LAW REPORT.

("N.Z. Law Reports," Vol. xxviii, pages 1049-53.)

[S.C. IN BANCO. CHRISTCHURCH (SIM, J.)—16TH, 22ND SEPTEMBER, 1909.]

BARNETT v. BISHOP.

"The Gaming Act, 1908," Section 30, (1)—Notification as to betting on Horse-races—Notification by "Our Own Correspondents" of Newspaper.

Section 30, subsection 1, of "The Gaming Act, 1908," provides, *inter alia*, that every person who publishes any newspaper which contains any advertisement or notifica-

tion by or on behalf of any person, club, or association as to betting on any horse-race to be run, whether in or out of New Zealand, shall be guilty of an offence. The defendant published in his newspaper, under the heading "From Our Own Correspondents," the current betting odds offered in respect of certain important impending horse-races to be run in New Zealand, and certain information in respect thereof.

Held, That this did not constitute a breach of the above subsection, inasmuch as the notification was not made by or on behalf of any person, club, or association within the meaning of the subsection.

The effect of the part of the subsection above cited is to prohibit the advertising of any person, club, or association in connection with the business of betting on any horse-race.

APPEAL from a decision of W. R. Haselden, Esq., S.M., at Christchurch, by Matthew Frank Barnett, of Christchurch, publisher. The appellant was convicted on an information charging him with publishing, on the 3rd of July, 1909, a newspaper entitled *Daylight* containing a notification by some person as to betting on horse-races to be run in New Zealand. The defendant had published in his newspaper *Daylight* the current betting odds offered in respect of certain intended horse-races. The details of such notification are set forth in the judgment. He was convicted and fined £20. The ground of the appeal was that the notification was not made by or on behalf of any person, club, or association within the meaning of section 30, subsection 1, of "The Gaming Act, 1908," under which subsection the conviction had been made.

SIM, J.:—The appellant in this case was convicted by the Stipendiary Magistrate at Christchurch of the offence of publishing on the 3rd of July, 1909, a newspaper entitled *Daylight* containing a notification by some person as to betting on horse-races to be run in New Zealand.

It was admitted that the appellant was the proprietor of the newspaper in question, which contained in the issue thereof published on the 3rd of July, 1909, the following information with regard to the betting on certain horse-races to be run in New Zealand:—

"THE BETTING MARKET.

"(From Our Own Correspondents.)

"Wellington.

"C.J.C. Grand National Steeplechase and Hurdles:—

"1300 to 16, Le Beau and Wirral.
"1000 to 12½, Le Beau and Taurira.
"1000 to 12, Le Beau and Scotty.
"500 to 5, Le Beau and Exmoor.
"500 to 5, Capitol and Ben Jonson.
"1000 to 10, Capitol and Auratus.
"1200 to 8, Mocassin and Wirral.
"1000 to 10, Aorangi and Wirral.
"1000 to 10, El Dorado and Kairoma.
"500 to 5, El Dorado and North Head.
"500 to 7½, Te Arai and Wirral.

"Christchurch.

"New Zealand Cup:—

"250 to 5, King's Prize.
"200 to 10, Gravitation.
"200 to 8, Sir Prize.

"C.J.C. Grand National Steeplechase and Hurdles:—

"600 to 11, Le Beau and Wirral.
"500 to 9, Le Beau and Ben Jonson.
"200 to 2, Speciosa and North Head.
"500 to 1, Diplomatic and Ability.

"Auckland.

"Double books on the C.J.C. Grand Nationals have been opened, and prices are reported as follows:—

"100 to 1½, Le Beau, coupled with Ben Jonson, Scotty, Kairoma, Belario, and Compass.

"100 to 1, Capitol, Jack Pot, Te Arai, Lingerer, and Eurus, coupled with Ben Jonson, Scotty, Kairoma, Belario, and Compass.

"From 125 to 1000 to 1, the others.

"New Zealand Cup.

"The only business reported this week was a line of 200 to 10 on Husbandman. Punters are hanging off until the weights appear. A few local knights of the book and pencil have opened double volumes on the Winter Hurdles and Steeplechase at Wellington. Priors range from 100 to 2 upwards. Ben Jonson, Compass, Scotty, and Taurira, coupled with Le Beau, Cymri, and Lingerer, are the favourite combinations."

