Amending Salmon and Trout Fishing Regulations.

WHEREAS by Orders in Council dated the twentyfirst day of September, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, the thirtieth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and the eighth day of April, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and published in the New Zealand Gazette of the twenty-first day of September, one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, the seventh day of February, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and

the eleventh day of April, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, regulations were made for fishing for salmon and trout in salmon rivers: And whereas it is desirable to amend such regulations:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor-General of the Dominion of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority conferred upon him by section eighty-three of the Fisheries Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and acting by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, doth hereby make the following regulation.

The holder of a trout-fishing license may fish for salmon in any river up to and including the twenty-eighth day of February, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen; provided that no person shall take or catch more than six salmon in any one day.

REGULATIONS.

(Under the Gaming Act, 1908.)

In pursuance and exercise of the powers in that behalf contained in section 33 of the Gaming Act, 1908, and of all other powers and authorities it enabling in that behalf, the Cromwell

Jockey Club, a racing club within the meaning of the said Act (hereinafter referred to as "the said club"), doth hereby revoke the regulations dated the 17th day of December, 1916, and in lieu thereof doth hereby make the following regulations controlling the admission of persons to that part of the Crom-well Racecourse situated in the district of Otago, and known as the Cromwell Racecourse, while the said racecourse is used or occupied by the said club for race meetings.

1. These regulations shall come into force on the date of

the same being published in the New Zealand Gazette.
2. In these regulations the words "bookmaker," "racing club," and "race meeting" shall have the meanings ascribed to those terms respectively by section 2 of the Gaming Act,

3. The following persons shall be and are hereby excluded from the racecourse above described while the same is used or occupied by the said club for a race meeting, namely:—

(a.) Bookmakers.(b.) Bookmakers' clerks, bookmakers' assistants, and bookmakers' agents.

(c.) All persons under disqualification inflicted by any racing or trotting club in the Dominion of New Zealand, the Commonwealth of Australia, or elsewhere, if affiliated to the New Zealand Racing Conference, or the New Zealand Trotting Association, or the New Zealand Trotting Conference.

(d.) Common prostitutes and persons who habitually consort with thieves or persons who have no lawful

visible means of support.

(e.) Professional tipsters, persons convicted of house-breaking or pocket-picking, forgery, uttering or possessing counterfeit coin, theft, false pretences, receiving stolen goods, mischief, assault, or any offence or crime of any kind under the Crimes Act, 1908; and also idle and disorderly persons, rogues and vagabonds, and incorrigible rogues convicted under the Police Offences Act, 1908, and persons convicted of an offence under the Gaming Act, 1908.

The foregoing regulations of the Cromwell Jockey Club were made and passed by the Cromwell Jockey Club on the 14th day of December, 1918, and signed by the Chairman and Secretary.
