NEW ZEALAND POLICE GAZETTE.

A "POLICE GAZETTE" for the colony is published at Wellington.

All communications concerning this *Gazette* should be addressed to the Commissioner of Police, Wellington, and the envelope marked "For *Gazette*." Members of the Force in charge of out-stations will forward them *direct*. They must be of police interest, or no notice will be taken of them.

The non-delivery of the *Gazette* at any station to be promptly reported, and pressing inquiry made to trace the same.

CRIME REPORTS.—A copy of each crime report should be immediately forwarded to the Commissioner's Office for *Gazette* purposes.

WARRANTS.—All reports of crime must state whether a warrant has been issued for the arrest of the offender, and by whom and where. Should a warrant not have been issued in the first instance, but one be subsequently obtained, a supplementary report announcing the issue must be immediately forwarded to all places where the original report has been sent. The supplementary report should give the date of the original crime report, or quote the date and page of the *Police Gazette* in which the previous notice has appeared. Persons reporting crimes should be requested to obtain warrants whenever practicable.

Offenders should be accurately described; their native country, usual occupation, age, height, dress, and every particular likely to lead to their arrest and identification minutely given.

NAMES.—It is particularly requested that in all crime reports the names of persons and places may be spelt correctly and written legibly, the Christian name being given with the surname whenever possible, and written in full to prevent mistakes.

STRAY CATTLE, ETC.—No advertisement of lost horses or cattle will be published in this *Gazette* unless they be Government property; but notices of horses or cattle believed to be stolen will be inserted.

PROPERTY DESCRIBED.—The age, height, breed, colour, particular marks, value, &c., of horses should be given, and the brands imitated as nearly as possible, and their exact position stated. Cattle and sheep should also be carefully described, and earmarks given distinctly, in *writing*. In forwarding the brands of horses and cattle per telegram, it should be stated of what kind of letters the brands consist, whether of Roman capitals or in *writing*. In describing watches it should be stated whether they are open-faced, hunting, double-cased, or half-hunting, the term "double-cased" being reserved for those watches whose outer case is removed in order to wind, "half-hunting" implying a very

small glass in the metal cover of the dial. All property should be described as minutely as possible.

PREVIOUS REFERENCES.—It is requested that in all reports respecting cases gazetted members of the Force will be good enough to quote the date and page of the *Police Gazette* in which the previous notice has appeared, and in reporting arrests to state by whom effected. Supplementary reports of cases already reported, but not gazetted, where arrests are made or stolen property recovered, should at once be forwarded to the Commissioner's Office, and should contain such information as will clearly identify the case.

CIRCULATION OF CRIME REPORTS.—The officers in charge of districts will be held responsible for the proper circulation of reports relating to crimes committed in their respective districts. Where there is reason to believe that the offender is proceeding towards any particular part of the colony, the police of the district in which the crime was committed should report the fact to the police of that place with the least possible delay. They should also communicate without delay with the police of any part of the colony from which it is thought probable that important information regarding any offender can be obtained.

The arrest of offenders described in the *Police Gazette*, or respecting whom crime reports have been forwarded for insertion in the *Gazette*, should be promptly notified by the member of the Force effecting the arrest.

When notifying the arrest of persons charged with larceny, or suspected of larceny, it should be stated whether the property stolen, or any portion of it, has been recovered.

A description of property, supposed to be stolen, found in the possession of offenders, for which owners cannot be found, should be furnished for insertion in the *Gazette*.

REWARDS.—No notice of rewards offered by any private person or persons will be inserted in the *Police Gazette* unless there be forwarded to the Commissioner's Office the guarantee of some responsible person that the reward shall be payable to the person who performs the service for which it is offered. If such notice be communicated by telegraph, the addition of the words "Guarantee received" will be sufficient; in such case, however, the guarantee must be forwarded to the Commissioner's Office without delay.

Arson.

KUMARA.—About 10.20 p.m. on the 9th ultimo an unoccupied two-roomed cottage in Tui Street was discovered to be on fire, but the flames were extinguished. On the following night, however, it was again set fire to and totally destroyed; and at an inquest held on the 27th ultimo a verdict of "Incendiarism against some person or persons unknown" was returned. The building was the property of Michael Murphy, and valued at £15.

Dead Body of Infant found.

NAPIER.—At 9 a.m. on the 25th ultimo the dead body of a female infant was found, wrapped up in a towel, on the premises of Frederick Paterson, carpenter, Dalton Street. From the evidence given at the inquest, it appears to have been born prematurely, and died from exposure.

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

AUCKLAND.—William Pilkington Harris is charged on warrant with false pretences on Stewart, Dawson, and Co., jewellers, Queen Street, on the 4th instant. Description: About forty-six years of age, 5ft. 10in. high, stout build, dark pale complexion, dark moustache turning grey; wore a grey-tweed suit, and hard brown-felt hat. Probably identical with William Henry Harris, suspected of breaking into and stealing from the office of Thomas George Lawless, at Gisborne, on the 8th ultimo. (See *Police Gazette*, 1893, page 200.) He obtained a gold watch, guard, and brooch, value £21 7s. 6d., for which amount he gave his cheque on the Colonial Bank of New Zealand, Christchurch; but it has been ascertained that he had no account there. The watch is described as a ladies' gold lever hunting, No. 217613, complainants' make. It is supposed that he left Onehunga for the South on the above-mentioned date by the s.s. "Mahinapua," via New Plymouth, Nelson, and Wellington.

