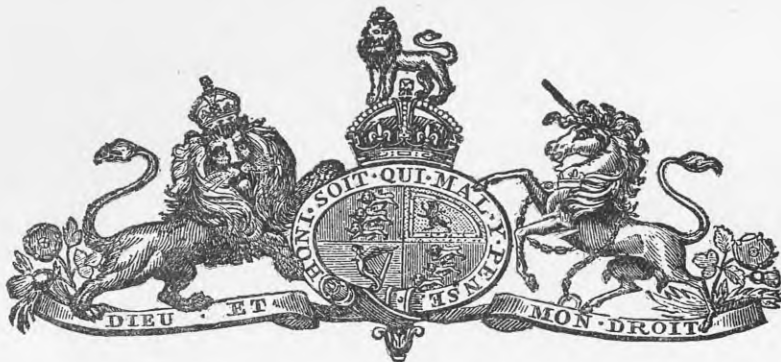

LAW REPORT.

("New Zealand Law Reports," Vol. xxxiii, page 1065.)

[S.C. FULL COURT, WELLINGTON.—(STOUT, C.J., EDWARDS, J., COOPER, J.)—9TH, 30TH JULY, 1914.]

WAIPAPAKURA v. HEMPTON.

Fisheries—Maori Right to fish in Sea or Tidal Waters—Treaty of Waitangi—The Fisheries Act, 1908, Sections 54, 76, and 77.

The right of Maoris to fish in the sea or tidal waters is the same as the right of Europeans, and is governed by the Fisheries Act, 1908, and the regulations made thereunder. Maoris as such have no communal or individual rights of fishery, territorial or extra-territorial, in such waters.

A Magistrate's Court has jurisdiction to inquire whether by Maori custom or under the treaty of Waitangi any Maori right of fishery exists.

APPEAL from a decision of Alfred Crooke, Esq., S.M. at New Plymouth. The respondent, a fishery officer, seized the appellant's nets upon the ground that she was using the same unlawfully in breach of clause 3 of regulations dated the 19th of September, 1911 (N.Z. Gaz. 1911, Vol. ii, p. 2816), made under the Fisheries Act, 1908. The appellant, who was fishing in the tidal waters of the Waitotara River, claimed that she was using the nets in exercise of a Maori fishing-right, and that such right was saved from the operation of the Fisheries Act, 1908, by section 77, subsection 2, of that Act. The appellant sued the respondent for wrongful conversion of her nets. The Magistrate nonsuited the appellant upon the ground that he had no jurisdiction to inquire into the existence of Maori fishing-rights, which could only be ascertained by the Native Land Court.

Hutchen, for the appellant:—

Section 25 of the Native Land Act, 1909, relied upon by the Magistrate as vesting his jurisdiction, does not apply. It cannot be invoked until an Order in Council has been issued. Further, the ascertainment of a fishing-right is not the ascertainment of the title to customary land within section 90 of the Native Land Act, and the Magistrate had

jurisdiction to determine the existence of the fishing-rights and ought to have done so. Existing Maori fishing-rights are preserved by section 77, subsection 2, of the Fisheries Act, 1908. A fishing-right carries with it no right to the bed of the river—*Duke of Somerset v. Fogwell* (5 B. & C. 875; 29 R.R. 449); *Marshall v. Ulleswater Steam Navigation Company* (3 B. and S. 732, 745); *Goodman v. Mayor, &c., of Saltash* (7 A.C. 633); *Attorney-General v. Emerson* ([1891] A.C. 649)—and no such right was or is claimed by the appellant. The course of legislation leading up to the present section preserving Maori fishing-rights was as follows: The rights were recognized by the Fish Protection Act, 1877, repealed as to sea-fisheries by the Sea-fisheries Act, 1894, and the protection as to sea-fisheries was re-enacted by the Sea-fisheries Amendment Act, 1903, in which section 77, subsection 2, of the Fisheries Act, 1908, first appeared. As to the construction of statutes see *Wilberforce on Statute Law* (p. 264).

