Memorandum.]

### Collection of Agricultural and Pastoral Statistics.

The collection of agricultural and pastoral statistics for the coming year will be wholly undertaken by the Police. For this purpose Constables in charge of stations will be appointed sub-enumerators for their respective sub-districts. In no case should a non-commissioned officer collect the statistics. At stations where a non-commissioned officer is in charge the collection must be undertaken by the Inquiry Constable. Each sub-enumerator shall be responsible for the collection of returns for all holdings that come within the scope of the inquiry in his sub-district.

The collection will commence in February or March according to locality, and will be completed as early as circumstances permit without undue interference with police duties.

Lists of occupiers of holdings as returned previously will be supplied by the Government Statistician to sub-enumerators for their guidance in tracing holdings. Sub-enumerators are, however, to ascertain locally any changes of occupancy of holdings.

Sub-enumerators shall collect returns personally from occupiers within easy reach without incurring any expenditure on account of meals or locomotion. In other cases the schedules are to be posted or otherwise distributed by sub-enumerators to occupiers for completion and return.

Particulars on schedules shall be scrutinized by sub-enumerators and transcribed into collection-books for despatch to the Government Statistician.

For their services in checking lists, distributing and collecting schedules, and posting the details into the collection-books, sub-enumerators will be paid 8d. per schedule collected, less Social Security and National Security charges. Payment will be made by the Government Statistician to the sub-enumerator on completion of the collection in his sub-district.

No payment for meals or locomotion expenses will be made, and it is expected that all returns that cannot be obtained during the ordinary course of police duty will be collected by post. It is desirable, however, that sub-enumerators should get in touch with as many occupiers as possible and personally collect particulars from them to ensure accuracy of the returns.

Stamps required for outwards postage of schedules or for any necessary toll calls are to be requisitioned for on the local Postmaster, the Police Officer to sign as Sub-enumerator of Agricultural and Pastoral Statistics, and to make the claim chargeable to the Census and Statistics Department.

The Postal Department has undertaken to charge the Census and Statistics Department a fixed sum per annum to cover all short-paid and unpaid inwards postage, and accordingly no payment for inwards postage will need to be made by sub-enumerators.

Correspondence on ordinary routine matters in connection with the collection shall be direct between the Government Statistician and the sub-enumerators. Communications regarding special points which may affect the Police Department shall be made through the usual police channels.

A supply of books, schedules, and envelopes, together with full instructions as to the method of collecting and posting the returns, will be issued to sub-enumerators by the Government Statistician.

Sub-enumerators will understand that all individual particulars are strictly confidential and must not be divulged under any circumstances. Inquiries for individual particulars, from any source whatsoever, must be referred to the Government Statistician.

This Department has in the interests of economy agreed to the work being undertaken entirely by the police without the engagement of civilians in any district, and the co-operation of the members of the Force concerned is requested to make the returns as complete and accurate as possible.

The papers on "Evidence" and "Prescribed Statutes" were set and examined by Dr. N. A. Foden, Crown Solicitor; those on "Police Force Act and Regulations" and "Police and Detective Duties" by a Board consisting of Dr. N. A. Foden, Superintendent R. R. J. Ward, and Inspector H. Scott; and the papers on the literary subjects by Mr. R. Darroch, formerly headmaster of the Terrace School, Wellington.

The following remarks of the examiners are published for the information of candidates:—

*Evidence.*—In the Senior-Sergeants' and Sergeants' sections the percentage of passes indicates that the candidates had set out to obtain a sound grasp of the rules of evidence, but in the Sub-Inspectors' grade in several cases there appeared a lack of the hard study necessary to satisfy requirements. Sub-Inspectors must remember that at times they are pitted against eminent or experienced counsel and therefore, as the syllabus requires, they must have a wider knowledge of the rules.

*Prescribed Statutes.*—In the Sub-Inspectors' and Senior-Sergeants' papers the results were on the whole satisfactory, but in the Sergeants' paper the results were disappointing, suggesting lack of systematic and intensive study. Candidates should compile summaries of all the Statutes comprised in the syllabus to ensure that in the course of preparation for the examination the whole of the ground is covered.

*Police Force Act and Regulations.*—In all ranks a substantial improvement was shown in this paper, although in the case of the Sergeants, in particular, the sections of Acts and the clauses of Regulations had not received the intensive study which the nature of the subject demands. The key ideas of sections and clauses must be firmly grasped and where there are any qualifications of these key ideas the qualifications must also be known.

*Police and Detective Duties.*—Although experience is the best teacher in a practical subject of this nature, it must not be forgotten that study can serve the useful purpose of fixing in the mind the results of experience. Consequently a judicious combination is the candidate's best objective. The jotting down in logical sequence of the various steps involved in particular processes and duties will be found a useful aid to study.

But, when Friday came to hear him talk, and to look in his face, it would have moved any one to tears to have seen how Friday kissed him, and hugged him, how Friday wept, laughed, danced, sang, and then wept again. It was some time before he could speak to me or tell me what was the matter; but, when he came to himself a little, he told me that it was his father. It is not easy for me to tell how much it moved me to see the love in this poor savage for his father. He went into the boat and out of the boat a great many times. When he went in, he would sit down by him, open his breast, and hold his father's head close to his bosom for many minutes together. Then he would take his father's arms and ankles, which were numb and stiff with the binding, and chafe and rub them with his hands.—"Robinson Crusoe."

(b) Mr. Churchill said that counter-measures against the robots were being pressed to the utmost, and he was sure that the wonderful patience and courage of the people of Britain would continue to the end. "I no longer feel bound to deny that victory may perhaps come soon," he added. "If not, we must go on till it does." About 17,000 houses had been totally destroyed, and about 800,000 damaged. One could judge the efficiency of the measures taken by the Ministries involved by the fact that three-quarters, or upwards of 600,000 houses, had already been made habitable again, and in the last six weeks the rate at which repairs had been overtaking new damage had been very successfully increased. Nearly a million people who had no war business here, among them 225,000 mothers and children, had been evacuated. A large number of extra trains had been laid on to meet this considerable outward move. It was remarkable as showing the outlook of the people that many trains had come back nearly as full as they went out. While daring adventure was to be commended, this kind of movement would be discouraged, but it gave the lie to the most fantastic stories of the Germans that London was in flames.

The only result of the use of this weapon by the Germans would be that the severity of the punishment they would receive after their weapons had been struck from their hands by our fighting men would be appreciably increased. There was no question of diverting our strength from the prosecution of the war or allowing this infliction in any way to weaken our support of our Allies. Very careful plans had been prepared for a great gun belt, but it was not always possible to foresee accurately what the form of attack would be or how it would be made. We had expected attacks on our great invasion ports, and that it was very likely that flying bombs would begin at the same time as we made our invasion, in order to cheer up the Germans. But there was a slight interval, and we were able to make a quick redistribution. Although hundreds of the best expert brains were riveted on the problem, he could hold out no guarantee that it would be completely solved until we occupied the regions from which the bombs were launched, as we should no doubt do.
