Arson.

REEFTON. — About 2.45 a.m. on the 18th ultimo the Albion Hotel, owned by Stewart Monteith, brewer, was destroyed by fire, which there is reason to believe was wilfully caused. The building was insured in the Norwich Union Office for £300, but on account of its age was not considered worth much more than half that amount, although the owner valued it at £450. An open verdict was returned at the inquest, with the following rider added: "The jurors are unanimous in their opinion that the evidence of the witness John Arnold is very unsatisfactory."

Offences Not Otherwise Described.

RAGLAN.—James Blake is charged on warrant with having, on the 15th December, 1894, obtained from James Rendell, storekeeper, a tweed vest and a pair of trousers, value £1 2s., by false pretences. Offender is a half-caste Maori, about thirty years of age, about 5ft. 5in. high, medium build, heavy black moustache only, scar across back of one hand, hair slightly tinged with grey, speaks good English, and is very talkative. May have gone to some of the Maori settlements in Waikato.

and remanded.

New PLYMOUTH.—Arthur (or "Atty") Jury is charged on warrant with having, about the 1st ultimo, embezzled £2 5s. 8d., money of Michael Jones, livery-stable keeper. Offender is a native of New Zealand, a cab-driver or stable hand, about twenty eight years of age, about

5ft. Sin. high, slight build, brown hair, fresh complexion, moustache only; usually wears a light-coloured coat, dark trousers, hard black hat; fond of drink. He received the amount from one F. Fagan for payment to complainant, his employer, but fraudulently converted it to his own use, and left for Auckland on the 2nd ultimo. He has been a steward on the s.s. "Arawata," and spoke of going to Sydney.

Wellington.—William Smith is charged on warrant with false pretences on Henry James Rogers, draper, Manners Street, on the 11th ultimo. Offender is English, a weiter, about forty-two years of age, 5ft. 6in. high, slight build, dark complexion, dark-brown hair, small side-whiskers and moustache, tinged with grey; wore a dark morning-coat, light-tweed trousers, and hard black hat. Photographed at Auckland, 23rd February, 1890. (See Police Gazette, 1894, page 200.) He obtained goods to the value of £4 12s., and £4 8s. in cash, giving in payment a cheque for £3, drawn on the Colonial Bank of New Zealand, Wellington, and purporting to be signed by W. E. Temple, but which has been returned marked "No account." There are other charges of a similar nature pending.

Christchurch.—James Smith, alias James Meyer, is charged on warrant with false pretences on Fanny Whittington, licensee, Albion Hotel, on the 15th ultimo. Offender is a native of Holland, a seaman, forty-one years of age, 5ft. 5in. high, fresh complexion, dark-brown hair, blue eyes, medium nose, dressed in a dark paget coat, blue jumper, dark-tweed trousers, and hard black-felt hat. Identical with James Myers, alias Smith (vide Police Gazette, 1895, page 16). He obtained the sum of £2 by means of a valueless cheque on the Union Bank of Australia, in which bank he falsely represented he had an account.

GERALDINE.—A. Mitchell is charged on warrant with having, on the 11th ultimo, forged and uttered to John Morrison, at Peel Forest, a cheque for £10. Offender is English, forty years of age, 5ft. 6in. high, stout build, fair complexion, light hair, clean-shaved except moustache, staring eyes, full fat face, boots laced to toes; wears a round hat on back of head; carries a walking-stick. The cheque (for which he obtained cash) is drawn on the Union Bank, Blenheim, and purports to be drawn by T. Fowerler in favour of A. Mitchell, but has been returned marked "No account."

Dunedin.—Ah Kum is charged on warrant with having, on the 16th ultimo, obtained the sum of £2 from William Cormack, coal-dealer, Caversham, by false pretences. Offender is a Chinaman, forty years of age, tall and thin, no hair on face, slightly pockmarked, speaks English fairly well; neatly, dressed in a brown-tweed suit and soft felt hat.

Regulations (Amended) for Trout- and Perch-fishing, Hawke's Bay Acclimatisation District.

GLASGOW, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings, at Wellington, this eighth day of April, 1895.

