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MR. SKENE, of the Dunedin Labor Exchange, reports that work during May has been plentiful, and June opens with good prospects. We may look for a good many breaks in the weather now, winter being on us. It can with perfect safety be said that there is work for all; at the same time all are not suited for the work offering. Rather hard lines for office and counter hands to pick and shovel; yet many of the best in our midst look back with pleasure to the ordeal. Ploughmen are very scarce; female servants are almost "extinct." Wages—Couples, £70 to £90; good ploughmen, £65; ordinary farm hands, £52 to £60. Building Trade—10s to 15s per day; hhouse girls, £26 to £40; hotel girls, £36 to £52; cooks, grooms, waiters, barmen, &c., 25s to 60s per week; pick and shovel, and bushmen, 8s and 9s per day; shepherds, £65 to £70; smart boys and girls from 6s. to 15s per week; country storehands, £35s to 50s and found, but quiet.
