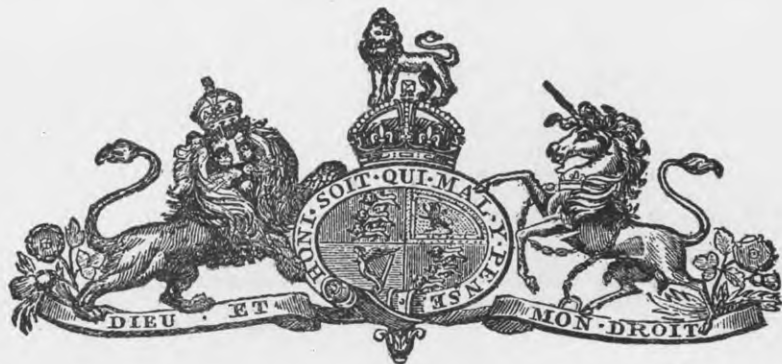

PERSONS WANTED.

From the New Zealand Expeditionary Force.

Next-of-kin, William Portlock, Dawson, Y. T., Canada, and last employed by Public Works Department at Featherston.

DUNEDIN.—About 30th November, 1915, **William James Smith**, age about thirty-one, height about 5 ft. 7 in., soldier, medium build, dark hair and complexion; usually crosses his legs when standing; impediment in speech. He deserted from the Second Reinforcements in Egypt and returned to New Zealand.

INQUIRIES, ETC., FROM OUTSIDE NEW ZEALAND.

MELBOURNE (VICTORIA).—At about 11.45 a.m. on the 29th ultimo William Haines, an employee of the Globe Taxi Company, Queen's Bridge Street, South Melbourne, was found dead in a Unic touring motor car in Bulleen Road, turning into Templestowe Road, about two miles from Heidelberg and a mile from the electric-car line, Kew. Haines had been shot in the head and neck. Apparently nothing was stolen from deceased. At about 12 midnight on the 28th ultimo a message was received at the office of the Globe Taxi Company, Queen's Bridge Street, South Melbourne, from a person who said his name was L'Esrange, requiring an open car for a trip to Eltham, to pick him up at the Cliveden Mansions. Haines was sent with the car, No. 11022. Suspicion is attached to **Two men** (names unknown) who were seen in the motor-car. Description: First, about thirty years, 6 ft. high, medium to thin build, thin determined face; wore a dark suit, dark soft-felt hat (after leaving the scene wore a Panama hat); second, about thirty years, 5 ft. 6 in. high, supposed dark complexion, wore a brownish suit and dark soft-felt hat. Both men had a rather well-dressed appearance. In a water-hole near the scene was found a plated-grass or fine-cane suit-case, leather-bound, 23 in. by 17 in. by 6 in. It contained a large dungaree overall, dungaree pants, blue-cloth serge coat, two pieces of cardboard with the numbers 1741, a box of tacks, two false moustaches, two woollen masks, a pair of bluish-tinted glasses, a flask of brandy, a small bottle of spirit gum, and a small bottle of methylated spirits. The overall coat has evidently been used in a boot-factory. Should any information be obtained regarding this matter a telegraphic communication is to be sent to the Commissioner of Police, Wellington. (P. 16/391.)

LAW REPORT.

("New Zealand Law Reports," 1916, page 192.)

[S.C. IN BANCO, DUNEDIN.—(SIM, J.)—23RD, 25TH FEBRUARY, 1916.]

BAIN v. STAGPOOLE.

Licensing Offences—Selling Liquor in a No-license District—"Molendo Wine"—Sale by Chemist for Medicinal Purposes—Express Prohibition—Exemption—Licensing Act, 1908, ss. 3 (b), 146, and 147 (1) (h)—Licensing Act, 1910, s. 34.

The sale of liquor by a chemist in a no-license district for medicinal purposes comes within the express prohibition in s. 146 of the Licensing Act, 1908, and the exemption granted by s. 3 (b) of that Act does not apply. *Miller v. Lamb* followed (29 N.Z. L.R. 873; 13 G.L.R. 24).

Quere, Whether in s. 147 (1) (h) of the said Act, which provides that "Nothing in this section shall prevent any duly registered chemist within such district from dispensing alcoholic liquors in medicinal quantities for medicinal purposes upon a certificate signed by a duly registered medical practitioner," the words "Nothing in this section" shall not be read as "Nothing in this Act."

