

POLICE REGULATIONS.

Time allowed: Three hours.

1. What ranks are required to salute—
His Excellency the Governor;
His Excellency the Admiral;
The Commander of a British warship;
The Commandant, New Zealand Defence Forces;
The Surgeon-General, New Zealand Defence Forces?
2. A sergeant in charge of the relief on night duty informs you at 3 a.m. that he has found a constable in an intoxicated condition on his beat: how would you, as Sub-Inspector, act in this matter, or instruct the sergeant how to act, as the circumstances may require?
3. What provision is made for appeal—
(a.) In respect of disciplinary convictions;
(b.) In respect of promotion;
(c.) In respect of any other matters?
4. What are the instructions regarding the attendance of witnesses for a prisoner in gaol, at his trial?
5. What matters should you as Sub-Inspector give special attention to in supervising the watchhouse and lock-up?
6. What are the instructions regulating interviews between solicitors and prisoners in the lock-up?
7. State what you know of the regulations relating to payment of hospital and medical charges for treatment of sick or injured members of the Force; and in what circumstances payment of the sickness deduction of 1s. per day would and would not be enforced.
8. How should a mounted constable be dressed and equipped—
(a.) When on Governor's escort or other special duty;
(b.) When attending Courts?

POLICE AND DETECTIVE DUTIES.

Time allowed: Three hours.

1. The Commissioner refers to you a general complaint that excessive drinking occurs in the hotels in your city, and that the law relating to "closing" is disregarded: what action would you take?
2. An anonymous letter draws attention to illicit dealing in liquor in a certain house in a remote, sparsely populated part of a no-license district:
(a.) What offences would you seek to detect?
(b.) What evidence for a prosecution in each or any offence would you look for?
3. You are requested by telephone to send a constable to eject a mere trespasser from complainant's garden:
(a.) What are the provisions of the criminal law upon this matter?
(b.) What are the duties of the police, and what their authority in respect thereof?
(c.) What instructions would you give an inexperienced constable, if you decided to send him, in dealing with the trespasser?
4. Races are to be held on two days, Thursday and Saturday, next week on the racecourse three miles outside the town:
(a.) What matters require attention?
(b.) What arrangements would you make?
5. A passenger-steamer bound for your port is wrecked on the rocky coast fifteen miles distant; some of the passengers and crew have been drowned, some are still on the vessel, and others are on the shore: what do you consider the police should do?
6. You are notified by telegraph that three days ago a certain woman left by train for the city, supposedly for the purpose of having her miscarriage brought about at a nurse's address:
(a.) What steps would you take to detect the offence?
(b.) What means of causing miscarriage would you look for?
(c.) How would you secure possession of the means of causing miscarriage?
7. Complaint is made that bookmakers frequent the streets and licensed hotels for the purpose of betting on horse-races: what steps would you take?