EKETAHUNA.—John Brown is charged on warrant of commitment to the Terrace Gaol, Wellington, for fourteen days, in default of paying 17s. fine and costs for drunkenness. Description: A Swede, a carpenter or bushman, about forty years of age, 5ft. 10in. high, strong loose build, very fair hair and complexion, little or no hair on face, heavy feet; dressed in a light-tweed suit, sometimes wears a straw hat; very fond of drink; frequents hotels. Supposed to have gone towards Danevirke.

WELLINGTON.—Edward Tyrrell is charged on warrant of commitment to the Terrace Gaol for four days in default of paying £1 19s., fine and costs for cruelty to a horse. Description: Supposed colonial, a labourer and driver, about twenty-six years of age, 5ft. 6in. or 7in. high, medium build, fresh complexion, fair hair, round features, clean-shaved except fair moustache; generally wears a grey suit. He was driving a milk-cart for Mr. Garrod Osborne, and left Wellington about the 1st ultimo.

OMARU.—Robert Ibell is charged on warrant with false pretences on Malcolm McFadgen, Thames Street, on the 16th November, 1893. Description: A native of the colony, a groom and jockey, about fifteen years of age, about 5ft. 4in. high, slight build, dark complexion, dark-brown hair; dressed in a dark pepper-and-salt tweed suit (flap pockets outside each breast on coat), and soft black-felt hat. He obtained a suit of clothes by falsely representing that he was employed by Thomas Thompson, of Columella. His parents reside at Ashburton, and he may have gone there or to Timaru.

DUNEDIN.—Ah Lung is charged on warrant of commitment to Dunedin Gaol, for four days' labour, in default of paying £1 fine and costs for assaulting his wife. Description: A Chinese hawker, about forty years of age, about 5ft. 7in. high, medium build, olive complexion, black hair. He left for Wellington, per s.s. "Wakapipū," on the 29th November last.

Housebreaking, Stealing from the Person and from Dwellings.

AUCKLAND.—James Wilkie, Liverpool Street, off Alexander Street, reports that on the 19th ultimo his dwelling was broken into, and about £24 in gold and silver stolen. Suspicion attached to a man, name unknown, who occupied part of the same tenement. Description: Supposed a labourer, forty years of age, 5ft. 2in. or 3in. high, stout build, florid complexion, short stubby beard turning grey; wore a soft grey-felt hat (sometimes with a puggaree), dark coat, and grey trousers.

AUCKLAND.—Mrs. Mary Jane Henwood, of Mangare, reports stolen from her at the Devonport Ferry Office, Auckland, on the 25th ultimo, a red morocco-leather purse, two compartments, containing a £1 note and 9s. in silver. Purse identifiable.

AUCKLAND.—Mrs. Annie Spraggon, Howe Street, Newton, reports stolen from her on board the s.s. "Wellington," on the 28th ultimo, an old dark-brown-leather purse; two gold brooches—one with a safety-pin and imitation of a bow-knot, the other bar pattern, 2in. long, set with two American gold dollars reversed; a sovereign; four half-crowns; and three small silver coins tied together with string; total value, £3.

Description: First, about twenty-five years of age, about 5ft. 8in. high, medium build, dark complexion, dark moustache only; wore a light-coloured soft-felt hat. Second, twenty-eight to thirty years of age, about 5ft. 9in. high, medium build, dark complexion and moustache only; wore a dark-coloured dress or swallow-tailed coat, blue trousers with stripe, and dark bell-topper hat.

Prescribing a Close Season for Seals.

GLASGOW, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Christchurch, this thirtieth day of December, 1893.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884" (hereinafter termed "the said Act"), it is, among other things, enacted that the Governor in Council may from time to time make, alter, and revoke regulations (which shall have force and effect only in any waters or places specified therein) for prescribing, among other things, a close season or close seasons for seals:

And whereas it is provided by the third section of "The Fisheries Conservation Act 1884 Amendment Act, 1887," that a penalty not exceeding five hundred pounds may be imposed in respect of the breach of any regulations respecting seals, and a further penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds for every seal illegally taken:

And whereas it is expedient to make the regulations hereinafter set forth with respect to seals inhabiting or found within the waters of the colony hereinafter mentioned:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act and "The Fisheries Conservation Act 1884 Amendment Act, 1887," and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto; and with the like advice and consent doth order that such regulations shall have force and effect throughout the Colony of New Zealand, and in all salt, fresh, and brackish waters of the colony, and on all shores of such waters or any part thereof.

SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS.

1. THE months of January, February, March, April, May, and June, 1894, are hereby prescribed as the close season for seals.

2. No person shall buy, sell, or expose for sale, or have in possession any seal, or the skins, oil, or blubber of any seal, taken during the close season hereby prescribed for the same.

3. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty of not less than £5 and not exceeding £500, and a further penalty of not exceeding £20 for every seal illegally taken.

4. Every penalty imposed by these regulations shall be recovered in a summary manner before any two or more Justices of the Peace.
