LAW REPORT.

("Times Law Reports," Vol. xxv, page 440.) [K.B. DIV. (LORD ALVERSONE, C.J., DARLING AND JELF, JJ.)-23RD MARCH, 1909.]

REX V. THE GOVERNOR OF H.M. PRISON AT STAFFORD

(ex parte EMERY).

Criminal Law-Deaf-mute-Inability to plead or under-stand Proceedings-Detention under 39 and 40 Geo. III, c. 94, s. 2.

At the trial of a prisoner, who was stone deaf and was unable to read or write, the jury found that he was mute by the visitation of God, and that he was incapable of by the visitation of God, and that he was incapable of pleading to, or taking his trial upon, the indictment, or of his inability to communicate with, or be communicated with by, others. Thereupon the Judge ordered that the prisoner should be treated as non-same, and be kept in under the until His Meinertie pleasure chemic here custody until His Majesty's pleasure should be known. Held, That the order was right.

Mr. Rowlatt appeared to show cause, and Mr. Bosanquet appeared to support the rule.

It appeared that the prisoner Emery was stone deaf, and was unable to read or write. He was brought up before Mr. Justice Channell for trial at Stafford Assizes on a criminal charge, and before the case was gone into the jury were asked to find whether he was or was not mute by the visita-tion of God. They found that he was so, and were then sworn a second time to find whether he was able to plead to the indictment and able to understand the proceedings. As to this they found that he was incapable of pleading to or taking his trial upon the indictment, or of understanding and following the proceedings, by reason of his inability to communicate with, or be communicated with by, others. Thereupon Mr. Justice Channell ordered that he should be treated as non-sane, and be kept in custody until His Majesty's pleasure be known.

The LORD CHIEF JUSTICE said that for himself he was glad the case had been argued, and that the Court had had the opportunity to redeclare the position of the matter in law. In his opinion, Mr. Justice Channell and Mr. Justice Jelf had taken the right course. Mr. Justice Jelf, finding that the case was coming on and the prisoner was undefended, had asked Mr. Bosanquet to defend him. When the case was actually reached it was taken before Mr. Justice Channell, the other Judge sitting at Stafford, and Mr. Bosanquet, being dissatisfied with the order made, applied bosandule, being dissatished with the order made, applied to Mr. Justice Jelf, at whose request he had been acting, for advice as to what steps he ought to take, and Mr. Justice Jelf authorised him to apply to this Court. He (the Lord Chief Justice), however, did not wish to be understood to adopt the principle that because counsel was asked to defend a prisoner at assizes an obligation was involved on counsel

to take further steps in the interests of the prisoner after the trial. The important point in the case was that the jury had found the prisoner incapable of pleading or of understanding the proceedings by reason of his inability to be communicated with, and upon that Mr. Justice Channell had ordered him to be detained as non-sane. They had to consider whether that order was properly made. Mr. Bosanquet had contended that it was not, because there was no express finding of insanity; but he would be sorry to have to adopt that argument, and he could conceive of nothing more likely to cause injustice than to say that in such a case as this either the jury must find insanity or the prisoner must be released. The great weight of opinion and judicial decisions had established a practice which had pre-vailed for sixty years and was in accordance with common sense and should not now be overruled. It was true, as Mr. Bosanquet pointed out, that the words of the statute did not refer to inability to plead, but only to insanity; but that fact had been considered in Rex v. Pritchard and Rex v. Dyson (*supra*), and had been held to be immaterial. It was true that those cases were tried at assizes, and were not binding on this Court; but he would be unwilling in any event to upset a convenient practice which had been established for so many years, and those cases were supported by the decision of the Court of Crown Cases Reserved in The Queen v. Berry (supra). There there was no question of general insanity, but only one of inability to understand the proceedings, and it was expressly held that such inability was, in point of law, insanity. Sanity therefore must include ability to follow the proceedings and to understand the accusation and the evidence; and the order in this case was made in accordance with common-sense and the proper administration of the law. The rule must therefore be discharged.

MR. JUSTICE DARLING said that he was of the same opinion. Mr. Bosanquet's point was that the prisoner had never really been found insane, but it seemed to him that the prisoner had been so found. The jury found not only that he was mute, but that he could not understand the routine of the Court or follow the proceedings or make his own views known. That was a sufficient finding of insanity to bring the case within those which had been cited.

The rule was accordingly discharged, with costs.

Amended Notification respecting Shooting Season for Imported and Native Game, Wellington Acclimatisation District.

PLUNKET, Governor.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend, in manner hereinafter provided, the notification made under "The Animals Protection Act, 1908," dated the second day of April, one thousand nine hundred and nine, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the fifth day of the said month of April :

Now, therefore, I, William Lee, Baron Plunket, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby notify that the following native game—viz., pukeko—may, from the date of the publication hereof to the thirty-first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nine, be killed in the area described in the Schedule hereto, the said area being part of the Wellington Acclimatisation District.

SCHEDULE.

BEING an area contained within a line starting from Shannon on the Manawatu Railway line; thence following the line to Palmerston North; thence by a right line to Kairanga; thence to Glen Oroua, and thence to Carnarvon and the sea; thence along the sea boundary to the south bank of the Manawatu River; thence following the river to the bridge on the Foxton and Shannon Road; and thence to Shannon.

As witness the hand of His Excellency the Governor, this tenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and nine.

Land at Foxton, Wellington Land District, to be a Sanctuary for Imported and Native Game.

PLUNKET, Governor.

DURSUANT to the powers vested in me by "The Animals Protection Act, 1908," I, William Lee, Baron Plunket, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby notify and declare that the area described in the Schedule hereto shall be a sanctuary for the purposes of the said Animals Protection Act, and that no imported game or native game shall be taken or killed within the said area.

SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Wellington Land District, containing by admeasurement about 1,500 acres, situated in Block III, Moutere Survey District, and Block IX, Mount Robinson Survey District. Bounded towards the east by the Foxton-Levin Road from the southernmost corner of Oturoa No. 3 Block to the southernmost corner of Oturoa No. 3 Block to the southernmost corner of Mawa Block; thence towards the south-west by Subdivision No. 1 of Manawatu-Kukutauaki No. 7D Block to its northernmost corner; thence towards the south-east by Subdivisions Nos. 1 and 2 of Manawatu-Kukutauaki No. 7D Block to the westernmost corner of the last-mentioned subdivision; thence towards the north-east by that subdivision for a distance of 70 chains; thence again towards the south-east by a right line at right angles to the south-western boundary of the said Subdivision No. 2, running through Subdivisions Nos. 3, 4, and 5, to the north-eastern boundary of Ngawhakahiamoe Block; thence towards the south-west and south-east by the lastmentioned block to its westernmost corner; thence towards the north by Waitarere No. 1 Block to its north-western corner; thence again towards the south-east by the lastmentioned block and Subdivision 2B of Manawatu-Kukutauaki No. 7D Block to the north-eastern corner of Kahukura Block; thence again towards the south-west by the said Kahukura Block for a distance of 50 chains; thence towards the north-west by a right line to a point on the north-eastern boundary of Whirokino No. 2 Block, distant 70 chains from the easternmost corner of that block, and the said right line produced to a point in line with the south-western boundary of Totara No. 3 Block; thence again towards the north-east by a right line to the westernmost corner of the last-mentioned block; and thence by that block and Oturoa No. 3 Block to the Foxton-Levin Road, the place of commencement.