The Solicitor-General (J. W. Salmond, K.C.) and C. H. Weston, for the respondent:—

Section 77, subsection 2, is merely a saving clause and not an enacting clause. It creates no rights—it merely saves existing rights. The existence of the rights must be established independently of this Act. It is permissible to hold that no such rights exist notwithstanding this provision. As to the construction of a saving clause, see *Lord Advocate v. Hamilton* (1 McQ. H. of L. 46, at p. 55) and *West Derby Union v. Metropolitan Life Assurance Society* ([1897] A.C. 647, at pp. 652, 655). The saving clause does not mean a general exemption of Maoris from the Act. It does not preserve to Maoris the right to fish as they did before the passing of the Act. Before the Act the Maoris had, in common with the public, the right to fish in any waters. The clause only preserved to them proprietary fishing-rights vested in some hapu or tribe. That the Act applies to Maoris is shown by sections 17, 46, and 76. The seizure of the nets is authorized by section 9, subsection 1, paragraph (d) of the Act. With respect to the proprietary rights there are two questions: 1, What rights exist; and, 2, can they be recognized elsewhere than in the Native Land Court? 1. The rights are of two possible kinds—(a) a right to fish on their own lands, and (b) rights to fish on Crown lands. The first right is called a territorial fishery; it is merely a part of the general right of ownership. The other right is a non-territorial fishery: See *Coulson and Forbes on Waters* (3rd ed. 381); *Halsbury's Laws of England* (Vol. xiv., p. 572, par. 1266). This distinction is important in this case. The territorial fisheries of Maoris are of two kinds: those in respect of—1, freehold lands; 2, customary lands. The first class are undoubted and are preserved by section 77, subsection 2, and may be taken notice of by Magistrates' Courts.

[Stout, C.J.—The Act assumes that there are fisheries in tidal waters.]

Crown grant statutory orders vesting land in Maoris may include tidal waters. The second class of rights must exist—they are incidental to the customary ownership; but the question arises whether the Native Land Court has not the exclusive jurisdiction to take notice of such rights. I find great difficulty in supporting the view taken by the Magistrate that the Native Land Court alone can take notice of such rights. The right is a legal statutory right *prima facie*, and may be taken notice of in any Court. In this case the land abutting on the river was Native freehold land. If the Magistrate has no jurisdiction it must be excluded by some statutory provision. Section 90 of the Native Land Act, 1909, gives exclusive jurisdiction to the Native Land Court to make freehold orders in respect of customary land. Any Court may in an appropriate proceeding take notice of customary title. The opposite conclusion would paralyse the operation of this or other Courts where the question of title incidentally arose. If the question arose the Courts would then have to assume it was Crown land. Section 90 must be read with sections 91 and 92. There are dicta in *Tamihana Korokai v. the Solicitor-General* (32 N.Z. L.R. 321) which, apart from their context, would seem to decide that the Native Land Court has exclusive jurisdiction, but the exclusive jurisdiction given to the Native Land Court is an exclusive jurisdiction only on an application for a freehold order. Sections 84, 85, and 88 show that other Courts have jurisdiction to take notice of customary title. Section 84 of the Act of 1909, as amended by section 43 of the Act of 1913, would now be an answer where the claim was based on customary land, but does not affect the present action. As to non-territorial fisheries, it is clear that there can be no such rights in land over which the Native title has been extinguished by cession or otherwise. If ownership has been given up that includes their fishing-rights. The only land over which the Maoris never had any claim was land under tidal waters, and it is only in such waters that there could be non-territorial fisheries. The plaintiff's claim is for a non-territorial fishery in the tidal waters of the Crown. The land has belonged to the Crown since the Crown came to New Zealand. The principle that tidal waters belong to the

Crown is in force here unaffected by the Treaty of Waitangi or Native land legislation. Native customary title is limited by high-water mark, and does not include tidal waters. It is illegal for the Crown to make a grant that would interfere with the public right of fishing and navigation: *Attorney-General for British Columbia v. Attorney-General for Canada* ([1914] A.C. 153). There can, therefore, be no territorial fisheries in the sea. Apart from legislation the Treaty of Waitangi is merely a bargain binding upon the conscience of the Crown, and is not a source of legal rights. There is no legislation giving to the Maoris the right to fish in non-territorial waters. The only customary right recognized in the Native legislation is Native customary ownership of land. The Native Land Court has no jurisdiction to ascertain the title to incorporate hereditaments. The Fish Protection Act, 1877, section 8, corresponds with section 77, subsection 2, of the Fisheries Act, 1908, and is merely a saving clause and does not create rights.

Hutchen, in reply:—

If there were no non-territorial sea-fisheries section 77, subsection 2, was unnecessary. The rights conserved by that section are not necessarily legal rights, but fishing-rights exercised from time immemorial: *May v. Belleville* ([1905] 2 Ch. 605) *Cur. adv. vult.*

Scout, C.J., delivered the judgment of the Court, as follows:—
This is an appeal from a decision of Alfred Crooke, Esq., S.M., sitting at New Plymouth.

