PROGRESS AND JUSTICE IN THE NINETEENTH CENTURY.

THE Catholics of New Zealand provide, at their own sole expense, an excellent education for their own children. Yet such is the sense of justice and policy in the New Zealand Legislature that it compels these Catholics, after having manfully provided for their own children, to contribute largely towards the free and godless education of other people's children!!! This is tyranny, oppression, and plunder.

A GLORIOUS POSSIBILITY.

THE departure of the Most Rev. Dr. MORAN from Dunedin for Rome, which will have taken place before these lines are in the hands of our readers, naturally attracts the thoughts to the condition of things existing at the present moment.

Every bishop who has gone of late years to give an account of his stewardship to the Vicar of Christ, has found the august Pastor of the Church surrounded by difficulties and dangers. And this state of affairs grows worse, rather than better, as the years go by. Nothing more strange can be witnessed, if due reflection be given to it, than the place so long occupied by the Holy Father. He is the acknowledged commander of a greater proportion by far of the human race than any other, even the mightiest, potentate who exists on the face of the world. His subjects embrace men of all classes and callings. There is no position so exalted as that allegiance to him is not acknowledged there.
