Escaped Lunatics.

JAM KIM escaped from the Seacliff Asylum on the 31st ultimo. Description: A Chinaman, sixty-seven years of age, 5 ft. 4½ in. high, slight build, sallow complexion, dark hair and dark thin beard; dressed in faded moleskin suit, dark-tweed hat, blucher boots. He was committed from Dunedin in September, 1900, and was previously in the Benevolent Institution, Caversham.

JANET LAWSON escaped from the Mount View Asylum, Wellington, on the 17th instant. Description: A native of New Zealand, thirty-nine years of age, 5ft. 4in. high, medium build, fair complexion, fair hair; wearing blue dress and white blouse. She was committed from Petone on the 3rd March last, and has relatives residing in Wellington.

Offences not otherwise Described.

Augkland. — Henry Samuel Currie or Curry is charged on warrant with theft on the Postmaster-General on the 9th June, 1900. Description: A native of Christchurch, New Zealand, a watchmaker, thirty-four years of age, 5 ft. 8\frac{3}{4} in. high, swarthy complexion, dark-brown hair, grey eyes, long nose, pimples on cheeks, brown beard whiskers and moustache, anchor on left arm; dressed in dark-tweed suit (see Police Gazette, 1895, page 49). He was accompanied by Mrs. Lewis, about thirty-four years of age, 5 ft. 1 in. high, medium

build, short waist, slovenly appearance. Left Onehunga for New Plymouth in the beginning of October last, and may be travelling under the name of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis. Offender was living apart from his wife, and forged her name to an order on the Postmaster at Newton, by which he obtained a registered letter containing £2. A charge of forgery is also pending.

Waihi.—James Gracie reports that on the 23rd ultimo, as his son Charlie, five years old, was playing in the yard behind the house, the top joint was shot off his finger by a pea-gun or revolver. No one was seen about, but suspicion is attached to William F. Barker, who may have been shooting at fowls in the yard. Description: A miner, thirty-eight years of age, 5 ft. 9 in. high, fair hair and moustache, pale complexion, sleepy grey eyes. Warrant issued for some person or persons unknown for discharging destructive material causing bodily harm.

HASTINGS.—Robert Gardiner, alias James Collins, is charged on three warrants of commitment to Napier Gaol for fifteen days in default of paying £1 17s. 6d. fine and costs for drunkenness, resisting police, and damage to property. Description: A native of Australia, a labourer, forty-three years of age but looks older, 5 ft. 7½ in. high, stout build, dark auburn hair turning grey, dark-grey eyes, ruddy complexion, clean - shaved except light-brown moustache; walks very erect, and takes very short steps; dressed in light-coloured tweed suit and soft brown-felt hat; clasped hands and basket of fruit tattooed on right arm (see Police Gazette, 1899, pages 150 and 235). He was convicted for the above offences, and allowed until the 30th ultimo to pay the above amount, but failed to do so. HASTINGS .- Robert Gardiner, alias James Collins, 30th ultimo to pay the above amount, but failed to do so. There is now due £2 6s. 6d.

PALMERSTON SOUTH .- Thomas Thompson is charged on warrant with theft as co-owner. Description: A native of New Zealand, about twenty-three years of age, about 5 ft. 8 in. high, stout build, fair hair, clean-shaved except fair moustache, blue eyes, large nose; dressed in dark sac coat and khaki-coloured trousers full at bottom; has friends living at Adam's Flat, Otago. Offender and Edwin Charles Harris were partners rabbiting at Macrae's. Stronach and Morris, Dunedin, forwarded a cheque for £22 15s. 10d. to Thompson as payment for rabbit-skins sent them. On the 27th October offender cashed the cheque at Dunedin, and has not been seen ince.

MOUNT COOK (WELLINGTON).—Quang Young, storekeeper, 30, Nairn Street, reports that about 11 p.m on the 27th ultimo some person knocked at his door, and when he opened it he was forced on the floor by two or three men, and his pockets, which were empty, searched. No description can be given of the men, and he could not identify them.

AMBERLEY.—Minnie Hockley, cook, reports that on the 9th instant, when wheeling her bicycle about 2 chains from the outer gate to Mount Grey Downs, Balcairns, a man, name unknown, pulled her to the side of the avenue and committed rape on her. Complainant had seen her father off by the car to Dunedin, when offender took her by the hand, led her over the sandhills, and committed the above offence. Identification doubtful.