APPEAL from the decision of J. R. Baltholomew, Esq., S.M., at Oamaru.

The appellant was a registered chemist, and the manager of the United Friendly Societies' Dispensary in Oamaru, a town in a no-license district. On the 24th December last the appellant sold a bottle of Molendo wine for medicinal purposes. This is a medicated wine containing more than 10 per cent. of proof spirit, and is therefore "liquor" within the meaning of s. 4 of the Licensing Act, 1908, as amended by s. 34 of the Act of 1910. The Magistrate (Mr. Bartholomew) held that the applicant had been guilty of an offence within the meaning of s. 146 of the Licensing Act, 1908, which imposes a general prohibition on the sale of liquor in a no-license district.

Section 3 of the Licensing Act, 1908, provides that—

Except as expressly provided in this Act, nothing in this Act shall apply

(b.) To an apothecary, chemist, or druggist administering or selling any spirituous, distilled, or fermented liquors for medicinal purposes.

The provisions of s. 147 (1) (h) are set out in the headnote.

Lee, for the appellant:—

The question is whether the position of a chemist is the same in a license district as in a no-license district. The decision of Stout, C.J., in *Miller v. Lamb* (29 N.Z. L.R. 873; 13 G.L.R. 24) only applied to sub-ss. (c) and (d) of s. 3 of the Licensing Act, 1908. It is not an authority with respect to sub-s. (b). The position of a chemist is different. He is permitted to sell for medicinal purposes, and not as a beverage. Section 147 (h) does not grant a privilege, as is held by the Chief Justice (29 N.Z. L.R. 873, 882; 13 G.L.R. 24, 27), but the right of a chemist to sell under certain conditions is assumed to exist.

W. C. MacGregor, K.C., for the respondent:—

A fair, large, and liberal interpretation of the Act is required. Sections 146 and 147 of the Licensing Act, 1908, form a separate code of law for no-license districts. *Miller v. Lamb* (29 N.Z. L.R. 873; 13 G.L.R. 24) decided that these sections are express provisions and exclude the exemptions allowed by s. 3.

Lee in reply.

Feb. 25.—SIM, J.:—

[After stating the facts His Honour proceeded:] The question raised by the appeal is whether in a no-license district a chemist is entitled to sell liquor for medicinal purposes. It was contended by Mr. Lee for the appellant that the effect of s. 3 of the Licensing Act is to exclude such a chemist from the operation of s. 146 of the Act, and that a chemist in a no-license district has therefore exactly the same rights as a chemist in a district where there are licenses. The construction of these two sections was elaborately discussed in the case of *Miller v. Lamb* (29 N.Z. L.R. 873; 13 G.L.R. 24); and it was there held by His Honour the Chief Justice that the prohibition contained in s. 146 was an express provision for the purposes of sub-s. (c) of s. 3, and that therefore the sale of New Zealand wine in a no-license district was prohibited. Mr. Lee did not seek to challenge the correctness of this decision. He contended, however, that, although s. 146 might be an express provision for the purposes of sub-ss. (c) and (d) of s. 3, yet that it was not an express provision for the purposes of sub-s. (b), and that a chemist in a no-license district was in a different position from a manufacturer of New Zealand wine or an auctioneer. Such a chemist

certainly ought to be in a different position, but there is no escape, I think, from the conclusion that if s. 146 is an express provision for any of the cases mentioned in s. 3, then it is an express provision for all of those cases. The prohibition in s. 146 is so absolute and unlimited in its terms that it is impossible to treat it as applying to some only of the cases mentioned in s. 3. If it applies to any it must apply to all. The case of *Miller v. Lamb* (29 N.Z. L.R. 873; 13 G.L.R. 24) is thus an authority for holding that the prohibition contained in s. 146 applies to a chemist selling liquor for medicinal purposes, and was rightly treated by the Magistrate as governing the present case. I agree with the conclusion arrived at by the Chief Justice in that case, and I think that s. 146 is an express provision for the purposes of s. 3.

