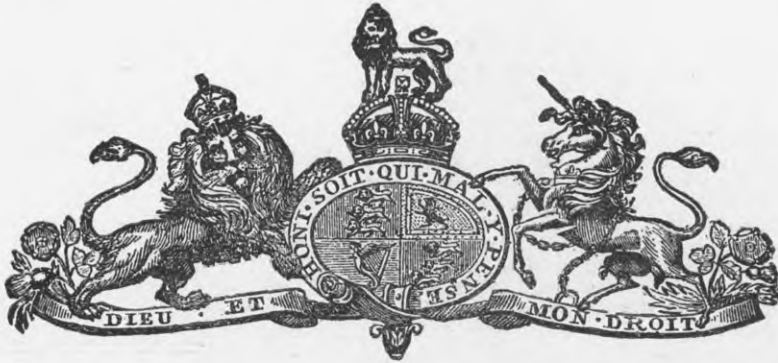

PERSONS WANTED.

QUEEN STREET WHARF (AUCKLAND).—22nd ultimo, on **warrant** for deserting from the s.s. "Devon," **Thomas Turner**, age thirty, height 5 ft. 7 in., fireman, native of England, stout build, fair hair and complexion, clean-shaved.

QUEEN STREET WHARF (AUCKLAND).—22nd ultimo, on **warrant** for deserting from the s.s. "Devon," **William Turner**, age thirty-six, height 5 ft. 10 in., fireman, native of England, slight build, fair complexion, fair hair and moustache.

AUCKLAND.—**Lee Fong**, *alias Ah Lee*, *alias Lee Kee*, smoking opium: It has been ascertained by the Newton police that accused left New Zealand on the 15th

MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION.

Information for the Criminal Registration Branch, including *Police Gazette* matter.

Attention is called to the fact that frequent errors appear in matter supplied for record in the Criminal Registration Office or for publication in the *Police Gazette*. At present it is a common occurrence to find that returns received from a police-station containing information regarding the same offender do not agree. For example, finger-print or photographic forms show an offender as having been sentenced to six years' H.L. for rape (two charges); the Supreme Court return shows him as having been sentenced to six years' H.L. on each (cumulative) of three charges of attempted rape; and the return of prisoners discharged from gaol shows him as having been sentenced to six years' H.L. for indecent assault (one charge). This should not be; and it is absolutely essential that all information supplied on the returns, &c., referred to (particularly those supplied by the members of the Force) must be correct. When an offender is brought before either the Magistrate's or Supreme Court he is dealt with on a certain number of charges, therefore the recording of the conviction or otherwise should, if correctly recorded, be uniform no matter on what return it is shown.

Particular care must be taken that—

- (1.) Under the heading "Offence" the correct and full number of charges dealt with are shown (if charge is reduced the minor charge must be shown, and not the major one).
- (2.) Under the heading "Sentence," the correct sentence or how dealt with on each charge must be shown.
- (3.) Under the heading "Name" the person's name must be given in full and correctly spelled.
- (4.) Under the heading "Date" the correct date of conviction (if not convicted, then the date dealt with) must be given.

Collections for War Funds.

It is desired that members of the Force shall render all possible assistance in enforcing the provisions of the War Funds Act, 1915 (amended by War Legislation Amendment Act, 1916), dealing with the issue of permits to collect contributions to a war fund as defined by the Act. The War Funds Office is distributing to police-stations lists of societies and persons authorized to issue collectors' permits, also specimen forms of permit and pamphlet explaining the requirements of the War Funds Act. Although a complete list of funds registered in the War Funds Office is being circulated, it will be observed that permits to collect may be issued only in respect of those societies which are included in the list published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the 31st August, 1916. Additions to this list will be gazetted from time to time.

The police should immediately report any cases they detect of persons collecting contributions to a war fund without a proper permit, or of permits being issued by unauthorized societies or persons.

INSTRUCTIONS TO CANDIDATES.

1. You are expected to be in your place before the time appointed for each paper, and on no account will you be allowed to enter the examination-room after the examination has commenced. You must be prepared to remain in the

room until you have finished the paper set for the morning or afternoon, as the case may be, or until the time allowed for the paper has expired.

