PROGRESS AND JUSTICE IN THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

THE Catholics of New Zealand provide, at their own sole expense, an excellent education for their own children. Yet such is the sense of justice and policy in the New Zealand Legislature that it compels these Catholics, after having manfully provided for their own children, to contribute largely towards the free and godless education of other people's children!!! This is tyranny, oppression, and plunder.

THE COST OF EDUCATION.

FROM the Report laid before Parliament a few days ago by the Minister of Education, we learn that the Government paid during the year ending the 31st December, 1884, the following sums for education in New Zealand:—