The respondent, a fishery officer, purporting to act under regulations made under the Fisheries Act, 1908, seized certain nets belonging to the appellant, and has refused to give them up. The regulation under which the respondent purported to act says, "Set-nets having an opening of not more than 3 ft. by 1 ft. 6 in. may be used for taking whitebait in the rivers and streams in the Counties of Clifton, Taranaki, and Egmont, but no person shall use any groyne, race, or lead in connection with such nets. No person shall use more than one set-net, and no person shall set a line of set-nets across any river or stream in the said counties."

These regulations are authorized by section 5 of the Fisheries Act, 1908, paragraphs (a), (d), and (l). This section and the subsections are as follows:—

"5. The Governor may, from time to time, by Order in Council gazetted, make regulations, which shall have force and effect either throughout New Zealand or only in such waters or places as are specified in the regulations, for any of the purposes following, that is to say:—

"(a.) Generally regulating sea-fishing in New Zealand:

"(d.) Imposing conditions and restrictions on the taking of fish, &c.:

"(l.) Fixing the minimum size, when wet, of the mesh in the square, or in extension from knot to knot, of nets and seines to be used in fishing; prescribing the mode of measuring the same; and prohibiting the use of nets or seines of all descriptions or of any specified description."

The appellant relied on section 76 and subsection 2 of section 77 of the Fisheries Act, 1908, which are as follows:—

"76. (1.) No Maori or half-caste habitually living with Maoris according to their customs shall be sued for any fine or forfeiture under this Part of this Act unless and until the authority of the Native Minister to take proceedings has been filed in the Court in which such proceedings are intended to be taken.

"(2.) The aforesaid authority of the Native Minister may from time to time be signified by him to any person, either generally or specifically, and shall be valid if signified by telegraph or telephone message.

"77. (2.) Nothing in this Part of this Act shall affect any existing Maori fishing-rights."

The Magistrate held that he could not inquire as to whether the appellant had any right by Maori custom or under the Treaty of Waitangi, and that right, if any, must be found by the Native Land Court. In this respect he was, in my opinion, wrong. The Native Land Court has jurisdiction only to ascertain the title of Natives to land, and to grant a certificate accordingly. No special jurisdiction has been conferred on the Native Land Court to deal with "fisheries"—i.e., fishing rights.

The case of *Tamihana Korokai v. The Solicitor-General* (32 N.Z. L.R. 321) only determined that where, as in that case, a Native claimed the ownership of the bed of a lake it was the duty of the Court to hear and adjudicate on such claim. The judgment of the Court was "that the Native Land Court can only be prevented from performing its statutory duty, first, under the Native Land Act; or, second, on proof in that Court that the lands are Crown lands freed from the customary title of the Natives; or, third, that there is a Crown title to the bed of the lake." The judgment of the Court was not, therefore, a decision that if fishing-rights existed these could not be proved in a Magistrate's Court.

A much wider question has, however, been raised in this appeal. First, it is said that the Fisheries Act, 1908, creates

no right of fishing in favour of Maori people; second, such a right as is claimed was not granted by the Treaty of Waitangi; and, third, if granted, the Legislature has not confirmed that grant. Subsection 2 of section 77 is a saving clause; it is not the grant of a right. There are several provisions in Part I of the Act that show that the Legislature acted on the assumption that Maoris have not absolute fishing-rights (see sections 17, 46, and 76). It is not averred that the appellant had any fishing-right save a right of succession by virtue of her ownership of land, to which it is admitted she has obtained a title in fee-simple, to fish in the sea, and that right was granted to her, if granted at all, by the Treaty of Waitangi. That treaty states, "Her Majesty the Queen of England confirms and guarantees to the chiefs and tribes of New Zealand, and to the respective families and individuals thereof, the full, exclusive, and undisturbed possession of their lands and estates, forests, fisheries, and other properties which they may collectively or individually possess, so long as it is their wish and desire to retain the same in their possession; but the chiefs of the united tribes and the individual chiefs yield to her Majesty the exclusive right of pre-emption over such lands as the proprietors thereof may be disposed to alienate, at such prices as may be agreed upon between the respective proprietors and persons appointed by Her Majesty to treat with them in that behalf." How the treaty is to be interpreted is stated in *Wi Parata v. Bishop of Wellington* and *The Attorney-General (3 N.Z. Jur. N.S. S.C. 72)*. Assuming that we are bound by that decision—though perhaps not by all the expressions used in the judgment—it is clear from the decision of the Privy Council in *Nireaha Tamaki v. Baker* ([1901] A.C. 561) that, until there is some legislative proviso as to the carrying-out of the treaty, the Court is helpless to give effect to its provisions. In *Nireaha Tamaki v. Baker* ([1901] A.C. 561) their Lordships of the Privy Council said that the Treaty of Waitangi would not of itself be sufficient to create a right in the Native occupiers of land "cognizable in a Court of law." In that case their Lordships relied upon the provisions of the Native Rights Act, 1865. We do not think that Act could have affected the question which we have now to decide, but it may be as well to observe that that Act was repealed finally by the Native Land Act, 1909.