2. You must not consult any book or notes, or communicate in any way with any other candidate in the examination-room. The Supervisor has authority to order any candidate who disobeys this instruction to withdraw from the examination.

3. Write on only one side of the paper. Write your examination number at the top of every sheet of your answers; your name is not to be written thereon. Do not write out the questions, but put the number of the question before each answer. Leave a margin to each sheet and a clear space between one answer and another. You may write the answers in any order, but the number of the question must be prefixed to its answer.

4. Fasten together with the paper-fasteners provided for the purpose all the sheets containing your answers to any one paper, and on the back of the last sheet write your examination number, the subject, and the number of sheets. Be careful not to omit any sheet of your answers. Do not fold the sheets.

5. When you have finished your answers to any one paper do not leave them on the table at which you have been sitting, but hand them to the Supervisor.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF SUPERVISORS.

The examinations will be held in the order and at the times prescribed in the time-table, which will be supplied to each Supervisor and candidate.

The Supervisor shall be present during the entire examination, and he is not to answer any inquiry or express any opinion as to the meaning of any questions in the examination-papers. He will allot a seat to each candidate at each sitting, and not allow any to choose his own.

Pens, ink, ruled foolscap paper, blotting-paper, pins, and paper-fasteners will be supplied to each candidate at each sitting as he takes his seat in the examination-room.

Candidates shall not be permitted to speak to each other or communicate with any person in the room except the Supervisor, and with that exception strict silence must be observed during the examination.

Any candidate detected in the examination room in possession of any book or manuscript brought in for his assistance, or in copying from the papers of another candidate, or permitting his own papers to be copied, or in attempting to give or receive assistance of any description, will be disqualified; his examination will be discontinued, and the circumstances reported to the Commissioner.

No candidate shall be permitted to leave the room during the hours of examination without finally giving up his papers, and any candidate arriving after the examination has commenced shall not be admitted.

Any candidate who may have finished his replies to the questions in his examination-paper before the expiry of the time allowed may deliver them to the Supervisor and retire from the room.

The examination-papers will be sent in sealed packets to the Supervisor, who will keep them locked up under his own special care until he takes them to the examination-room.

At the hour prescribed in the time-table for the commencement of the examination in each particular subject, the Supervisor will break the seal and open the packet containing the examination-papers in the presence of all the candidates sitting for that subject, and then distribute the sealed envelopes contained in the packet to the candidates to whom they are addressed.

Each candidate will be given an examination number, which he is to record plainly at the top of each sheet of paper handed in by him containing his replies to questions in the examination-paper. A candidate's name must on no account appear on any paper or map handed in by him.

At or before the hour prescribed for the closing of the examination in each subject, each candidate will hand to the Supervisor the papers containing his replies to the questions in such subject. As he receives each set of papers the Supervisor, after satisfying himself that the candidate's examination number is plainly inserted at the top of each paper handed in, will place them in the large envelope supplied for that purpose. When all the candidates' papers have been received, the Supervisor will secure and seal the envelope and cause it to be posted forthwith to the Commissioner, after first marking on the bottom left-hand corner the date and hour it left his hands to be posted.

Opossums absolutely protected in Wellington Acclimatization District.

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

IN pursuance of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby notify and declare that, from and after the date hereof, opossums of every variety shall be deemed to be absolutely protected within the Wellington Acclimatization District as described in the Schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Wellington Land District bounded towards the north-west and north generally by the Counties of Wanganui, Waimarino, and East Taupo from the mouth of the Wangaehu River to the Rangitikei River at the north-eastern corner of the County of Rangitikei; thence towards the east generally by the County of Hawke's Bay and the summit of the Ruahine Range to the Feilding and District Acclimatization District as described in the *New Zealand Gazette* No. 38, of the 4th May, 1899; thence towards the south-west, south-east, and north-east generally by that district and the Counties of Woodville, Dannevirke, and Weber to the sea at the mouth of the Waimata River; and thence again towards the south-east, south, and west generally by the sea to the mouth of the Wangaehu River, the place of commencement: including adjacent islands excepting Kapiti.