In the course of the argument in *Miller v. Lamb* (29 N.Z. L.R. 873; 13 G.L.R. 24), and also in the judgment in that case, sub s. (h) of s. 147 is treated as creating an exception to the general prohibition contained in s. 146. There is, however, some difficulty in treating it in that way. It is not quite correct to say that it creates a privilege. In terms it merely declares that nothing in s. 147 shall prevent any duly registered pharmaceutical chemist from doing certain things. But if those things are prohibited by some other statutory provision, then surely the purely negative words of sub-s. (h) cannot be treated as making them lawful. It was contended by Mr. MacGregor that ss. 146 and 147 ought to be read together as one section, for the reason that s. 147 is declared by sub-s. 2 thereof to be supplementary to s. 146. But that very subsection declares also that the provisions of s. 147 are not in abrogation of s. 146. If sub-s. (h) is to be treated as limiting the general prohibition of s. 146, is not that an abrogation *pro tanto* of the provisions of s. 146?

It may be, however, that the intention of the Legislature to create an exemption in favour of chemists is so obvious that to give effect to it the Court would be justified in reading for the opening words of sub-s. (h) ("Nothing in this section shall, &c.") the words "Nothing in this Act shall," &c. If the subsection is not to be read in this way it is really a nullity, and where the object of a statute is clear the statute should not be reduced to a nullity, unless the language is absolutely intractable: *Salmon v. Duncombe* (11 A.C. 627, 634). It is not necessary for the purposes of this case to come to any definite conclusion on this question, because the appellant, if entitled to rely on sub-s. (h), has not brought himself within the terms of that subsection. In view of the doubt that exists as to the effect of the subsection, it is desirable that the position of a chemist in a no license district should be made clear by the Legislature by an amendment of the Licensing Act.

The result is that the conviction of the appellant is affirmed, and the appeal dismissed, with costs £5 5s.

Prison proclaimed.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intitled the Prisons Act, 1908, it is provided that the Governor may, by Proclamation published in the *Gazette*, declare any house, building, enclosure, or place to be a prison, and from and after the gazetiting of any such Proclamation, or from any later time specified in the Proclamation, such house, building, enclosure, or place shall be deemed a prison:

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance of the above-recited power and authority, do hereby declare that the buildings erected upon the land mentioned in the Schedule hereto, and all enclosures used or occupied therewith, shall, from and after the publication of this Proclamation in the *Gazette*, be a prison, known as the Waikeria Prison, within the meaning and for the purposes of the Prisons Act, 1908.

SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Auckland Land District bounded towards the north by the Puniu River from the Waikeria Stream to the Mangatutu Stream; towards the north-east by the Mangatutu Stream to the south-eastern corner of the Tokanui Block; towards the south by the southern boundary of the said Tokanui Block to the road intersecting Section 2, Block XV, Puniu Survey District; and towards the west generally by the northern continuation of the said road to an eastern tributary of the Waikeria Stream, by that tributary to the Waikeria Stream, and by that stream to the Puniu River, the place of commencement.

Given under the hand of His Excellency the Right Honourable Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Member of the Royal Victorian Order, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over His Majesty's Dominion of New Zealand and its Dependencies; and issued under the Seal of the said Dominion, at the Government House at Wellington, this seventh day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen.

REGULATIONS.

1. SAMBUR or Ceylon deer (stags or bucks only) may be taken or killed within the said district from the 1st day of June, 1916, to the 31st day of July, 1916, both days inclusive.

2. Licenses to kill such deer may be issued by the Chief Postmaster at Wellington, and the Postmasters at Palmerston North, Bull's, Foxton, and Marton, on payment of a license fee of 20s., in the form prescribed in the Schedule hereto, and subject to the said Acts and these regulations.

3. No licensee shall be allowed to take or kill more than three stags or bucks; and, further, the said Chief Postmaster and Postmasters shall not issue more than one license to take or kill deer to the same person.

4. No hind or fawn will be allowed to be killed on any pretext whatever; and no dogs will be allowed to accompany either the licensee or any attendant he may have with him.

5. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.

IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in the Westland Acclimatization District, exclusive of all sanctuaries, and the conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license and the fee payable therefor.

REGULATIONS.

1. RED-DEER stags may be taken or killed in the Westland Acclimatization District from the 1st day of April, 1916, to the 20th day of May, 1916 (both days inclusive).

2. Licenses to take or kill such deer may be issued by the Chief Postmaster at Hokitika, and the Postmasters at Kumara, Ross, and Okarito, on payment of a license fee of £2, in the form prescribed in the Schedule hereto, and subject to the said Act and these regulations; provided that not more than one such license shall be issued to the same person.

3. No licensee shall take or kill more than two stags, and no stag shall be killed carrying antlers with less than ten points.

4. No hind or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever; and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.

5. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.