Description: A native of Tasmania, a labourer and horsebreaker, forty-six years of age, 5 ft. 7 in. high, stout build, hair inclined to be curly, full round face, clean-shaved except light sandy moustache may be mixed with grey hairs; was dressed in light-grey tweed suit and light-brown soft hat (see Police Gazette, 1900, pages 183, 221, and 233). Offender was committed for trial and admitted to bail. He was ordered to report himself regularly to the constable at Orepuki, but failed to do so. Regulation No. 13 of the regulations made under "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," dated the seventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following words: "Provided that nothing herein contained shall words: "Provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent the placing of any net other than a stake-net in or across the mouth or entrance of the following river or across the mouth or entrance of the following river—viz., the Ashley River—or at any place in such river seaward of a straight line drawn from the southernmost corner of Rural Section No. 716, Rangiora Survey District, on the northern bank of the said Ashley River, thence through the south-easternmost corner of Rural Section No. 23889, Rangiora Survey District, to a point on the southern bank of the said Ashley River, for the purpose of taking indigenous fish only, nor render any person liable to any penalty for so doing, or for taking indigenous fish by such means."

Regulations for netting Trout in Lakes Te Anau and Manapouri.

RANFURLY, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings, at Wellington, this sixth day of November, 1900.

N pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities N pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in him by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby make the following regulations for netting trout in Lakes Te Anau and Manapouri, within the Southland Acclimatisation District; and doth hereby declare that these regulations shall, as from the date of the publication hereof in the New Zealand Gazette, supersede all regulations at variance therewith:

REGULATIONS.

REGULATIONS.

1. For the purpose of supplying hotels, accommodation and boarding-houses, and residents within a limit of twenty miles of Lakes Te Anau and Manapouri, within the district of the Southland Acclimatisation Society, the secretary of such society is hereby empowered, but shall not be compelled, to issue under his hand a license to use a net or nets for taking trout in such lakes, or either of them, to any person resident thereat respectively; and for every such license a fee of not exceeding two pounds may be charged for each net specified in such license; and such secretary is hereby authorised to limit the holder of such license to one or more net or nets only. or more net or nets only.

2. For the above purpose the said lakes, or either of them, may be divided into such areas as such secretary may con-

sider advisable, and every license may describe the limits within which the same is to be used and the number of nets to be employed, or may describe that the same is available

for use anywhere in such lakes respectively.

3. The season for netting shall extend from the first day of October in any year to the thirtieth day of April in the

following year, both days inclusive.

4. No net with a mesh of less than four inches and a half shall be used, and stake or fixed nets and seine nets for hauling are hereby expressly prohibited.

All trout caught by net under three pounds in weight shall be forthwith returned alive to the water.

No nets for the taking of trout shall be used in any of the rivers, streams, or creeks communicating with the said lakes respectively, excepting the Clinton River for one mile distant from its mouth.

6. No salmon, salmon-parr, or smolts shall be taken in any net, and if so taken by accident or otherwise shall be forthwith returned alive to the water.

7. Any person holding a trout-fishing license under the provisions of the existing trout-fishing regulations may fish with rod and line in the said lakes, rivers, or streams respectively, anything contained in these regulations notwith-

standing.

Standing.

8. The Southland Acclimatisation Society, through their officers, rangers, constables, or any other person duly authorised, shall have full power at any time to inspect, examine, and search for any nets, tackle, engines, boats, or any utensils or instruments, which, in the opinion of such any utensils or instruments, which, in the opinion of such authorised person, are or have been used or employed for the taking of fish within the said lakes respectively, or the rivers and streams communicating therewith, and to seize and appropriate in the interests of the said society all and every such nets, tackle, engines, or any utensils or instruments so used or employed, and also to seize and appropriate as aforesaid all and every fish caught and in possession of any person during the close season, or in possession of any person who cannot or does not produce, at the time of catching or disposing of such fish, a license under the hand of the secretary aforesaid empowering him in that behalf.

empowering him in that behalf.

9. The moneys realised by the issue of such netting licenses as aforesaid shall form part of the revenues of the

said society, and be accounted for accordingly.

said society, and be accounted for accordingly.

10. Any person offending against any of these regulations shall be liable to a penalty of not less than one pound and not exceeding fifty pounds, and any licensee convicted of so offending shall upon conviction ipso facto forfeit his license, and the Court by which such penalty is inflicted may declare that any nets, gear, or tackle used in connection with the commission of such offence are also forfeited to the said society, and may be disposed of as it thinks fit.