The aforesaid area comprises the Counties of Hutt, Makara, Masterton, Featherston, Castlepoint, Wairarapa South, Pahiatua, Eketahuna, Mauriceville, Akitio, Horowhenua, Kairanga, and Rangitikei, and parts of the Counties of Manawatu, Oroua, and Kiwitea, together with the City of Wellington, the Boroughs of Miramar, Karori, Onslow, Petone, Lower Hutt, Eastbourne, Foxton, Masterton, Greytown, Carterton, Pahiatua, Eketahuna, Levin, Palmerston North, Marton, and Taihape, and the Featherston, Hunterville, Johnsonville, Otaki, Martinborough, Upper Hutt, and Mangaweka Town Districts.

NOTE.—The following is section 33 of the War Legislation Amendment Act, 1916, referred to:—

POLICE OFFENCES AMENDMENT.

33. (1.) The Governor may from time to time, by notice in the *Gazette*, prohibit the use in connection with any trade or business of any word having reference in any way to the present war, on the ground that the use of the said word for any such purpose may be offensive to public sentiment.

(2.) The prohibition of the use of any word under this section shall be deemed to include the prohibition of the use of any abbreviation or variation of such word, and also the use of any other word that may incorporate such word, variation, or abbreviation.

(3.) Every person who acts in contravention of a notice under this section shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding ten pounds.

(4.) Nothing in this section shall affect the right of the proprietor of any trade-mark registered before the publication of a notice under this section, and containing any word the use of which for the purposes of any trade or business is prohibited or deemed to be prohibited by such notice, to continue to use such trade-mark for a period not exceeding three months after the issue of that notice.

(5.) While any notice under this section remains in force the Registrar of Patents, Designs, and Trade-marks shall refuse to accept any application for the registration of a trade-mark, including any word prohibited or deemed to be prohibited by such notice; and on the expiration of three months after the issue of any such notice the Registrar shall, if such notice remains in force, cancel the registration of any trade-mark that includes any such word, or may modify any such trade-mark by the exclusion of any such word.

(6.) Proceedings under this section shall not be instituted, except with the previous consent of the Attorney-General.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is desirable for the encouragement of recruiting in the Expeditionary Forces raised for service in the present war that a distinctive badge should be issued to and worn by men who have served or offered to serve in the war, or who are for any proper reason exempt from any obligation to serve therein:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, do hereby, in pursuance of the War Regulations Act, 1914, make the following regulations, and revoke the regulations made for the like purpose under the said Act on the eleventh day of February, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen; and I do hereby, with the like advice and consent, declare that this Order in Council shall come into operation on the fourth day of September, one thousand nine hundred and sixteen.

REGULATIONS.

1. THE Minister of Defence may approve of a badge to be worn on the arm by men—

(a.) Who have been honourably discharged from the Expeditionary Forces, or have been in any manner engaged in active service during the present war and have been honourably discharged therefrom; or

(b.) Who have been voluntarily enlisted or enrolled for active service in the present war but have not yet been called up; or who have offered themselves for active service in the present war but have been rejected or exempted because of inability to fulfil the requirements of the Defence Department, or because of their engagement in any essential industry or employment.

2. The badge so to be approved may be in such several different forms as the Minister of Defence thinks fit.

3. The badge so approved may be issued by any military officers to such men as are deemed qualified to receive and wear the same.

4. Every badge so issued shall be accompanied by a card signed by a military officer and containing particulars as to the man to whom it is issued, and the reasons for its issue.

5. Every man to whom any such badge has been issued shall at all times while wearing the badge or having it in his personal possession carry with him the card issued to him along with the badge as aforesaid, and shall on the request of any military officer, or of any constable, or of any warrant officer or non-commissioned officer of an Expeditionary Force or of the Permanent Staff produce the said card for his inspection.

6. No man shall falsely represent himself to be a person who is entitled to receive or wear any such badge.

7. No man other than a man to whom such a badge has been duly issued by a military officer shall wear any badge so approved by the Minister of Defence.

8. No man, whether a badge has been so duly issued to him or not, shall wear upon his arm any badge of any description whatever other than—

(a.) An approved badge lawfully issued to him under these regulations or under the War Regulations of the 29th day of March, 1916, relative to the officers and crews of transports; or

(b.) A badge indicative of military, naval, or official rank; or

(c.) A badge indicative of mourning.

9. No man to whom an approved badge has been issued under these regulations shall wear that badge, whether on his arm or otherwise, in any mutilated or substantially altered form.