Present:

THE HONOURABLE THE PREMIER PRESIDING IN COUNCIL.

In pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regula-tions for the Hawke's Bay Acclimatisation District and the waters thereof, and doth hereby declare that these regula-tions shall, as from the date of the publication thereof in the New Zealand Gazette, supersede all regulations at variance therewith.

REGULATIONS.

1. LICENSES to fish for trout and perch in all waters within that district or part of the North Island known as the Hawke's Bay Acclimatisation District, comprising the Counties of Waipawa, Patangata, Hawke's Bay, and Wairoa, may be issued under the hand of the Secretary of the Hawke's Bay Acclimatisation Society (hereinafter termed "the said society"), or any one authorised by the said Secretary in that behalf: Provided that it shall not be obligatory on the said Secretary or his deputy to issue a license.

2. For every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged. Licenses may also be issued to boys of the age of sixteen years or under at a reduced fee of ten shillings for each license so issued; but no license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.

3. The Secretary of the said society may issue day licenses to bond fide travellers and strangers not resident within the district aforesaid, on their introduction to him by any two members of the said society, and on payment of a fee of two shillings and sixpence for each day's fishing: Provided that this payment may be remitted if the applicant be a member of or hold a valid license from any other society in New Zealand which grants the like privilege.

4. Any holder of a license may fish with one rod and line for trout and perch, and may use a landing-net or gaff to secure any trout or perch caught with such rod and line, in the above-named waters, from the fifteenth day of September in any year to the sixteenth day of April in any year, both inclusive; but every such license shall be for one season only, and shall expire on the sixteenth day of April

following the date on which it is issued.

5. No license shall authorise any person other than the person named therein to fish, and that with natural or arti-

ficial fly, insect, or fish only.

6. No person shall have in his possession any of the salmonidæ or trout between the sixteenth day of April and the fifteenth day of September, which period is hereby appointed a close season for all such fish; Provided always that this regulation shall not apply to fish caught by the officers of the said society for purposes of acclimatisation.

7. No person shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, into any river or stream, or at the mouth | may be notified.]

or entrance of any such river or stream, any dynamite or other explosive substance, or any sawdust or sawmill refuse, or anything of any kind or description whatever poisonous, deleterious, or noxious to fish.

8. No person shall take, fish for, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, or have in his possession, any salmon, salmon-parr, or smolts, or the ova, young, or fry of any salmon in any stage whatever; and any of the above-named taken by accident or otherwise shall immediately be returned to the water from whence it was taken turned to the water from whence it was taken.

9. No person shall fish for trout or perch without a license, and every person fishing shall, on demand of any Ranger, constable, member of the said society, or person producing a license, produce and show to such Ranger, member, constable, or person his license and the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait used by him for taking, catching, or killing such trout or perch.

10. Every trout not exceeding nine inches in length from nose to tip of tail, taken or caught by any person, shall im-mediately be returned alive into the water from which the

same is taken.

11. No person shall take, catch, or kill any perch under eight inches in length, nor shall perch be taken, caught, or killed at all, or had in possession of any person, between the sixteenth day of April and the thirtieth day of September in

any year.

12. No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other unsportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing trout or perch, nor shall any of the abovementioned baits be used with any medicated or chemical preparation whatever.

13. Except as aforesaid, no person shall fish with or use any net or other engine, instrument, or device for taking salmon, or trout, or perch in any river or stream within the district aforesaid, or at the mouth or entrance of any such river or stream.

14. For the purposes of these regulations the mouth of every such river or stream shall be deemed to include every outlet of the same and the sea-shore between such outlets, and shall extend over a radius of one-quarter of a mile from the point or line where the waters of such river or stream meet those of the sea or of any harbour at low water.

15. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale, or shall fish for the purpose of obtaining for sale, any salmon,

trout, or perch, or any part thereof.

16. The penalty for the breach of any of these regulations shall not be less than forty shillings or more than fifty pounds.

17. If any person shall be convicted of any offence against these regulations the license (if any) held by the offender shall thereupon become void.