The Magistrate held that the publication of this information was an offence within the meaning of subsection 1 of section 30 of "The Gaming Act, 1908," and convicted the appellant. The question is whether this decision was erroneous in point of law.

Subsection 1 of section 30 of "The Gaming Act, 1908," is as follows: "Every person is liable to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds who prints, publishes, sells, or publicly exhibits any newspaper or other document which contains any advertisement or notification by or on behalf of any person, club, or association as to betting on any horse-race to be run, whether in or out of New Zealand, or as to investments on the totalisator in respect of any such race, or which contains any information, advice, or suggestion as to the probable result of any such race."

It was contended on behalf of the appellant that the publication of the information above set out was not an advertisement or notification by or on behalf of any person, club, or association within the meaning of the subsection. On behalf of the respondent it was contended that it must be treated as a notification as to betting on a horse-race made by or on behalf of the proprietor of the newspaper or his correspondents.

Subsection 1 of section 30 makes it penal to publish in any newspaper, 1, any advertisement or notification by or on behalf of any person, club, or association, as to (a) betting on any horse-race to be run, or (b) investments on the totalisator in respect of any such race; or, 2, any information, advice, or suggestion as to the probable result of any such race. The information published by the appellant was clearly information as to the betting on horse-races to be run, and the question is whether it can be regarded as an advertisement or notification on behalf of any person, club, or association. I think that it cannot be so treated, and that the effect of the first part of subsection 1 of section 30 is not to prohibit the publication of information such as that in question, but to prohibit the advertising of any person, club, or association in connection with the business of betting on any horse-race, or in connection with making investments on the totalisator in respect of any such race. That this is the meaning of the section is made clear, I think, by the language used in connection with investments on the totalisator. These investments are made on the racecourse on the day the race is run, and it is thus practically impossible to publish in any newspaper before the race is run any information with regard to investments on the totalisator. It cannot be supposed, therefore, that the Legislature was seeking to prohibit something which was practically an impossibility. The only way in which a reasonable meaning can be given to the words of the subsection as to investments on the totalisator is to treat them as referring to an advertisement or notification that some person, club, or association, who is named or indicated therein, is ready and willing to undertake the business of investing money for others on the totalisator. If the words of the section in connection with investments on the totalisator should be construed in this way, it follows, then, that the words used in connection with betting ought to be construed in a similar way, and be read as prohibiting the publication of any advertisement or notification that any person, club, or association named or indicated therein is ready to make bets on any horse-race, or to act as agent for any other person in making such bets, or to act in any other way in connection

with betting on a horse-race. It is true that subsection 2 of section 30 deals, *inter alia*, with the subject of an advertisement or notification by or on behalf of any person to the effect that he is willing to make a bet or wager on the result of a horse-race, and to some extent it thus covers the same ground as that covered by subsection 1 as I have interpreted it. It does not, however, cover the whole ground, because subsection 1 extends to the case of acting as agent in the making of a bet or acting in any other way in connection with betting.

If the construction contended for by the respondent were accepted, the words would amount to a prohibition of the publication of any information with regard to betting on any horse-race to be run. But the Legislature has not prohibited that explicitly, as it might have done by the use of a few simple words, and where the intention is to prohibit the publication of information with regard to any matter that intention is clearly expressed. Thus subsection 1 of section 30 prohibits the publication in any newspaper or other document of any information, advice, or suggestion as to the probable result of any horse-race to be run, and subsection 4 of the same section prohibits the publication in any newspaper or other document of any statement as to the dividend paid by the totalisator on any race, or as to the starting-price in respect of such race.

During the course of his argument Mr. Harper referred to the provisions of the Victorian statute of 1906 (6 Edw. VII, No. 2055) on the same subject. Section 22 of that statute makes it penal to be the publisher of any newspaper whereby any information is given or purported to be given relating to the betting on a horse-race. If these or similar words had been used in the New Zealand statute the conviction in the present case would have been clearly right. But the words of the Victorian statute have not been used, and the words that have been used do not, in my judgment, create any offence in the present case.

The appeal is therefore allowed, and the conviction set aside. As the prosecution in this case was by a police officer, and there was a genuine point of law to be argued, costs will not be allowed to the appellant: See *Batley v. Cullen* (6 N.Z. L.R. 755).
