Offences not otherwise Described.

AUCKLAND.—**Harry Williams** is charged on warrant with forging and uttering an order to John Daisley, tailor, on the 6th ultimo. Description: Colonial, hangs after race-horses, twenty-two years of age, 5 ft. 7 in. or 8 in. high, medium build, fresh complexion, dark hair; dressed in light check sac suit with patch pockets, hard black-felt hat; has also a light-brown sac suit. Supposed gone towards New Plymouth. He gave complainant an order purporting to be signed by his father, H. Williams, guaranteeing the payment of £5 for a suit of clothes.
