REGULATIONS.

1. THE close season for oysters within all the bays, estuaries, and tidal waters on the west coast of the North Island of New Zealand lying between Albatross Point on the north and the mouth of the Urenui Stream on the south, which was made by the hereinbefore-recited Order in Council of the 22nd July, 1912, is hereby extended until the 22nd July, 1917.

2. Any person taking oysters within the area mentioned in clause 1 hereof during such close season is liable to a fine of not less than £1 and not more than £20.

Declaring certain Land in the Hawera Survey District to be a Sanctuary for Imported and Native Game.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

PURSUANT to the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby notify and declare that the area described in the Schedule hereto shall be a sanctuary for the purposes of the said Animals Protection Act, and that no imported or native game shall be taken or killed within the said area.

SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Taranaki Land District, containing about 2,500 acres, being the properties of Messrs. Larcom Brothers, Thomas Winks, James Baker, and Heathcote Livingstone, comprising Sections 5, 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, and 14, Block III, Hawera Survey District.

Declaring Manukau Oyster-fishery.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

WHEREAS by Warrant dated the eleventh day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 42, of the thirteenth day of that month, the bays, estuaries, and tidal waters of Manukau Harbour, situated inside a straight line drawn from the summit of Paratutu on the North Head to the lighthouse on the South Head of that harbour, were declared to be a fishery under the name of "The Manukau Oyster-fishery":

And whereas by section forty of the Fisheries Act, 1908, it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time, by notice in the *Gazette*, declare that any oyster-fishery shall be set apart for the purposes of the said section—that is, that it shall be set apart as an oyster-fishery in which the Minister may employ persons for the purpose of taking oysters:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, G.C.M.G., M.V.O., the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in exercise of the hereinbefore-recited power and authority, do hereby declare and set apart the Manukau Oyster-fishery to be an oyster-fishery for the purposes of section forty of the Fisheries Act, 1908.
