LAW REPORT.

("New Zealand Law Reports," Vol. xxvi, p. 811.)
PRIESTLY v. DOYLE.

"The Licensing Act, 1881," Section 155—Exposing Liquor for Sale during Prohibited Hours—Men in Commercial Room of Hotel on Sunday—Bar-slide open—Licensee in Bar—Allegation that Men were Guests of Licensee—Burden of Proof on Licensee.

A constable in plain clothes visiting the appellant's hotel on a Sunday, about midday, found the main door closed, but the front door and a side door were open. Entering the premises he found four men in the commercial room, one of whom appeared to him to be under the influence of drink, and he still held a glass in his hand. There was a slide between the room and the bar. This slide was open, and the appellant was inside the bar. On the slide-leaf was an empty glass, which the appellant cleaned in the constable is presence. One of the men invited the constable to have a drink. The latter declined, but the appellant made no demur to the invitation being given. On the constable disclosing his identity, some conversation took place, the appellant stating that three of the four men were friends of his, whom he had invited to dinner, and that he was supplying them gratuitously with drink before dinner. The fourth, who was his brother, was, he said, a lodger. The Magistrate disbelieved the evidence for the defence, and convicted the appellant. On appeal to the Supreme Court, which was in the nature of a rehearing, it was agreed that the Magistrate's notes of evidence should be taken as the evidence at the rehearing.

Held (affirming the decision of the Magistrate), That under the circumstances the onus of proof was shifted, and that it lay upon the appellant, as licensee, to show affirmatively that no breach of the law had been committed by him.

APPEAL on law and facts from a decision of W. A. Barton, Esq., S.M., Gisborne, convicting the appellant of exposing liquor for sale on his licensed premises during prohibited hours.

COOPER, J. :--

The appellant was convicted on the 24th November, 1906, upon an information charging him with exposing liquor for sale upon his licensed premises during a time (Sunday) when his licensed premises were directed to be closed. In In re Biggans (19 N.Z. L.R. 630), Mr. Justice Williams said, "It is a matter of common knowledge that in a publichouse the bar is a place where liquors are kept. If the slide of the bar is open, so that any one looking into the bar could see what is in the bar, the contents are exposed, though no witness may come forward and say he has actually seen what was in the bar. If the liquor is thus exposed, and the

circumstances lead to the conclusion that liquor could be had by discreet persons on paying for it, then the liquor is exposed for sale."

In the present case it has been agreed that I shall decide the questions of fact upon the Magistrate's notes of evi-

dence.

[After stating the facts as above His Honour proceeded.]

The constable did not see any liquor actually supplied to any of these men. In cross-examination the constable was pressed to express an opinion as to whether he saw anything inconsistent with the suggestion that these men were the appellant's guests, but he would not go any further than stating that he could not say whether there was. He did not know. Now, upon this evidence there was clearly a case for the appellant to answer. The main facts established were—1, that the front door of the hotel was open, although the public entrance to the bar was closed, and that the side door of the passage leading from the open space to the commercial room was open; 2, that the public had access to the commercial room, Doyle having no difficulty in entering it; 3, that the bar-slide opening into that room was up, and the license was in the bar; 4, that men were drinking in the room, and that one of them offered to treat Doyle; and, 5, that the liquor in the bar was exposed to the view of those who chose to enter the commercial room. The onus of proof was shifted, and it lay upon the appellant to establish affirmatively that there had been no breach of the law.

The presumption that a breach of the law has been com-

The presumption that a breach of the law has been committed, which arises upon proof of such facts as the prosecution established, may, of course, be rebutted by satisfactory evidence for the defence. In White v. Nestor (13 N.Z. L.R. 751) it was held that the mere exposure of liquor in a bar so as to be visible to others, whilst drink lawfully sold to a lodger is being handed out from the bar, does not constitute an exposure for sale to others, or an exposure for sale generally, within the meaning of section 155 of "The Licensing Act, 1881." The defence here is that the licensee had invited three of the men to lunch with him, and that the liquor supplied to them was a gift, and that the fourth man was a lodger. Now, it does not at all follow that where liquor has been supplied during prohibited hours the fact that the party supplying it and the parties receiving it swear that the supply was a gift rebuts the presumption. Evidence of this description must be tested by the demeanour of the witnesses, the probability of their story, and the surrounding circumstances of the case. If it were otherwise, then, to use the words of Mr. Justice Denniston in Schultheis v. Wilson (13 N.Z. L.R. 295, 297), it would lead to this absurdity: that whenever the party receiving the liquor and the party delivering it were prepared to swear that the transaction was not a sale there never could be a conviction.

Upon a general appeal the hearing of the appeal is in the nature of a re-trial, and the decision of the appellate Court must be independent of the findings of the Magistrate: Higgins v. Marsack (17 N.Z. L.R. 222). But where the evidence before the appellate Court is merely the notes of the evidence taken before the Magistrate, one of the principal tests by which the credulity of witnesses may be determined is absent. The most careful note must often fail to convey the evidence fully in some of its most important elements, those for which the open oral examination of the witnesses is most justly prized. It cannot give the look or manner of the witness, his hesitation, his doubts, his variations of language, his confidence or precipitancy, his calmness or consideration. The notes of evidence cannot supply these defects. It is the dead body of the evidence without its spirit, which is supplied, when given orally, by the eye and ear of those who receive it: Reg. v. Bertrand (4 Moo. P.C. N.S. 460, 481). These tests are absent in the present case. The Magistrate who heard the case observed and weighed the demeanour of the respective witnesses for the defence. They all swore that the liquors supplied to the three men—Murphy, Long, and Fordyce—were the bona fide guests of the licensee, and the Magistrate disbelieved them. I am confined to the notes of evidence only, and have to gather from these notes the probability or otherwise of the truth of the statements of the witnesses. I have carefully considered the evidence of these witnesses as detailed in the Magistrate's notes, and it does not convince me that they were bona fide guests of the appellant. The circumstance that Long justified his presence on the premises by the statement that he had gone there to get a meal, and that none of the men alleged at the time that they were that he noty inference I can draw from the appellant's statement that they were his friends is that they were his guests. The fact also that Murphy, before the party knew that Doyle was a polic