10. Every badge approved by the Minister of Defence before the coming into operation of these regulations under paragraphs (a), (c), or (d) of clause 2 of the regulations hereby revoked

shall be deemed to have been approved under paragraph (b) of the present regulations.

11. Every badge approved by the Minister of Defence before the coming into operation of these regulations under paragraph (b) of clause 2 of the regulations hereby revoked shall be deemed to have been approved under paragraph (a) of the present regulations.

12. All badges and cards issued under the regulations hereby revoked shall be deemed to have been issued under the present regulations.

13. These regulations shall be read together with and deemed part of the War Regulations of the 10th day of November, 1914.

1. THE War Regulations of the 2nd day of May, 1916 (relative to enemy shareholders), are hereby amended by inserting at the end of clause 6 thereof the words " Provided that no such sale shall take place without the consent of the Attorney-General."

2. The War Regulations of the 24th day of July, 1916 (relative to licenses for the importation of goods), are hereby amended by inserting in paragraph (a) of clause 1 thereof, after the words " United States of America," the words " or France or Japan."

3. The War Regulations of the 21st day of August, 1916 (published on page 2801 of the *Gazette*, and relating to the sale of intoxicating liquor), are hereby amended by inserting in the definition of licensed premises, in clause 1 thereof, the words " or a New Zealand wine license " after the words " accommodation license."

LAW REPORT.

(“New Zealand Law Reports,” 1916, page 767.)

[S.C. IN BANCO, GISBORNE—(COOPER, J.)—27TH JUNE AND 15TH JULY, 1916.]

SCHRODER *v.* DUDDY.

Maori Councils—Offences—Maori Village not in proclaimed Maori District—Introduction of Liquor into Village—Whether an Offence—Maori Councils Act, 1900, ss. 3, 25—Maori Councils Amendment Act, 1903, ss. 2 (c), (iv), and (f), 3 (1).

The creation of a Maori district under the Maori Councils Act, 1900, is a condition precedent to the operation of the provisions of the Act and its amendments.

The Maori kainga, village, or pa referred to in s. 3 (1) of the amending Act of 1903 means a Maori kainga, village, or pa within a Maori district constituted under the Act of 1900, and the introduction of intoxicating liquor into a Maori kainga, village, or pa not situated within such a district is therefore not an offence within the section.

Semble, That, though neither the Maori Councils Act, 1900, nor any of its amendments gives a Maori Council any express authority to inflict a fine for breach of its by-laws, such a power must be inferred from s. 25 of the principal Act, and s. 2 (c) (iv), the proviso to s. 2 (f), and the opening words of s. 3 of the Amendment Act of 1903.

APPEAL on points of law from the decision of R. S. Florance, Esq., S.M., Gisborne.

The appellant was convicted on an information charging him with introducing intoxicating liquor into a Maori village contrary to s. 3 (1) of the Maori Councils Amendment Act, 1903, which is as follows:—

In addition to any fine imposed by the Council for the breach of any by-law under section sixteen of the principal Act, any person, whether a Maori or not, who introduces or takes intoxicating liquor into a Maori kainga, village, or pa is liable on conviction before a Stipendiary Magistrate for a first offence to a fine not exceeding ten pounds, and for a second or any subsequent offence to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds, or for each offence to one month's imprisonment.

The case on appeal showed that the appellant had assisted in the carrying of some bottles of whisky from a hotel at Port Awanui to Tikitiki, where there was a Maori village as well as a European settlement. It was not proved that a Maori Council had been legally constituted to control a district including Tikitiki, nor were any by-laws, or constitution, or *Gazette* notice in respect to any Maori Council produced or proved, nor was it proved that the subject-matter of the prosecution had been considered or in any manner dealt with by any Maori Council.

The grounds of appeal were that s. 3 (1) of the Maori Councils Amendment Act, 1903, did not create an offence, but only empowered a Magistrate to inflict a fine as an additional penalty for a breach of a by-law in respect of which the Maori Council had already taken action; and that the liquor was not taken inside the Maori village.

