When notifying the arrest of persons charged with theft, or suspected of theft, it should be stated whether the property stolen, or any portion of it, has been recovered.

A description of property supposed to be stolen, found in the possession of offenders, for which owners cannot be found, shall be furnished for insertion in the *Gazette*.

### SPECIAL INQUIRY.

DEVONPORT.—Special inquiries are to be made with a view of establishing the identity of a newly-born male child, whose dead body was found on the Stanley Beach, between the wharf and Calliope Dock, on the 19th instant. A post mortem examination disclosed that the child was born alive and died from suffocation. If any information is obtained regarding this matter, an urgent communication is to be sent to the Inspector of Police, Auckland.

#### PERSONS WANTED.

Auckland.—25th instant, for escaping from custody, James Williams, alias James Charles Hayes, alias Charles Holmes, alias Oscar Holmes, alias Patrick Montgomery, age thirty-six, height 5 ft. 8 in., labourer and clerk medium build, fresh complexion, brown hair going bald, grey eyes, sear on left forefinger.