6. Regulations as to deer "tags," per *New Zealand Gazette* No. 40, Vol. I, of 20th May, 1909, shall be strictly adhered to by each licensee, who, in addition thereto, shall return all unused "tags" to the Secretary of the Westland Acclimatization Society, Hokitika, immediately he has finished stalking for the season for which such "tags" have been issued, together with a statement of the number of deer shot.

7. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

3. No licensee shall take or kill more than three fallow-deer bucks.

4. No doe or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever; and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.

5. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.

6. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

5. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.

6. All regulations as to deer "tags" in force within the said district shall be strictly adhered to by each licensee.

7. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

3. No licensee shall take or kill more than four red-deer stags, and no red-deer stag shall be killed carrying antlers with less than ten points. Ball cartridge only to be used.

4. The licensee must give notice to the said Postmaster of the date on which it is his intention to stalk deer; such notice to be posted, or delivered, or telegraphed three clear days before such date.

5. No doe, hind, or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever; and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.

6. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or any portion thereof.

7. Regulations as to deer "tags," per New Zealand Gazette No. 40, Vol. I, of 20th May, 1909, page 1408, shall be strictly adhered to by each licensee, who, in addition thereto, shall return all unused "tags" to the Secretary of the Lakes District Acclimatization Society, Queenstown, immediately he has finished stalking for the season for which such "tags" have been issued, together with a statement of the number of deer shot.

8. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

3. No licensee shall take or kill more than two bucks, and no buck shall be killed carrying antlers with less than four points.

4. No doe or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever; and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.

5. The licensee must give notice to the said Chief Postmaster of the date on which it is his intention to stalk deer; such notice to be posted, or delivered, or telegraphed three clear days before such date.

6. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.

7. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

The number of such licenses shall not exceed thirty; provided that not more than one such license shall be issued to the same person.

3. No licensee shall take or kill more than five bucks, and no buck shall be killed carrying antlers with less than four points.

4. No doe or fawn shall be taken or killed on any pretext whatever, and no licensee shall allow any dog to accompany either himself or any attendant he may have with him.

5. Nothing herein contained shall extend to authorizing any person to sell any deer or portion thereof.

6. Any person committing a breach of any of these regulations shall be liable, on conviction, to a fine not exceeding £20.

Regulations for Deer-shooting in the Counties of Featherston and Wairarapa South (Haurangi Reserve).

LIVERPOOL, Governor.

IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in that part of the Wellington Acclimatization District comprised in the Counties of Featherston and Wairarapa South (excepting that portion of the said counties lying to the westward of the Wellington-Napier Railway line, and excepting also the area described in the First Schedule hereto), and further prescribing the conditions affecting such deer-shooting, the form of license, and the fee payable in respect thereof.

REGULATIONS.

1. RED-DEER stags and hinds may be taken or killed within that portion of the Wellington Acclimatization District hereinbefore described from the 1st April, 1916, to the 31st May, 1916 (both days inclusive).

2. Licenses to take or kill such deer may be issued by the Chief Postmaster at Wellington, or by the Postmasters at Masterton, Carterton, Greytown, Featherston, and Martinborough, on payment by the licensee of a license fee of £2. IN pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred upon me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in that part of the Wellington Acclimatization District described in the First Schedule hereto, and further prescribing the conditions affecting such deer-shooting, the form of license, and the fee payable in respect thereof.

REGULATIONS.

1. RED-DEER stags may be taken or killed within the district described in the First Schedule hereto from the 1st April, 1916, to the 31st May, 1916 (both days inclusive).

2. IN exercise of the powers vested in me by the Animals Protection Act, 1908 (hereinafter called "the said Act"), I, Arthur William de Brito Savile, Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, do hereby make the following regulations prescribing the deer-shooting season in the Waitaki Acclimatization District, comprising all that area in the Canterbury and Otago Land Districts bounded towards the north-west by the summit of the Southern Alps from the north-eastern corner of Vincent County to Mount Cook; thence towards the north-east by a right line over Ball Hut to the Tasman Glacier, by the western side of the Tasman Glacier to the Tasman River, by a line along the middle of that river and through the middle of Lake Pukaki to and along the middle of the Pukaki River and the middle of the Waitaki River to the sea; towards the east by the sea to Waihemo County; and towards the south-west and west by Waihemo, Maniototo, and Vincent Counties to the summit of the Southern Alps, the place of commencement; and the conditions affecting the same, and also the form of license and the fee payable therefor.