July 15.—COOPER, J. :—

[After stating the facts His Honour proceeded:] The first question is as to the construction of s. 3 (1). Mr. Burnard's contention is that this subsection is supplementary only—that it does not create an offence, but gives power to the Magistrate to impose, if an offence against a by-law is committed, an additional punishment to the fine imposed by the Maori Council. He contends that there must first be proved to have been (a) a by-law duly made, (b) a fine imposed by the Maori Council in respect of the by-law, and (c) a proceeding to recover the fine as prescribed by the Maori Councils Act before the Magistrate has jurisdiction to impose the additional penalty prescribed by s. 3. And he contends that, as there was no Maori Council and no by-law, the Magistrate had no jurisdiction to convict the appellant.

The legislation in reference to the introduction into Maori kaingas, villages, or pas of intoxicating liquor is as follows: In the original Maori Councils Act, 1900, s. 16 (4) gave power to a Maori Council to make by-laws for, *inter alia*, the prevention of drunkenness and sly-grog selling. By the Amendment Act of 1903 this power was extended by giving the Council authority to make by-laws for preventing the introduction by Maoris or any other persons of alcoholic liquors into any Maori kainga, village, or pa; and s. 3 was also enacted. Section 3 (4) provides that all liquor introduced or taken into any Maori kainga, village, or pa in breach of any such by-law shall be forfeited, and may, together with the vessels containing the same, be seized by the Chairman of the Council, or any person acting under his written instructions, and dealt with as liquor forfeited under the Licensing Act, 1881. By sub-s. (2) liquor introduced under a medical certificate was exempted from the section. By s. 16 (19) a Maori Council was empowered to fix the amount of fine to be paid by Maoris for non-compliance with or breach of all or any of the by-laws made by the Council, but no statutory power was given to the Council to impose a penalty on Europeans except in respect of a by-law made by the Council for the punishment by fine of those, whether European or Maori, who practise upon the superstition or credulity of any Maori in connection with the treatment of any disease.

There is not in the Act or its amendments any definite authority given to the Council to inflict a fine for breach of its by-laws, but inferentially it apparently has power to do so, for it is enacted in s. 25 of the principal Act that in any case in which a Maori shall refuse to pay a fine imposed or inflicted in pursuance of any by-law under the Act the Chairman of the Council is empowered to proceed for the recovery of the same by civil process in the Magistrate's Court. The limitation of sub-s. (19) of s. 16 of the principal Act to Maoris was not remedied until 1903, when, it being quite clear that the subjects upon which by-laws could be made included matters concerning the conduct of persons other than Maoris, the following words were added under s. 2 (c) (iv) of the Act of 1903 to s. 16 (19) of the principal Act: "and to be paid by persons other than Maoris for non-compliance with or breach of any by-laws made by the Council under subsections four, five, eleven, thirteen, fourteen, and fifteen of this section." Section 25 was also amended by the addition of the words, "and in any case in which any person other than a Maori refuses to pay any fine imposed or inflicted in pursuance of any by-law made under subsections four, five, eleven, thirteen, fourteen, and fifteen

“ of section sixteen.” The inference that the fine could be imposed or inflicted by the Council was strengthened by the addition by s. 2 (f) of the Act of 1903 to s. 25 of a proviso giving the person on whom the fine was imposed the right of rehearing before a Magistrate upon depositing with the Chairman of the Council or Village Committee a sum not exceeding £3 by way of costs of such rehearing, and also by the opening words of s. 3 of the Act of 1903: “ In addition to any fine imposed by the Council.”

Paragraph 7 of the case states that “ no by-laws, or constitution, or *Gazette* notice in respect to any Maori Council were produced or proved.” The Court must therefore assume that no Proclamation has been made constituting a Maori district including the village of Tikitiki. The first question, therefore, is whether the Court can hold that the introduction of intoxicating liquor into a Maori kainga, village, or pa which is not within a Maori district proclaimed under the Act of 1900 is an offence within the meaning of s. 3 (1) of the Act of 1903.

I was, when the case was argued before me, strongly inclined to uphold Mr. Nolan's contention that there was an independent substantive offence created by sub-s. (1), but upon a very careful consideration of the Acts of 1900 and 1903 I feel compelled to come to the opposite conclusion.

