Agricultural and Pastoral Statistics.

The collection of these statistics will henceforth be considered to be the duty of the police at all places where it is considered by the officer in charge of the district that the work can be so done without neglect or serious disarrangement of police duties.

I desire to impress upon each collector the importance of absolute accurancy and prompt attention in furnishing the returns. The statistics are of great value provided they are furnished in proper time so as to enable the Government to take such action as the returns indicate to be expedient, and the accurate and expeditious collection of them cannot fail to reflect favourably upon the efficiency of the Force.

Detailed instructions, which have my approval, are being supplied by the Government Statistician direct to each collector, and the terms of remuneration are stated.

Any collector who finds as time goes on that he is unlikely to be able to complete his returns within the time agreed upon should inform the officer in charge of the district.