Even if the Treaty of Waitangi is to be assumed to have the effect of a statute it would be very difficult to spell out of its second clause the creation or recognition of territorial or extra-territorial fishing-rights in tidal waters. There is no attempt in the Fisheries Act, 1908, to give rights to non-Maoris not given to Maoris. All have the right to fish in the sea and in tidal rivers who obey the regulations and restrictions of the Statute. This statute has not given, and no New Zealand statute gives, any communal or individual rights of fishery, territorial or extra-territorial, in the sea or tidal rivers. All that the Fisheries Act does is to regulate all fisheries so as to preserve the fish for all. There are concessions given, but these concessions are to Maoris, as appear in the sections already referred to, and do not affect the question to be decided in this case. Now, in English law—and the law of fishery is the same in New Zealand as in England, for we brought in the common law of England with us, except in so far as it has not in respect of sea-fisheries been altered by our statutes—there cannot be fisheries reserved for individuals in tidal waters or in the sea near the coast. In the sea beyond the three-mile limit all have a right to fish, and there is no limitation of such general right in the regulations dealing with such waters. There is special legislation regarding extra-territorial waters the result of treaties, but that does not apply to us. In the tidal waters—and the fishing in this case was in this area—all can fish unless a specially defined right has been given to some of the King's subjects which excludes others. It may be, to put the case the strongest possible way for the Maoris, that the Treaty of Waitangi meant to give such an exclusive right to the Maoris, but if it meant to do so no legislation has been passed conferring the right, and in the absence of such both *Wi Parata v. The Bishop of Wellington* (3 N.Z. Jur. N.S. S.C. 72) and *Nireaha Tamaki v. Baker* ([1901] A.C. 561) are authorities for saying that until given by statute no such right can be enforced. An Act alone can confer such a right, just as an Act is required in England to confer such a right unless some charter from the Crown prior to Magna Charta can be proved: See Halsbury's Laws of England (Vol. xiv, p. 574, para. 1269, 1274). There is no allegation in this case that the land over which the tide flows belongs to the Maoris. The Maoris have land adjoining, but if so the Crown grant would be to high-water mark and would not include the land under the sea or tidal waters. In *Mueller v. The Taupiri Coalmines (Limited)* (20 N.Z. L.R. 89) the Court of Appeal held that even the bed of a navigable river remained vested in the Crown and did not pass to grantees of land fronting the river.

Therefore, so far as sea-fisheries are concerned—and the question of fishing-rights on inland rivers adjoining Maori land is not before the Court—there must, in our opinion, be some legislative provision made before the Court can recog-

nize the private rights, if any, of Maoris to fish in the sea or in tidal waters. It is clear, therefore, that, so far as this appeal is concerned, the appellant cannot succeed even if the Court were to refer the case back to the Magistrate.

It appears from the case stated that the appellant's nets have merely been seized by a fishery officer. There is no statement that they have been forfeited, nor any finding of the Magistrate to that effect. The seizure was on 22nd August, 1913, and the action was brought on 5th October, 1913.

The regulations made under section 5 prohibit the use of more than one set net in the Waitara River for the purpose of taking whitebait, and also the use of any groyne, race, or lead in connection with any nets for the purpose of taking whitebait, and impose a fine for a breach. At the time of the seizure by the fishery officer of the appellant's nets she was using more than one set-net, and also using them in connection with groynes and for the purpose of taking whitebait. This use was in contravention of the regulations, and was therefore an offence against the Act. Under section 52 of the Act the fishery officer had authority to seize them and hold them. At the time the action was brought and heard there was no evidence adduced that they had been forfeited, but they were nevertheless, although not up to that time forfeited, in the lawful possession of the fishery officer. Section 76 of the Act does not conflict with section 54. Section 54 gives authority to seize; section 76 to forfeit. The appellant being a Maori, there could not be any suit for forfeiture under section 76 without the written sanction of the Native Minister to bring the suit. It does not appear from the case that this sanction has been applied for, or has been refused or granted. If the Native Minister has refused to give his sanction then it may be that in appropriate proceedings the appellant may be entitled to recover the nets, but she cannot in the present action.

