Arson.

GISBORNE.—At 6.30 a.m. on the 16th ultimo an attempt was made to destroy the building known as Perter's Hall, it having been set on fire in two separate places under the flooring. The flames were, however, extinguished before much damage was done. The premises are owned by Mr. J. N. Williams, of Napier, and were occupied by Messrs. Williams and Kettle, of Gisborne.

Escaped Prisoner.

ASHBURTON.-Robert Carlyle is charged on warrant with escaping from the Ashburton Police Gaol on the 20th ultimo. escaping from the Asbburton Police Gaol on the 20th ultimo. Description: Scotch, thirty-nine years of age, 5ft. 3in. high, stoutish build, large head, fresh complexion, small grey eyes half closed, stammers, brown hair, curly reddish beard whiskers and moustache, silly appearance, especially noticeable when smiling; dressed in an old black coat and vest much too large for him, faded drab-tweed trousers, and soft black-felt hat. The warrant is addressed to all constables in the colony, and to the keeper of the Terrace Gaol, Wellington.
