**THE PREMIER'S SPEECH AT WANGANUI.**

THERE are people blind enough not to see what Abolition really means. After all that has been said on the subject during the last twelve months, these are as great innocents as they were in the beginning. Even the speech recently delivered at Wanganui is not for them an *eye-opener*. They are to be pitied, unless, indeed, they are playing a part, pretending one thing whilst really working for another.

From the moment the Abolition Bill made its first appearance, our estimate of it has been that it meant and means a crushing Centralism, and the absorption of the entire Land Fund by the Central Government. The speech of the Head of the Government at Wanganui confirms us in this opinion.

The Premier tells the Colony that Abolition is emphatically a financial question, and in answer to a question put after the speech had been concluded, he stated the Government had not decided to impose any additional taxation, and further, that he did not think any such taxation would be necessary. Where, then, is the money to come from which is to put an end to the financial question involved in Abolition, and to balance the debtor and credit sides of colonial finance? Where? From the land, and from no other source.

But it will be said the Abolition Bill enacts the localisation of the Land Fund, and both the former and present