As, therefore, we hold that the case shows that she was unlawfully using the nets at the time they were seized, it follows that they were properly seized and were at the time the action was brought in the lawful possession of the fishery officer, although owned by the appellant. The Magistrate was therefore right in entering a judgment of nonsuit, but wrong in the reasons he gave for that judgment.

On account of the importance involved in this appeal, Mr. Justice Edwards, before whom the case was first brought, in New Plymouth, suggested that it was desirable that it should be reargued before the Full Court, but that in such case the Crown should pay the appellant's costs of the appeal in any event. To this suggestion the officers of the Crown agreed, and it is therefore unnecessary now to deal with the question of costs.

Appeal dismissed.

Additional Regulations under the War Regulations Act, 1914.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House at Wellington, this twenty-fifth day of November, 1914.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the War Regulations Act, 1914, the Governor in Council may, for the purpose of better securing the public safety during the present war, make regulations as to the powers and duties of any persons acting on His Majesty's behalf: And whereas by the same Act the Governor in Council may also make regulations prohibiting any acts which in his opinion are injurious to the public safety during the present war: And whereas by Order in Council made on the tenth day of November, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* on the same day, the Governor made certain regulations under the said Act: And whereas it is expedient to make further regulations under the said Act:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, do hereby, in pursuance of the War Regulations Act, 1914, and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in that behalf, make the following regulations; and do, with the like advice and consent, declare that the said regulations shall come into force on the publication thereof in the *New Zealand Gazette*.

REGULATIONS.

1. THESE regulations shall be read together with and shall be deemed part of the regulations made under the War Regulations Act, 1914, by Order in Council of the 10th day of November, 1914, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* on the same day.

2. When the Attorney-General is satisfied, as to any incorporated company which is or has been carrying on business in New Zealand, whether incorporated in New Zealand or elsewhere, that not less than one-half of the issued share capital thereof is or at any time since the commencement of the present war with Germany has been held by or on behalf of alien enemies, or that the company bears or has at any time since the commencement of such war borne such a relation to any other company, firm, or person being or carrying on business in enemy territory as to render the exercise of the powers herein conferred expedient for the public safety, the Attorney-General may, by warrant under his hand, appoint the Public Trustee as the Controller of that company under these regulations. Any such appointment may be at any time in like manner revoked.

3. It shall be the duty of the Controller so appointed to take and retain possession of all property whatsoever then or thereafter belonging to the company, and of all premises occupied by the company, and to collect, receive, and retain all moneys payable to the company.

4. The Controller may, if and so far as he thinks fit, carry on the business of the company or allow such business to be carried on by the directors, agents, and servants of the company under his control and supervision, and may for this purpose sell any stock in trade so taken possession of as aforesaid.

5. While the Controller remains in office under these regulations, no director, agent, or servant of the company shall continue to act as such save with the permission of the Controller, and so far as such permission extends.

6. The Controller may, out of any moneys of the company received by him, pay and discharge any debts or liabilities of the company on such evidence as seems to him sufficient.

7. No director, agent, or servant of the company, and no other person, shall in any manner obstruct or interfere with the Controller, or with any agent, servant, or representative of the Controller, in the exercise or performance of any of his powers, duties, or authorities under these regulations.

8. No director, agent, or servant of the company, and no person who has at any time since the commencement of the present war with Germany been or acted as a director, agent, or servant of the company, shall withhold from the Controller any information relating to the company on being required by the Controller to supply such information.

9. So long as a Controller remains in office under these regulations no person shall directly or indirectly pay any money to or for the benefit of the company, or be in any manner knowingly concerned in the payment of any money to or for the benefit of the company, otherwise than through the Controller on behalf of the company.

10. All powers conferred upon the Controller by these regulations may be exercised by him either personally or through such agent, servant, or other representative as he may think fit to appoint in that behalf.

11. All moneys of the company received by the Controller shall form part of the common fund of the Public Trust Office, but no interest shall be payable thereon, and such moneys shall be charged with all expenses incurred by the Controller in the exercise of his powers under these regulations, including the reasonable remuneration of any agent, servant, or representative appointed by the Controller as aforesaid.

12. The Controller may exercise in the name and on behalf of the company all rights of action from time to time vested in the company.

And whereas it is desirable to remove the said restriction in so far as it relates to the taking of trout in the waters of Lake Ngatai, but not further or otherwise:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred on him by section eighty-three of the Fisheries Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby revoke regulation one of the said regulations of the thirteenth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and twelve, in so far as it restricts the taking of trout in the said waters of Lake Ngatai, but not further or otherwise.