If the object of s. 3 was to make the mere possession of liquor by a person residing in or passing through a Maori kainga, village, or pa a substantive penal offence where the kainga, village, or pa was outside a “ Maori district ” one would have expected to find such a provision in Part X of the Licensing Act, 1908, among the special provisions as to Maoris. These special provisions apply (a) to “ Native licensing districts ” constituted under s. 5 of the Licensing Act, and (b) to “ proclaimed areas ” under s. 272 of that Act. It is not an offence under any of these special provisions for a person residing in or passing through a Native kainga, village, or pa to have liquor for his own consumption. The offences under Part X are the selling, supplying, or giving to Natives, except under the conditions prescribed in Part X, of intoxicating liquor, or the sending or delivering into proclaimed areas of liquor which the person sending or delivering the same has reasonable ground to suspect is intended to be sold, or exposed or kept for sale, within such area.

Section 3 of the Act of 1903 is a part of a general scheme created by the Legislature for the purpose of giving to Maoris a system of local self-government, and all the provisions of the principal Act and its amendments are in aid of and limited to the establishment of such a system. The creation of a “ Maori district ” under the principal Act is a condition precedent to the operation of the provisions of the Act and its amendments. The intention of the Legislature is clearly stated in the preamble to the Act of 1900, the concluding words of which are: “ And whereas, in furtherance of these objects, it is expedient to make provision for the establishment of local elective bodies of Maoris within such districts for the purposes aforesaid, and to invest these bodies with the powers of carrying out such rules and regulations as may be prescribed, and of enabling them to frame necessary by-laws and to give effect to the same.” And the power to prevent by by-law the introduction by any person, whether European or Maori, of intoxicating liquor into a Maori kainga, village, or pa within a Maori district constituted under the Act is one of the powers expressly given and limited to a Maori Council elected under the Act.

In my opinion the "Maori kainga, village, or pa" referred to in s. 3 (1) of the Act of 1903 means, therefore, a Maori kainga, village, or pa within a "Maori district" constituted under the Act of 1900, and this construction gives effect to the introductory words, "In addition to any fine imposed by the Council for the breach of any by-law under section sixteen of the principal Act." The Legislature, in my opinion, thought it necessary to provide an additional punishment, beyond a mere fine recoverable by civil process, for the introduction into a Maori kainga, village, or pa within a "Maori district" of intoxicating liquor, and for that reason enacted sub-s. (1). The words "whether a Maori or not" were introduced into the subsection to meet the amendments I have already referred to of ss. 16 and 25. Section 3 (4) also clearly limits the forfeiture of liquor introduced into any Maori kainga, village, or pa to a kainga, village, or pa within a "Maori district," for the only person authorized to seize and deal with such liquor as forfeited liquor is the Chairman of a Maori Council or some person acting under his authority. This indicates that the term "Maori kainga, village, or pa" where used in s. 3 has the limited meaning I have stated.

The other question argued was whether there was any evidence that the appellant introduced liquor into the Native village known as Tikitiki. Under the Act of 1903 a Maori Council may, with the approval of the Governor, define the limits and boundaries of a kainga, village, or pa (s. 6). Where such boundaries are not so defined, then what are the reasonable limits of a kainga, village, or pa is a question of fact. The Magistrate has found that the village of Tikitiki was on the right-hand side of a main arterial public road, while the boardinghouse into which the liquor was introduced was on Maori land on the other side of the road.

There was, in my opinion, sufficient evidence justifying the Magistrate in finding that the defendant was in possession of some of the whisky obtained from the hotel at Port Awanui, but the case does not disclose sufficient material to enable me to say whether the boardinghouse was reasonably within the boundaries of a Native village, for it does not state how near to the public road the Native habitations were. Had it been necessary to do so I should have referred the case to the Magistrate for a further statement of the facts found by him. I may say, however, that a Native village does not necessarily mean merely the land occupied by the houses or whares of the Natives. It may include a much larger area of land, and the question what are the boundaries of a Native village depends upon the facts proved in each particular case.

I allow the appeal upon the ground that s. 3 of the Act of 1903 applies only to Maori kaingas, villages, or pas within a Maori district constituted under the Act of 1900, and therefore that the conviction of the appellant cannot be sustained and must be quashed.

I make no order for costs, as the respondent is a police officer and laid the information in the course of his duty, and there was a genuine point of law to be argued: *Batley v. Cullen*(1).

Appeal allowed; conviction quashed.
