following report was read:—

The year now closing has been most satisfactory. The year now closing has been most satisfactory. During the second half there was a steady influx of both extern and resident pupils, and the promise of the future is hopeful, as only a very small percentage of the girls will be leaving this Christmas. A new classification has been adopted this year, in view of the Oxford local examinations, which will be held in June of the coming year, and will supplement the matriculation and civil service examinations, which are in the same working orden as in past years. The value of the Oxford examinations is being proved by the ardor with which the subjects are being studied by the plupils of the various grades. The school has obtained the usual musical successes, which this year have, if anything, been emphasised by an increase in the number of honors certificates—11 for practical music and 4 for theoretical. A candidate in the advanced grade has secured the silver medal, and one the diploma of L.A.B. in the teachers' examination. The total number of successful candidates in the practical examinations is 47. Good work has been done by the art students. Much attention has been given to physical development, and the class (under the direction of Miss Mowat) has made very satisfactory progress. The large number of children admitted into the sodalities during the year is proof sufficient that the general tone and conduct of the pupils is decidedly good.

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After the prizes had been distributed his Londship said that he had listened to the school report with very great pleasure, and he thought it was one which would reflect credit on any school in the Colony. A striking feature of the year's work was the large number of successes which pupils of the College had gained in public competitions, and he thought that they had acted very wisely in going in for such competitions and public examinations. It was very gratifying to him to hear that the conduct of the pupils was excellent, and that they were paying attention to their holy religion.
