was absent during the time above mentioned, missed the box on his return. The doors and windows were securely fastened, and there is no sign of any one having entered the dwelling.

Deserting Wives and Families, &c.

FOXTON.—Alfred Ball is charged on warrant with having deserted his wife, Helen, since May last. Description: A native of Nelson, a labourer, thirty-six years of age, about 5ft. 2in. high, slight build, fair hair and complexion, clean-shaved except moustache, blind in left eye, AB tattooed on arm; when last seen was dressed in blue serge; attends Salvation Army meetings. He left Coley's flax-mills, Orona River, during the above month, intending to seek employment at the Longburn Freezing-works, but has not been heard from since. Complainant and five children are being supported by the Charitable Aid Board.

Wellington.—Henry Alexander Scott is charged on warrant with failing to provide his wife and infant with adequate means of support since the 7th ultimo. Description: A native of New Zealand, a baker, thirty-four years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, stout build, fair complexion, brown hair, grey eyes. He is said to have left Wellington on the 8th July last by the s.s. "Hauroto" for Sydney, and is supposed to have gone to Melbourne. (92/1373.)

Christchurch.-William Stevenson is charged on warrant with disobeying an order of Court, made on the 29th September last, to pay 2s. 6d. a week for the support of each of his six children. Description: English, a sailor, forty-eight years of age, 5ft. 10in. high, medium build, dark-brown hair turning grey, bald on top of head, clean-shaved except brown moustache, grey eyes; generally wears a serge suit and soft-felt hat.

-George Lemon is charged on warrant with REEFTON .having deserted his wife, Mary Ellen, about four years ago. Description: A native of London, a labourer, thirty-five years of age, 5ft. 21in. high, slender build, dark complexion, black hair, small black moustache and goatee, mark under left eye caused by a kick from a horse when a boy, third finger of right hand off; may be employed at some factory. The above is an amended description of offender, and, the original warrant being informal, a fresh one was issued on the 11th instant by the Resident Magistrate.

DUNEDIN.—John McGregor, for disobeying an order to support his wife: This offender, who for some time past has been staying with his father at Kelso, too ill for removal, left on the 7th instant, presumably for the Dunedin Hospital, but has not arrived there. He will probably endeavour to leave the colony.

MASTERTON.—Thomas Adian Lyons is charged on warrant with having deserted his wife, Mary, since the 9th October, 1890. Description: A native of New South Wales, about thirty-eight years of age, 6ft. in. high, square build, blue or grey eyes, dark hair turning grey, small dark whiskers and moustache only, long thin nose, chin turning upwards, big feet and turns his toes slightly inwards when walking, has a scar on forehead, which may be covered with his hair; has been employed on stations, but may now be a commercial traveller. He is said to have been seen at Sydney during February last, but subsequent inquiries there have failed to trace him. (92/578.)

Age, fifteen years and ten months, 5tt. 4in. high, stout build, dark complexion; dressed in a brown-tweed suit and brown slouched hat. Committed at Dunedin, on the 22nd February, 1886.

Queenstown.—William Kirk is charged on warrant with the larceny as a bailee, at Arthur's Point, about April, 1891, of a black gelding, light build, six years old, 14½ hands high, little or no hair along backbone, branded  $\Omega$  on near shoulder; value £12; the property of Thomas Begg, Upper Branches, Shotover. Offender is a native of the colony, a horsebreaker, about thirty-three years of age, 5ft. Sin. high, active build, swarthy complexion, right leg amputated and wears a cork one, but this is scarcely notice able; fond of drink, and quarrelsome when intoxicated. The horse was intrusted to the accused to break in and work for twelve months; he, however, took it away with him, and in April, 1891, sold it for £9 to one Jess Flynn. Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by "The Fisheries Con-servation Act, 1884," and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, doth hereby amend the said regulation number two, by adding the following words thereto:

"Provided, moreover, that it shall be lawful for the said Secretary or his Deputy, on or after the twentieth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, to issue licenses to men for the sum of twelve shillings and sixpence.'