of the witnesses for the defence. Then, I cannot ignore the fact that the Magistrate disbelieved the men, having had the opportunity, which I have not had, of observing their de-meanour in the witness-box. There being also uncontradicted circumstances which tend to throw suspicion on the bona fide of the defence, I cannot hold that the appellant has displaced the evidence of the respondent, which, unanswered by satisfactory evidence, clearly brings the case within *In re* Biggins (19 N.Z. L.B. 630).

The appeal must be dismissed, with £7 7s. costs.

Revoking Regulations for Trout-fishing within the Strat-ford Acclimatisation District, and declaring New Regulations in lieu thereof.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, this ninth day of September, 1907

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

In pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by "The Fisheries Conservation Act, 1884," and its amendments, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby revoke the regulations for the Stratford Acclimatisation Disrevoke the regulations for the Strational Administration District, dated the twenty-fourth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and six, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the twenty-seventh day of the same month, and doth hereby make the following regulations in lieu thereof, which shall have full force and effect from the date of their publication in the New Zealand Gazette :-

REGULATIONS.

1. Licenses to fish for trout in all the waters within the County and Borough of Stratford will be issued under the hand of the secretary of the Stratford Acclimatisation Society (hereinafter called "the society"), and for every such license a fee of twenty shillings will be charged: Provided that it shall not be obligatory upon the society to issue a license. The secretary may issue half-season licenses after the thirty-first day of December in each year, at a fee of twelve shill first day of December in each year, at a fee of twelve shillings and sixpence each, and monthly licenses at a fee of seven shillings and sixpence each after the thirty-first day of December in each year. The charge for licenses for women, and for boys under the age of fourteen years, shall be five shillings each for the season during which such licenses are issued.

2. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish in any of the said waters from the first day of October in each year to the thirtieth day of April in the following year inclusive, between the hours of four a.m. and ten p.m. only; but no such license shall confer any right of entry upon the land of any person without his consent.

3. No person shall fish for, take, catch, or kill, or have in his possession, or attempt to fish for, take, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, any of the Salmonide or trout, exempt

his possession, or attempt to fish for, take, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, any of the Salmonidæ or trout, except during the above-mentioned period.

4. Every such license shall entitle the person named therein to fish with one rod and line only, and with the following baits: Natural or artificial fly, natural or artificial minnow, silveries, bullies, grasshoppers, spiders, caterpillars, creepers, and worms.

5. No person shall use any other bait, or any method, device, or contrivance of any sort or kind whatever, for the purpose of fishing for, taking, catching, or killing trout, except a rod and line and a landing net or gaff for fish

purpose of fishing for, taking, catching, or kindig except a rod and line and a landing net or gaff for fish taken with rod and line.

6. No cross-line fishing, stroke-hauling, or any other unsportsmanlike device shall be used for the purpose of taking, catching, or killing trout; nor shall any of the baits above mentioned be used with any medicated or chemical preparation medicates.

tion whatever.
7. No person shall fish without a license; and every person fishing shall, on demand of any Ranger, constable, member of the society, or person producing a license, produce and show to such Ranger, member, constable, or person his license, and the contents of his creel or bag, and the bait used by him for taking, catching, or killing trout.

- 8. Every trout not exceeding eight inches in length from nose to tip of tail taken or caught by any person shall be immediately returned alive into the water from which the same is taken.
- 9. No person shall put, throw, or place, or allow to be put, thrown, or placed, in any of the said waters any sawdust or sawmill refuse, or anything of any kind or description whatever poisonous, deleterious, or noxious to fish.
- 10. No person shall take, fish for, catch, or kill, in any manner whatever, or have in his possession, any salmon, salmon-parr, or smolts, or the ova, young, or fry of any salmon in any state whatever; and any of the above-named taken by accident shall immediately be returned to the water from whence it was taken.
- 11. No person shall buy, sell, or expose or offer for sale within the county to which these regulations relate any of the Salmonidæ or trout, or take, fish for, catch, or kill any of the Salmonidæ or trout in order to make sale of the same, without permission in writing under the hand of the secretary of the society.
- 12. No person shall have in his possession any of the Salmonida or trout between the first day of May and the thirtieth day of September in each year, which period is appointed a close season for all such fish.
- 13. The penalty for the breach of any of these regula-tions shall not be less than forty shillings or more than fifty pounds.

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise of the powers and authorities conferred by the said Act, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said colony, doth hereby alter the proviso to clause five of the said regulations by adding to the list of rivers or streams therein mentioned within which artificial fly and artificial minnow only shall be used as lures or fly and artificial minnow only shall be used as lures or baits the stream known as the Pakuratahi Stream, within the County of Hutt; and doth hereby declare that the provisions of the said regulations of the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand nine hundred and six, shall apply to the said Pakuratahi Stream as if such stream had been included in the proviso to clause five of the said regulations.
